Northumberland county is undoubtedly the banner county. The direct revenue taken for licenses issued is between seven and eight thousand dollars. When it is considered that many of the licenses sold in York and Gloucester are for the Northumberland district it will be easily seen that ours is the leading county.

MRS. F. P. THOMPSON DIED SUDDENLY.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 30.—The wife of Senator F. P. Thompson, expired suddenly this evening. She was a sister of Governor Snowball. The Senator was on his way home from Ottawa when the sad event occurred.

Saturday was the queen's birthday. The flag on the Post Office was flying in honor of the occasion.

Sugar has advanced ten cents per hundred pounds. This advance is due to the increase duty under the new tariff.

Alan Ritchie, Jr. returned Saturday from a hunting trip to the Ritchie Co.'s camps. He shot a moose and a caribou. The caribou is an exceptionally fine one.

The marriage of Mr. John Addison Flett and Miss Anna Louise Vereker is announced. The ceremony was performed on Monday, November 26th, at Dorchester, Mass.

On account of the weather the meeting of the united choirs and other who were to practise music for the Tennyson Smith meetings, given out for Tuesday night, has been postponed until Thursday night when it is hoped all who can sing will meet at the Methodist S. S. room and assist Mr. Peacock of Chatham, has kindly consented to be present.

John Walsh of Chelmsford had a narrow escape last Thursday morning. He was driving to town and when about to cross the track at Chelmsford siding a special train came along. Mr. Walsh is a little hard of hearing, and not expecting a train at that hour, did not observe its approach. The horse was nearly on the track when it shied and Mr. Walsh saw the train, and jumped out of carriage. Neither horse or man were seriously hurt and proceeded to town.

BAD WRECK ON I. C. R.

Driver Daniel McQuarry Severely Injured. Fireman A. J. Forbes Uninjured.

OPEN SWITCH.

Accident Was at Redpine Station—Train Was Freight Bound West.

A serious accident occurred at Redpine station Monday evening, which seriously injured engineer Daniel McQuarry, and did considerable damage to rolling stock. The way freight, driver McQuarry and fireman A. J. Forbes was proceeding west after a stop at Redpine station and ran into an open switch. The train was going at a fair rate of speed and the locomotive turned over on its side. The fireman was thrown clear of the wreck but driver McQuarry was not so fortunate. He was caught in the wreck and before he could be released he was severely scalded about the shoulders, arms and face.

A wrecking train from Newcastle was soon on the scene and traffic was not long delayed, although six cars had left the rails.

Mr. McQuarry was brought to his home here shortly after the accident and at last reports is resting comfortably.

London, Nov. 26.—The Observer says it is regarded in political circles as practically certain that Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman will go to the House of Lords about Easter. This will make a vacancy in the British Commons and it is this seat that Mr. John McKane expects to contest when the by-election is held to fill the vacancy. Mr. and Mrs. McKane are at present in Scotland.

Mr. H. C. McLeod, General Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, in a letter to the Globe, Toronto which will be found on page three of this issue, calls the attention of bank shareholders to the fact that twenty-five per cent of the banks of Canada have failed within a period of 16 years, the last ten of which were years of unexampled prosperity, and urges the need of external inspection, which experience in the western hemisphere has demonstrated to be essential.

Percy Lindon, belonging to here, and Jos. C. Woods, of Harcourt, who have been playing baseball in Cape Breton during the past summer, have begun an action for the recovery of wages alleged to be them as ball players in the New Aberdeen C. B. base ball club during the past season. The commencing of the action has created quite a sensation in sporting circles. It has been generally suspected that the New Aberdeen club had paid the men in their service this year and this suspicion now seems to be well founded. All the players in the New Aberdeen club were recently suspended by the M. P. A. A. but it is not likely they will be very much concerned as to how the association will deal with them. Lindon and Woods were the star players on the New Aberdeen team.

THE ESTIMATES FOR THE YEAR.

A Large Amount Voted by Parliament for Public Works.

Ottawa, Nov. 30.—The main estimates for 1907, presented to parliament Thursday total \$44,522,645 to be voted, of which \$24,224,645 is on consolidated account, and \$20,298,000 on capital account. There is in addition \$22,100,533 authorized by statute, making the grand total of \$106,689,519.

