BERLIN, April 2.—Two years ago Bavaria and Wurtemberg fixed the mean time exactly one hour ahead of the Greenwich exactly one hour ahead of the Greenwich time. On Friday at midnight Central European time was introduced throughout the empire. The noon line passes through Stargard and Goerlitz, each just 15° east of Greenwich. All the clocks in public buildings in Germany were set and the railway and other time tables were altered in harmony with the change.

MADRID, April 2.—The speech from the throne to be read at the opening of the new throne to be read at the opening of the new Cortes will announce that the long-standing deficit of 70,000,000 pesetas has been abolished through the honest and painstaking revision of the estimates and through the opening of new sources of revenue. The policy of retreechment saves 30,000,000 pesetas, and the remaining 40,000,000 comes from new taxes or the increased productiveness of old taxes. gratitude and reverence the founder of the
empire, and they all unite in the wish that
he be long preserved to the nation. Among

Prince Bismarck was never before so effusively honored as at Freiderichsruhe yesterday. The exceptional enthusiasm of demonstration was a surprise even to those who arranged the celebration. The petty persecution implied in the police prohibition of a torchlight procession in persecution implied in the police prohibition of a torchlight procession in Friederichsruhe on Good Frieday evening was followed at once by a reaction in Bismarck's favor throughout the empire. The most notable feature of the notable demonstration was the reception of the Schleswig-Holstein deputation. The original plan was that only a few delegates should go to Friederichsruhe from Kiel and express to the Prince the reverence and love of the people of the two provinces. At the last moment, however, thousands gathered to swell the modest deputation to an uncontrollable crowd of Bismarck shouters, and tifey swept down upon the Prince's to swell the modest deputation to an uncontrollable crowd of Bismarck shouters,

retreat like a victorious army. Every time
he dropped into the dialect of the common
people during his speech there was a great
shout of appreciation, and when he
closed every man and woman cheered,

Welt," and all joined in the anthem.
Bismarck's feelings overcame him. With
eyes full of tears he turned to those nearest
him, embraced and kissed them, and
thanked them repeatedly for the honors
they had shown him.

WORK AND WAGES.

No Settlement of the New York Cutters' Strike.

Trouble on the Chicago and Rock Island

New York, April 2.—Yesterday was the seventh day of the lockout of clothing cutters, and there are no signs of a settlement. Justice Lawrence, of the Supreme Court, issued another temporary injunction against the American Federation of Labor and the officers of the United Garment Workers of America, restraining them from issuing any circulars against or inciting a boycott of the firms who appear as complainants.

A mass meeting of the United Brotherhood of Tailors was held to consider the advisability of declaring a sympathetic strike. Among the speakers was President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor. A resolution was adopted pledging moral and financial support to the locked-out cutters, and promising that if called upon by the cutters and garment workers to quit work the tailors belonging to the brotherhood would close.

PEGELA, Ill., April 2.—Owing to the discharge of four engineers, five firement and six switchmen by the officers of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, the balance of the switching force in this city struck. It is said the Kuights of Labor Clothing Cutters' Union will take the places of the locked-out men, whatever their officers might say.

New York, April 3.—As a result of the clothing cutters' lockout in this city one of the most important labor movements of recent years is on foot. This is an effort to patch up the differences that have long existed between the Kinghte of Labor and the American Federation of Labor. The successive appeals to the courts show that the old methods of strike and boycott are becoming ineffectual in view of the present factional quarrels existing between the different labor organizations.

WHERE WILL IT BE?

Various Opinions as to the Location of the Free Library.

Some Prefer the City Hall, Some the Mechanics' Institute, Some a New Building and Some None at All.

There seems to be much diversity of opinion as to the most desirable location of the free library. Some think the City Hall the best place, some the Mechanics' Institute, and others an entirely new building, as favored by the Free Library Board. In conversation with a number of citizens, the following opinions were elicited:

Col. Lewis objected to using the City Hall, on the ground that the noise from Richmond street and the market would disturb persons while reading. He favored

Richmond street and the markes would disturb persons while reading. He favored erecting a new building.

Dr. J. B. Campbell also thought the noise would be too great, and favored using the institute.

A. B. Powell was not in favor of the proposal to use the City Hall.

J. C. Trebliccek would not favor utilizing the City Hall. The Mechanics' Institute was good enough.

H. T. Smith thought the Mechanics' Institute was the proper place.

H. T. Smith thought the Mechanics Institute was the proper place.
Ald. Chas. Taylor said he could not favor using the City Hall.
John Campbell had not considered the matter carefully, but would not feel inclined to place the library in the City Hall.
W. H. Trebilcock thought the City Hall.

was the proper place.

A. D. Holman favored establishing the free library in the City Hall.

A. C. Stewart would put it in the City

A. C. Stewart would put the library in either the City Hall or Mechanics' Institute, whichever could be utilized in the best interests of the citizens financially.

