

Some of the fish stories told in Portland and Gloucester, and those sent out by grit enemies of Canada from Ottawa, intimate fish at will, within the three-mile limit. If that were the case we should not hear so many complaints from New England. Canadian fishermen suffer great loss by being compelled to pay duty on fish sent to the United States, except on fresh fish for immediate consumption.