Among the items are:—Improvements at Newcastle, I. C. R., \$32,000.

Campbellton improvements, \$15,700.

Tracadie lazaretto, laundry and sanitary works, \$5,000.

Buctouche—Channel through beach \$3,500.

Campbellton—Wharf extension, repairs, etc., \$15,000.

Caracquet—Wharf approach, ice breakers, etc., \$2,000.

Locomotive and car shops and land purchase at Moncton, \$520,000.

Clifton (Stonhaven)—Breakwater improvements and repairs, \$2,000.

Dalhousie harbor improvements, \$7,000.

Oak Point wharf, \$8,000.

Petit Rocher breakwater, including connection with shore, \$6,500.

Richibucto—Extension of north pier, \$8,500.

Shippegan Harbor—Improvements at Shippegan Gully, \$6,000.

Shippegan Harbor—Wharf at terminus of Caracquet Railway, \$5,000.

Harbors, rivers and bridges generally in New Brunswick, repairs and improvements, \$170,000.

It is announced that the strike of the Canadian Express company's agents along the Intercolonial railway is settled. The strikers were I. C. R. telegraphers and station agents who have been acting also as agents of the Express company. In April last they struck for more remuneration for their services and various attempts at a settlement have since failed. For several days past a committee of the strikers has been in session at Moncton and it is now announced that the end of the strike will likely be declared to-day. A compromise has been reached, the agents to receive a minimum pay of \$2 a month and 5 per cent. on the business done.

CHATHAM SUFFERS FROM THIEVES.

Epidemic of Sneaking Variety—Clothes Lines Robbed and Petty Depredations of Nightly Occurrence.

Chatham, N. B., Nov. 29.—Chatham is suffering from an epidemic of sneak thievery, and residents are alarmed at the boldness and frequency of the depredations. Men dressed in women's clothes go round in broad daylight and rob clothes lines, houses and stores. In spite of this open display, the police have done nothing and though the men are seen daily on the streets the police do not shadow them, nor are they able to catch them in the act. Women are frightened and householders take every precaution to have things carefully locked up.

Last evening two women or men dressed in women's clothes entered Jos. Arsenau's yard, west end, but were seen as they started to clear out the clothes line. Moore and Allen, two young men, gave chase and the robbers sprinted up towards the exhibition buildings and into the woods back of the race track, where they escaped.

A tub of butter was also filched from Howard Fleigher's house last night. Other robberies include valuable furs, hats, as well as eatables. One of the sneak thieves stole a Duke resident's axe out of the wood shed the other night. The same one or another of the gang, entered the kitchen in the day time and stole two salt hering out of a pan on the stove. The woman of the house heard the door open and started for the kitchen a moment later and heard it close, but no one was in sight.

INDEPENDENT INSPECTION OF CANADIAN BANKS.

An Interesting Letter by H. C. McLeod, General Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, on an Important Subject.

To the Editor of the Globe: Through the press and from the platform the banking system of Canada is lauded as being the best in the world. In many particulars the system is admirable, our elastic bank currency and the readiness with which the banking requirements of new districts are met by branch extension being its strongest features. However, it is not without defects, some of them of vital importance. Of these the most prominent is the lack of external inspection, which experience in the western hemisphere has demonstrated to be essential. The public have been reminded of this necessity by the recent failure of the Ontario Bank and the leading papers of the country are almost a unit in demanding reform in this particular. The reasonableness of this demand is made clear by a review of Canadian banking history since 1880 and before, and is confirmed by the experiences of our neighbors prior to the civil war. In 1880 there were in existence in Canada forty-one banks, since then seven have been incorporated and have commenced business, making a total of forty-eight banks. Of this total twelve have failed and some others have saved themselves by amalgamation. The failures are, therefore, twenty-five per cent. within a period of twenty-six years, the last ten of which were years of unexampled prosperity, with steadily rising deposits, conditions under which even insolvent banks seldom close their doors. Most, if not all of the above mentioned failures were fraudulent, and it is now plainly evident that a few hours' examination by a skilled banker would have disclosed an insolvent condition in any one of the banks, years before it collapsed. In each of the most recent disasters a correct diagnosis could have been made ten or more years ago. Some urge that the Government should call for special returns, but what value should attach to special returns from the bank of Yarmouth, from the Ontario Bank or from any of the other wrecks gone before? They would simply have enlarged the piles of incorrect and deceptive bank returns in the Finance Department. What is written by one having unusual facilities for observation is eminently true: "It is extremely rare to find a bank has failed without some of the officers committing fraudulent or illegal acts to hide it." There is at least sufficient truth in the above to dispose of the suggestion of special returns and to dispel faith in the returns of badly managed banks.

