



DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

MAY BE SEVERED

Nicaraguan Minister to the United States May be Given His Passports.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.

Indications are that diplomatic relations between this country and Nicragua are nearing a crisis, resulting from the failure of President Zelays to adjust the Emery claim.

In diplomatic circles it would occasion no surprise if Senor Espinosa, Nicaraguan minister to the United States, should shrortly be told by the state department that the present difficulty has gone beyond the range of diplomatic discussion in which event this request for passports would logically follow.

The reticence of the state department in regard to the case indicates that the situation is more or less grave and that there is little probability of any settlement of the difficulty on the basis proposed by Secretary Knox. What is regarded as significant in connection with the present state of affairs is the fact that J. H. Gregory, the American charge d'affairs, who recently reached here from Nicaragua, is not expected to return to the Central American Republic. One of the next moves by the state department probably will be the transmission of all the data bearing on the case to congress.

THE PEOPLE OF THE NORTH POLE DISCUSSED

The neighbors of the North Pole are the Eskimos of Greenland, and Knud Rasmussen writes of them in "The People of the Polar North." He has had unique opportunities of observing these most interesting people.

The people discussed are the most northerly dwelling people in the world, and wander from settlement to settlement between Cape York, north of Melville Bay, and Cape Alexander (between 76 deg, and 78 deg. N. latitude). The House of Lords does not interest them, and their women are not asking for the vote, and their army and navy are of the most modest kind.

Mr. Rasmussen, the writer of the book, is said to have Eskimo blood in his veins. His father was for twenty years a missionary in Southwest Greenland, and the son lived there for fourteen years, hence his familiarity with the language and habits of the people. 

DANUBE UNAVAILABLE.



For upward of a year work has been in progress upon a project which is likely to have an important bearing upon the relations between Austria-Hungary and the Balkan states and Servia in particular. This project is an inland waterway across Servia and Macedonia joining the Danube and the Aegean Sea. The preliminary details of the plan have already been worked out by Prince Lazarovich Hrebelianovich, of Servia; N. I. Stamenkovich, professor of hydrotechnics in the Beigrade University; Professor Crylitch, of the same university, who is a member of the geographical societies of Vienna, Berlin, Paris and London, and who was special adviser regarding the geological problems of the Turkish section, and V. R. Savitch, who recently became the Assistant Secretary of Foreign Affairs of Servia.

To avoid possible European political entanglements, the financial arrangements for the construction were undertaken. The American Engineering Company was recently incorporated in New Jersey, with a nominal capital for the purpose, and the stock has all been subscribed for. No bonds are to be issued. Among the American directors are Charles L. Atterbury and John Potter, of No. 30 Broad street, and Mr. Turner, of the Corporation Trust Company of New Jersey. A Philadelphia capitallst, it is expected, will be the official head of the company, eventually. The Servian and Turkish governments will have a large

The proposed waterway will shorten the trade route from Central Europe to Mediterranean ports by approximately 1,600 miles. The length of the new route between the Danube and the Gulg of Salonica will be 382 miles. It has not been decided yet whether to construct the canal for sea-ging barges of 2,000 tons burden, and drawing 12 feet, or for 1,800 tons barges drawing eight feet of water. The former would cost about \$70,000,000, while the latter would cost approximately \$65,000,000. This is to be decided after further field work has been performed. The boats will be 261 feet long and 32 feet wide.

At the present time, a large portion of the commerce of Central Europe destined for the Mediterranean, passes through the ports of the North Sea of Servia. It follows the Moravia river and the Strait of Gibraltar, the routes to its source, which is mear the boundary between Servia and Turkey, and to its source, which is near the boundary between Servia and Turkey, and crossing the divide descends the valley of the Vardar River to Salonica. 
