Bursting of a Water Pipe—Value of the Main.

A break occurred in the old 24 inch main near Donnan's on the Marsh Bridge, on Saturday afternoon.

The water supply being short, and because of the pressure of the water, was split from end to end and the water poured out, throwing up the road and forming a miniature ocean.

The fact being known to the city, and under direction of Mr. Gilbert Murdoch, workmen were soon on hand to repair the damage.

The first thing done was, by adjusting the stop cocks near the Marsh Bridge, to shut off the supply from the broken main, and turn the water into the main new, and it was the first time in about three hours the work was accomplished and water was again plenty.

Workmen were on one sent out and, by working all night, had the damage repaired by 9 o'clock yesterday morning.

Hervey's Inquest. Coroner Earle held an inquest on the body of Master Fred. Allen, Saturday afternoon.

From the evidence it was proved that the shooting was entirely accidental. The revolver belonged to Godfrey's brother, and had been out of repair for some months.

He had, however, within a short time had it repaired, which fact was not known to the lad who fired the fatal shot.

After hearing the evidence the jury returned the following verdict: "On Friday, June 13th, Frederick Thomas Johnston Allen, came to his death from a pistol shot, the pistol being in the hands of and fired by Alfred Godfrey, a minor child of the deceased."

Sunday at Bagtown. They had a lively time at Bagtown yesterday afternoon, and of course a police court inquiry was the result.

It seems that Wm. Bart, commonly called "Black Hill," on account of his complexion being several shades darker than any other person in the settlement, and Angelina Wherry, the Bagtown beauty, attempted to punch Miss Hector and threatened to open the skull of Amnon Gosman.

The fair Angelina had Miss Hector held while she gave her a pummeling, and when Gosman attempted to interfere Bart went for him.

Mr. Gosman, who is a sort of father-in-law to the Bagtown people, fearing that his life was in danger, started for a policeman. Bart and Angelina followed him and overtook him at the church, but not until he had met the officer and told his story.

The two were arrested and Gosman charged them with fighting in the public streets and disturbing the peaceful quiet of Bagtown. The charge was not properly lodged. It either should have been for assault on Miss Hector, or abusive and threatening language to Gosman.

So Angelina and her devoted William left the Court Room in triumph. It has been suggested that Mr. Dews, the street preacher, visit the benighted Bagtown folks and proclaim the glad tidings to them. Freshing is scarce over there, while there is plenty of it in the vicinity of King's Square.

The steamer Empress was damaged, Saturday, by a collision with her wharf at Digby, and did not reach St. John until 1.30 p. m. yesterday.

Harbor Collision.—The harbor lately with shipping, the available anchorage being nearly all occupied. Yesterday the steamer Andes, which was not moored, as the port regulations require, was swung round by the tide across the bows of a schooner and the ship Charles H. Dalton, which were just about to anchor.

The anchors of both vessels failed to stop them, and they went plump into the Andes, doing little damage. There was much excitement on board the three vessels and on the wharves.

City Police Court. As the water was off for some hours on Saturday, and other beverages had to be used, the result was that, on the Police Magistrate resuming his seat, after a week's absence, he saw a full dock before him. It looked even worse than when the bar-rooms were allowed to keep open until 11 o'clock. (They all close at ten sharp now.)

The first man called was James Sullivan, who was not only charged with being drunk but also with assaulting the Mayor. The Magistrate showed the Mayor, on his confession of drunkenness, the enormity of his offence in having assaulted the Chief Magistrate of the City and County of St. John.

The position that a Magistrate occupied by a police officer, they were bound to keep the peace, and an assault on any one of them was most unjustifiable—but above all on the Chief. Then he spoke of the generosity of the Mayor—even though twice assaulted—in not wanting to prosecute. Had the Mayor appeared against him he (the Magistrate) would have sent him to goal for two months.

The Mayor, he said, declined to prosecute on account of the water supply being short, and because of persons to drink something. A fine of \$8 for drunkenness was imposed, paid on once, and the prisoner got off as soon as possible for fear other charges of assault might come against him.

Then followed a lot of strident drunks that were disposed of quickly. "Pay \$8" was said to the first, and "Same fine on you" to the rest. William Newman, arrested drunk in King Square, John Henry in Water street, James Thornton in Drury Lane (this prisoner was very particular that his name should be recorded correctly), Patrick Mahoney and Edward Saunders in Prince William street, James Fale in Sheffield street, John Howard and Patrick Donald in Union street, John Fitzmaurice and William Thompson in St. James street, Hugh McDonald and Richard Fitzmaurice in Brittain street, William Murphy in Drury Lane, were fined the amount that a victim must pay on Monday morning.

There was one man arrested with a name that no one could understand. The Chief had it written, the Magistrate did not attempt to write it, and the man himself spoke it as if it was spelled—Sloogh-shy. His fine of \$8 for drunkenness was at once paid.

Two women—Sarah Smith and Mary Whitney—also confessed to drunkenness, one in Prince William street and the other in St. James, and had two months in goal was their fine.

William Levantine confessed to being drunk somewhere. As he was a stranger he did not know where, and the Chief was correct in stating that it was in an alley of Church street or not. He carried, gracefully through over his shoulder, a light summer overcoat, and looked very nobby. Fine \$8.