Some Canadian bankers, including one writer, whose words are entitled to great weight, contend that Government inspection has failed in the United States. Under the national Bank Act of that

country there has been a more imperfect system by some of the State Bank Departments. I say imperfect, for under the national system there were employed last year 78 examiners, whose duties required the making of no less than 11,516 inspections each year! For the forty-three years during which the National Bank Act has been in operation there have been established 7,966 banks. Of these 460 have failed, the failures being equal to 5.1 per cent.—of the whole number for the period. External inspection must not be regarded as an unfailing cure; it has its limitations, and the best that can be said of it is that it is a preventative that, if properly applied, will make bank failure almost unknown. An inspector cannot discover an embezzlement; neither can he avoid a rascally bad debt made before his visit, but the progress toward failure is generally slow and in the majority of cases a prudent inspector would, by his advice and authority, save the situation and direct the management into safe channels.

The subject of the establishment of an effective bureau of inspection is one of the utmost importance, for unless it is founded on conservative lines, in which the interests of all sound institutions are carefully conserved, much more harm than benefit would ensue. Bank shareholders are the parties with the major interest at stake, and for the present the subject would be better left to them and to their representatives, in the hope that a satisfactory solution of the problem may be reached.

FOUND RELICS AT OLD FORT.

Two Hunters Visit Ruins Near Bartibogue and Make a Find.

Chatham, Nov. 28.—Peter Gil-mour and A. McLennan returned Monday from a trip to the Bartibogue hunting grounds. While there they paid a visit to the old fort discovered last year, about twenty-eight miles back from the river. They walked from Jack Robertson's lumber camp six miles to the old habitation, and in measuring the walls found them to run a distance of 150 feet north and south, and 125 feet to the west. This was evidently an outer wall for purposes of protection, and was formed of hewed stone, standing four or five feet high in places. Mr. H. H. Stuart, of the Harcourt Superior School, has accepted the editorship of the ADVOCATE and will enter on his duties the first of the new year. Mr Stuart has been a contributor to the ADVOCATE for some time, and has organized Kent county. Besides doing the editorial work, Mr Stuart will take charge of the news service and circulation of both the ADVOCATE and Campbellton Events.

PROHIBITION.

A great revival—a genuine and permanent revival—is apparent in temperance matters in this province. In the year 1905-6 the provincial I. O. G. T. increased fifty per cent. in membership, while the Sons of Temperance and other temperance bodies made substantial gains. Last January the N. B. Temperance Federation was formed to organize the province for prohibition along the lines of the P. E. I. Act. It has several counties organized, and has Rev. E. Tennyson Smith in the field. With the exception of Balmoral parish, all sections of Restigouche Co. recently declared for the Scott Act; and Kent Co. temperance societies have greatly increased in numbers and membership within the last two years and a half. The time seems ripe for the crystallization of this temperance sentiment with law. We believe that the province is ready for prohibition.

Prohibition, however, is not a matter to be hastily decided by mere parliamentary enactments. A majority in favor of it does not necessarily imply that a majority are determined to enforce it. Many who would vote for it, even would lift no finger nor spend one cent to carry it out. Let the government call for a referendum vote on the question, either at the general election or on a special occasion, preferably at the former time. Let the conditions be clearly understood beforehand. Let it be known that if a clear majority of the registered electorate, or a certain per cent. of those who go to the polls, vote for prohibition, that the government will immediately grant the legislation required; and also that, if the necessary vote is not forthcoming, no change will be made. Thus all responsibility will be shifted from the Legislature to the people themselves. What the majority definitely demand neither government nor opposition dare oppose. Let the majority rule. "The voice of the people is the voice of God."

