LONDON, July 13.—The announcement that an arbitration treaty between Germany and Great Britain was signed yesterday by Foreign Minister Lansplete and altogether unpleasant sur-prise to the English press and public. It was against just such an agreement that the Spectator and other powerful organs urged the government prior to King Edward's visit to Emperor Wil-liam at Kiel. By the papers which echoed that warning, the news of the signing of the arbitration treaty is swallowed with either palpable dislike or will all-concealed disappointment.

The Daily News, the government's most bitter opponent, warmly congratulates King Edward upon his latest achievement. 
