CARS SMASHED.

JACKSON, Mich., Oct. 10.—An accident occurred Wednesday evening on the Air Line division of the Lake Shore Railway, resulting in the wreck of two engines and the demolition of seven freight cars, but without serious injury to any person. The Hillsdale accommodation, south bound, left the Lake Shore depot on schedule time, but without orders. On the same track, northward bound, was the way freight from Fort Wayne, running on orders to reach Jackson regardless of all other trains. The two trains met just east of Greenvoed venue, while going at the rate of ten miles an hour, piling up seven cars in a splintered pyramid, and ditching both engines. The train hands jumped and escaped without serious injury.

The Double Murder at Cumberland.

CUMBERLAND, Ont., Oct. 10.—The terrible murder case is still the absorbing topic of conversation here. An inquest on the bodies of the McGonigle girls was commenced last night. Dr. Wm. Ferguson gave the result of his medical examination. The bodies, he said, bore an unistakable evidence of the horrible crime. Both girls had been outraged and had come to death by strangulation. A witness swore that he saw the prisoner, Will Gamble, following the girls along the path which led to their home about 5 o'clock. A farmer named Dalrymple heard cries of 'murder' and made an ineffectual search of the spot whence they came.



A correspondent signing himself "Dreamer" writes us an interesting letter regarding the Ontario Agricultural College

The great demand upon our space precludes the publication of "Dreamer's" letter in full, but some of his suggestions are well worthy the attention of wide-swake mem. He proposes, in brief, that there shall be one term—from Oct. I till March 31: The students shall spend all this time in instruction and study, and not, as at present, the half of every day in labor. There shall be only three days' vacation at Christmas. No tuition fee shall be charged and there shall be no entrance examination. During this term a young man not from a Canadian farm shall not be found there. Alers shall be at once be passed out. There shall be

shall at once be passed out. There shall be
one summer term—from April 1 to Oct. 1.
Young men from towns and from abroad
shall be admitted. The whole of the days