Mr. Fielding's Budget speech, on the 29th ult., introduced the best tariff that has been considered in the House of Commons for years. It is three column arrangement, comprising general, intermediate and British preferential departments. The general tariff is applicable to all countries not entitled to the British preferential schedule. The intermediate plan will be applied to the goods of any country that will give us similar reductions. Thus Canada declares herself ready for complete or partial reciprocity with any country that wishes to treat with us on equal terms. Free trade is the ideal fiscal policy, but it takes two to make a bargain; and the Canadian government wisely declines to continue until such time as Germany ceases her discriminations against Canadian trade. If Germany declines to lower her tariff against us, that is her own business; we can live without her. The British preferences continued; and whenever Britain wants still better terms and is prepared for a mutual preference Canada is ready to agree.

It is announced that the best of the Cobalt mining areas have fallen into the hands of the United Cobalt Exploration Co. of New York—a foreign concern into whose coffers will henceforth go the bulk of the great mineral wealth of the Temiskaming country. This could have been prevented by the Ontario government, as the Cobalt, silver and nickel mines there were discovered at the time the Ontario government railroad was built and were on public property. The title to the lands should have been retained by the public, for the benefit of Ontario and Canada, not merely to swell the fortunes of New York speculators. If the Americans are to be allowed to gobble up everything in sight, Canada may some day find herself in the position of Cuba.

The trial of the four men, who were committed for conspiracy in the London, Ontario election case, will come up at the criminal assizes on January 12th. It is to be hoped that full justice will be meted out. He who uses unfair means to influence an election should, no matter what his party, church or nationality may be, receive the full penalty of the law. The preventive of majority rule by bribery, coercion, or counting out is high treason.

son to the state and should receive the same punishment. Neither party in Canada can show a clean sheet in this matter. Both leaders agree as to the evil in question, and we trust that the present session will find a solution of this, the most difficult problem of democratic communities.

If Britain would remove her embargo on Canadian cattle, which is only an excuse for a protective tariff, and meet Canada half way, we should have a real union of the British empire. British statesmen are apparently letting things drift, neglecting their opportunities to more closely bind the colonies to the mother country. But the coming Imperial Conference may bring the much desired consummation.

There has been a great improvement in the finances of the I. C. R. this year. For 1904-5 the revenue of the road was \$1,725,304 less than the working expenses; but for 1905-6 the revenue was \$61,915 greater than the expenses. The day of deficits, we feel sure, has passed.

The Ontario government road, like our Central railway in New Brunswick, is also paying for itself.

The efforts of the western counties of N. B. to divert the Grand Trunk Pacific to the St. John valley route are evidently doomed to disappointment. Those counties are already fairly well served by the C. P. R. and Central, and in summer have the cheap freight rates of the steamers. What we need is the opening of new country; and this the central route will do. We believe that the new railway will pass through Chipman, thus opening up an area rich with lumber but at present destitute of transportation facilities. St. John trade can be easily forwarded from Chipman by the Central and I. C. R. All the western trade that the C. P. R. can handle will continue to enter St. John by the latter's line, which can be doubly or trebly tracked whenever business demands.

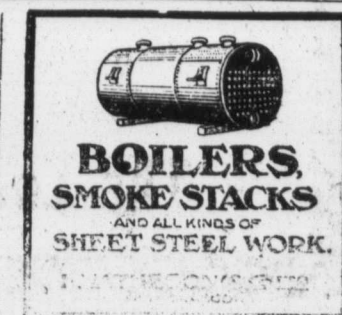

POSTAL DEPARTMENT HAS BIG SURPLUS.

Over a Million to The Good Says Postmaster General.

Great Increases Have Taken Place in the Service and Use of Mails Larger than Ever Before—Letters and Post Cards Sent Out Show Big Increase.

