St. Petersburg, April 1.—Further evidence of the vigorous interest the Czar is beginning to take in political and social af-fairs is contained in the announcement of M. Yermoloff, Minister of Agriculture, that the provincial agricultural societies will be formed into a general federation with privileges of intercommunication and of directly petitioning the provincial administrations and the central Government.

Albanians Now in Revolt Big Battle in Balkans

Three Thousand Turkish Troopers Engage in a Sanguinary Contest.

Constantinople, April 1. - Details of the disturbances in North Albania show that the revolt which has broken out there against the reform scheme of the powers is a very serious disturbance. Several thousand armed Albanians surrounded the town of Vuesteeen, on the Mitrovitza-Uskub Railroad, March 29. and demanded the surrender of eleven Servian gendarmes, who had been enlisted in accordance with the reform plans. The governor surrendered the Servians, who were bound and taken to Pristina after having been maltreated. via, who are fleeing towards Servia. A number of the Servian inhabitants and Albanians later surrounded Mitrovitza and serious fighting ensued with the Turkish garrison, consisting of 3,000 troops. The fighting continued until March 30, when the Albanians finally were repulsed, with great loss. Heavy reinforcements have been ordered from the vilayet of Aidin, Asia Minor, and the vilayet of Aidin, Asia Minor, and other places, to suppress the rebellion.

Famous Brigand Free.

Palermo, Italy, April 1.—The famous brigand, Varsalona, who recently escaped, broke into local Government offices and stole 50 blank passports. These were filled in so that Varsalona, his wife, three nephews, two nieces and 20 members of his band could travel on coasting steamers to Naples, and thence to Buenos Ayres or to New York.

It is uncertain to which port they have gone. One thousand men arrested from time to time for assisting the brigands have been released.

Sofia, Bulgaria, April 1.-The Macelonia committee announces that a revolutionary band of thirty-one men and the inhabitants of the village of Abalitche, near Istib, have been massacred by Bashi-Bazouks. The band, it is added, was surrounded in the village. After ten hours' fighting the village was completely razed and burned. All the inhabitants were massacred. The Turkish losses are reported to have been even greater than those on the other side.

According to advices received from Milrovitza, a town in European Turbands of Albanians have surrounded that town and are demanding the removal of the Russian consul. 

WAS OPPOSED BY OPPOSITION

The Commission Will Organize Immediately and May Take Evidence Early Next Week.

[From Our Own Reporter.] Toronto, March 31.-The Ontario Government today emerged triumphantly from the combat which it has waged for three weeks against the stupid and stubborn policy of obstruction indulged in by the Opposition. The efforts of the Conservative speakers to wear it down by sheer weight of inane and inconclusive speeches and threadbare arguments failed utterly of their object, and the Government carried its every point. Four amendments introduced by the Opposition were weighed and found wanting, and even the Opposition leader ac-knowledged their futility by receding from his expressed determination to place the House on record on every phase of the Gamey question. The Premier's address in support of his motion to adjourn was a short but convincing one, and the cogent reasons advanced by him in favor of the proposal were of a nature which will meet with the approval of every intelligent citizen of the Province. Mr. Whitney's reply was an eminently characteristic one, in his well-known superlative style. The Government's majority was five. Adam Beck, member tor London, was not in attendance in the House, and his vote was paired with that of Mr. Stock.

When the orders of the day were reached Mr. Carscallen again introduced the following amendment to the Attorney-General's bill respecting evidence, which came up for its third reading, and which he read just before adjournment on Monday:
"That notwithstanding anything in

the said commission contained or expressed, the said commissioners therein named shall not make or report any finding or decision of fact, but shail report all proceedings had or taken in connection with the inquiry and investigation directed by the said commission, together with all the evidence given or tendered before them." This clause, said Mr. Carscallen, should be added to the bill. The investigation would not be complete without it, and it would also be misdirected. The commission as issued to the judges was ultra vires, and the

House must concede that the Government had no power to direct the Lieutenant-Governor or even request him to issue a commission giving powers greater than the law prescribed. All the authority they had was to issue a commission simply directing that ar inquiry be made into the charges. The law provided that the Legislative Assembly, upon the evidence taken by the commissioners, shall take such action as it sees fit, and it was the only tribunal that could legally pass judgment. The object of the amendment therefore, was to provide that the commissioners shall not decide one way or the other, but shall simply hear the evidence. As the House was the ultimate tribunal, the members should not be burdened with an expression opinion from the commissioners. view of the law governing the case i would be highly improper for them to bring in any verdict, and it was make this clear that the amendment

was introduced. In the instructions to the commissioners, Mr. Carscallen said he objected to the words "and report the result of the investigation." That was wholly unauthorized, as was also the proposal to confer high court privileges on the judges.

Mr. Carscallen further challenged the Attorney-General to show anything in the statutes that permitted the commissioners to bring in a finding, and for this reason it was manifestly ultra vires to bestow powers upon them when there was no provision in the statutes enabling them to do so The evidence given before the commission day by day, added Mr. Carscallen, should be transmitted to the House, and he hoped that care would be taken to see that this was done. 


