



A certain recklessness was, generally speaking, the characteristic of those undertaking matrimony in war time; a tendency to look two or three times before leaping has taken its place since the fighting ended. A variety of causes combine to account for such a change.

In the first place, life in the army being free from those expenses which

In the first place, life in the army being free from those expenses which weigh most heavily on the civilian, the soldier had little chance to realize the alarming cost of living. Demobilization has, however, given him personal experience of the real difficulty of making both ends meet. The absence of any prospects of an early drop in prices, combined with the problem of house accommodation, is quite enough to account for the shyness which he feels with regard to marriage.

Though practical difficulties are

Though practical difficulties are doubtless largely responsible for reducing the number of hasty marriages, the elimination of certain purely war-time incentives to marry has also much to do with it.

Though life is, at best, an undertain thing, a man's chances of being alive in six months' time are distinctly brighter now than in recent years. As a natural consequence couples are more willing to wait for better days. Again, the man's argument that if he has to be killed the girl he loves may as well get a pension no longer enters into the weighing of pros and cons.

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

HAS HAD SHORT BUT STRENUOUS REIGN.

He Succeeded His Father, Who Was Driven From the Throne on Account of His Misdeeds, and Had to Fight His Parent, Who Tried to Invade the Country.

ULTAN AHMED MIRZA, the Shah-in-Shah, is the greatgrandson of Nazired-Din, the first famous potentate who used frequently to visit Europe, and who was wont to enjoy himself, in se doing, enormously. The present how has never been outside his own dominions. Few kings have ever had a more disturbed career than he since his accession to the throne. Born on January 20, 1898, he succeeded his father on July 17, 1909, when the country summarily ejected his parent from the throne for his innumerable misdeeds, which culminated in the turning of his heavy artillery on the Persian Houses of Parliament.

They can stand a great deal in that country, but a policy of this nature overstepped the mark. So the Shah, his father, withdrew into exile, but his father, withdrew into exile, but he did not retire for long; for no sooner had his son come to the throne than he promptly started an invasion of the country, operating himself along the southern part of the Caspian, and, therefore, to the northeast of Teheran. At the same time, Salared-Dowlah, a well-knowr local feader, started an insurrection in the Tabriz district in the west. After an effort, the son conclusively defeased the father, though it took nearly all the loan of between one and two millions sterling which had just been millions sterling which had just been advanced by the Imperial Bank of Persia for the development of him