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—As the Postmaster-General already has announced the surplus of the Post Office Department for the year amounts to \$1,011,765, the gross revenue having been \$7,708,142 and expenditure, which includes that of the Yukon and Atlantic districts, \$6,696,376. There has been a considerable expansion in the postal service which is denoted by an increase of 266 post offices, 780 postal note offices, 182 money order offices and 22 savings bank offices. During the year there was a total increase in the miles of mail service of 3,192,421. This expansion has involved an

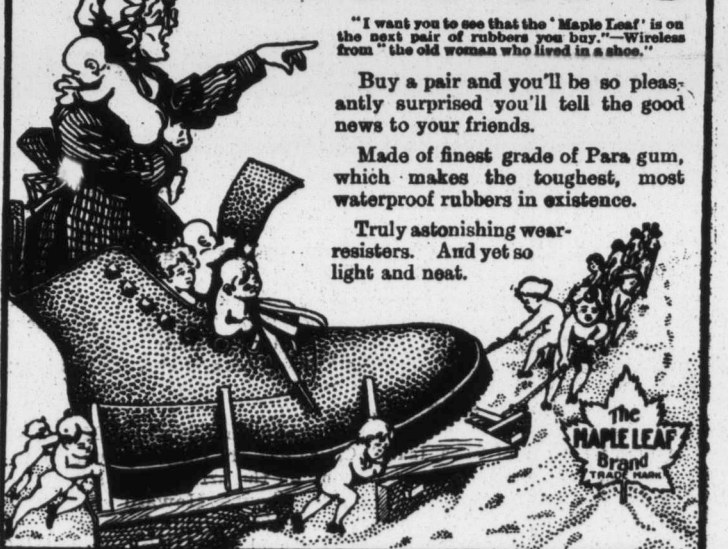

RESCUED THE VICTIM.

Exciting Experience of Automobileists at a Jain Temple.

A thrilling story of how the side slipping of a motor car nearly resulted in a man being roasted alive is told by Ernest Esdale. The incident occurred in Duhila, a village on the road from Delhi to Bombay. The car was being driven slowly past a Jain temple, amid the whooping of natives and the beating of tomtoms.

"At the temple entrance," writes Mr. Esdale, "stood two priests, regarding us with no friendly visage. Bang! And our back tire has burst; a deep rut in the road has caught the wheel too. In a moment we were round and round, and, horror, smash right into the temple door! Alas, we have committed sacrilege and of the worst kind!"

"We set to work to repair the tire, and just as we have finished a heart-rending, ear piercing shriek rings out from the temple inclosure. We rush in, brushing aside two juvenile priests, who try to stop our progress. A crowd of white robed priests stand between us and the inner sanctuary. But the three of us are old football players; the priests are down like ninetails.

"We tear the curtain aside and stand for a moment rapt with horror. There on a rude altar our poor native motor boy is being literally roasted alive. Only a second's pause to take in the situation, and with a rush we are on them.

"Seizing the uplifted knife from the nearest fanatic, we cut the leather strings and lift the fainting sacrifice from the altar. Then we beat the priests off, regain our car and ride away amid a shower of missiles."—Motoring Illustrated.

Popcorn.

The average consumption of popcorn for the last five years has been about 300 carloads for the United States. A great many people ask me what becomes of all the corn that is grown here, and when I tell them that it is all popped and consumed they will hardly believe me. A great many people have the idea it is manufactured into some kind of breakfast food or used as an adulteration of flour. This is not so. In the first place, popcorn is too expensive to admit of its being used for this purpose.

All through the mountain regions there are little towns that are quite large consumers of popcorn. In the south there is but very little corn grown, and this is another very good market. The largest consumers of popcorn are the New England states. Probably three-fourths of all the popcorn grown is consumed east of the Mississippi river, although there is hardly a town in the United States of 50,000 population but will consume one to three carloads a year.—Report of the Kansas Board of Agriculture.

Whisky Made From Rags.

"This whisky," said the chemist, "was made from rags. It was made from a bundle of old shirts and collars. I'll sample it!"

"No, thank you."

"I made the whisky as an experiment," the chemist explained. "Everybody knows that it is possible to convert linen rags into sugar and alcohol, but I doubt if any one has ever actually done the trick before."

"First I immersed the linen in strong sulphuric acid. This dissolved the cellulose, which, assimilating one molecule of water, resolves itself into glucose. I recovered the glucose by neutralizing the excess of acid with salt. Then, by means of the ordinary process of fermentation, alcohol appeared. The final result was this small flask of whisky. I assure you I have tasted worse."—New York Press.

The Dardanelles.

Turkey has on the Dardanelles (ancient Hellespont) probably the most formidable fortification in the world, no other works even approximating them in strength except those at Gibraltar. This narrow channel unites the sea of Marmora with the Grecian archipelago. It is about forty miles in length and varies in width from less than one mile to four miles. No matter what else in Turkey may decay, these works always are kept up-to-date, with guns of the latest pattern, and largest caliber. There is frequent talk of "forcing the Dardanelles" to attack Constantinople, but more than one recognized authority has expressed doubt if the combined navies of the world could succeed in getting a single ship through, so formidable are the batteries.

A Monument For Johns Hopkins.
Baltimore, which received in the Johns Hopkins university and the Johns Hopkins hospital and in other forms \$10,000,000 from its famous philanthropist, is to erect a memorial in his honor. The institutions named are his greatest memorial, but the city, with characteristic southern generosity, feels that it must itself do something to show its appreciation of one whose citizenship and services so greatly benefited the form. The memorial will take has not yet been decided and probably will not be until the entire sum needed for the purpose is raised.

A Scarce Bird.

Eggs of the apteryx, a recently extinct wingless bird, bring very high prices, fine colored specimens fetching as much as \$750 to \$1,000 apiece. The apteryx, or New Zealand kiwi, is a bird which, though still living, is becoming scarcer from day to day, and its final extinction is only a question of years. These kiwi bred very slowly, only one or two very large eggs being laid during the season, and as yet there is no record of the successful raising of young in captivity.

FREDERICTON BOY

IN THE FAR NORTH.

A Long Trip from Dawson City to Fort McPherson by dog train

—Otto Dever one of Party.

The Wide World Magazine for November contained an interesting article of considerable length on the Northwest Mounted Police from the pen of F. R. Wall, who is dealing with the life of the members of the force gives the following account of the experiences of three of the members, one of the trio being Constable Otto Dever, of Fredericton.

Another long-distance run made by the police was the trip to Fort McPherson and back, a distance of nearly a thousand miles, in the dead of winter. It was desired to communicate with Herschel Island, where the police kept a station in the highest latitude, seventy degree north, to prevent whalers from selling liquor to the Indians. There had been frequent reports brought in by the Indians that there was a shorter route through the Rocky Mountains to Fort McPherson than that usually followed from Edmonton down the Mackenzie River. Three of the crack "mushers" of force—Constable Mapley, Dever and Rowley were selected for the long journey, and started out on December 27th, 1904, with two Indian scout out of whom had been over the route nine years before. Each Indian took a team of five dogs, as did each member of the force. The dogs chosen by the police were the private property of Sergeant Smith, "huskies" of Porcupine Creek. So careful had they been trained and bred that they were the pride of all Yukon for speed and staying qualities. Each dog weighed from ninety-six to a hundred and fifteen pounds. As there was no beaten track to follow, it was a case of break trail all the way, so each man wore snow-shoes and each dog was hitched up to a toboggan instead of to a sled. Fur robes, mail, guns, ammunition, and food for man and beast made the whole of the cargo. A tent and stove was among the outfit at the start, but they were "cached" after the first hundred miles out. This run across the top of the world was a succession of arduous experiences, describes by one of the party as "Chute, chute, chute; they climb a mile of mountain standing on end. In shooting the glassed the dogs would be unharnessed, the best route down the mountain would be picked out with the eye, and the toboggan and its precious load would then be sent alone on its downward journey. It is a fact, although it seems well-nigh impossible, that this difficult trip to Fort McPherson and back across a virgin and practically unexplored wilderness, was made without a single accident, except that one of the dogs injured a leg and had to be shot. The party was thirty-eight days in making the Fort, and twenty-five days in coming back to Dawson. They found a feasible "cut-off" through the Rocky Mountains at Seela Pass; and as a result of the expedition it has been decided to annex that part of the Mackenzie district, including Fort McPherson, to the Yukon and to make Dawson the headquarters.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.

(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