School Trustee John Turner thought the

best interests of the citizens financially. School Trustee John Turner thought the City Hall could be used.

Edmund Meredith—I think a new building is preferable. You see we would lose all the rental of the City Hall and the Mechanics' Institute would cost a great deal to buy it and put it in shape.

Sheriff Glass—At first sight the City Hall scheme seems to be the more immediately available place, and it would not be a very heavy draft on the funds of the city. The City Hall would be very central, and as a business man I think it would be very central and accessable for all readers. The public offices would he more convenient for the public if placed on the lower floor.

Ald. Coo—We want a free library if we can afford it, and we can't afford a \$30,000 scheme just at present. The loss in rents, if the City Hall was used, Mr. Coo placed at \$30,000. He favored the renting of some place and starting on a small scale; then if it took well put up a building that would be a credit to the city, or build a new modern City Hall combining all.

R. K. Cowan — I was very favorably impressed with the City Hall scheme, but on figuring it up I found it would cost about as much as a new building. How-

on figuring it up I found it would cost about as much as a new building. However, I believe we are safe in leaving the question in the hands of the Free Library Board.

Board.
Governor Kelly, county jail—For my part I think the whole thing a bill of expense and the cost of keeping it up will come from the working classes while not in 50 of the working class will patronize it. However, I think the City Hall would be the best place for it and the least expensive.

High Constable Schram—If the City Hall would answer for the purpose or if the Mechanics' Institute would answer for the purpose, I can't see why either one or the other could not be utilized, providing it would be cheaper than a new building. I don't think it would be advisable to put up a \$30,000 building.

Wm. Fletcher—I don't think anyone but ratepayers should be allowed to vote on these bylaws. It's all very well to talk about giving things free, but someone has got to pay for them. If I had a vote on the question to morrow I would not cast it.

R. H. Dignan—A new building is what is wanted. As far as the City Hall scheme is concerned, I don't think it practical.

Thomas W. Scandrett—The only drawback to a new building is the expense, and the city is not any too well situated as regards money matters just now. I would favor the Mechanics' Institute if suitable terms can be obtained.

Frank Love—I am in favor of a new building, and I think the site selected is the proper one.

R. Hobbs—I think the City Hall is the pensive.
High Constable Schram—If the City Hall

R. Hobbs-I think the City Hall is the best place for the free library. It is a building we have to maintain all the year round and it is only used four or five times

-and then for a ball.

I am glad to tell you that the Sunday afternoon meetings, under the auspices of the permanent committee of the Social Problems Conference, are proving entirely successful. The forum hall, at he corner of Yonge and Gerrard streets, in which the meetings are held, is an exceedingly good place for the purpose, being centrally situated for the residential districts, on a main thoroughfare, and being a good ground floor room, not too large and not too expensive. The meetings have been well reported in the daily papers every week, which is an important element of success. We take up a collection every afternoon, and have so far paid expenses, with something over for a "rainy day"—an expression which may be taken with exact literalness. Besides some newspaper advertising, we have arreased with the engradage of the hall treased. [Specially Communicated.]

Besides some newspaper advertising, we have arranged with the caretaker of the hall to stretch over the large entrance, every Saturday and Sunday, a big cotton sign bearing this legend: "Social problems meeting here at 3 c'clock Sunday afternoon."

The meeting on March 26 was the third of the series, and the attendance was larger than on any previous Sunday. We are convinced that the only way to keep up the interest and attendance at a series of social reform meetings is to have a variety of topics from a wide choice of speakers. So lar the speakers of the day, those who deliver the main address and close the discussion, have been ministers of the Gospel. One of them was a thorough-going Socialist, and gave a clear and well-put exposition of Socialism. I need hardly tell you that single tax keeps cropping up in the discussions, and land monopoly comes in for a share of the hard knocks that are liberally bestowed on monopoly and other forms of selfishness and greed.

Last Sunday we had a break in the Last Sunday we had a break in the succession of reverend gentlemen. Alfred F. Jury gave an address on "Cumulative voting; its ethical and practical aspects." It is a most timely subject just now. After that we are to have a straight single tax address from some of us, and we hope also to have an address from Joseph Tait, M.L.A., on co-operation — a matter on which he has had experience.

One object we had in commencing these meetings, even at the fag-end of the winter season, was to gather data for next season. By running six or eight meetings now, we

By running six or eight meetings now, we could not lose much, and would be in a good position to form a judgment as to the prospects for running such meetings all though next winter. It will certainly be done; and it is not too soon to be looking forward to it now. One regular attendant at the meetings told me laughingly that although the addresses of the ministers were something like sermons, one had the privilege of being able to get up and talk back to them, which could not be done in church. We do not have any devotional exercises; but there is a piano in the hall, and a young lady plays a piece of sacred

exercises; but there is a piano in the hall, and a young lady plays a piece of sacred music at the opening and another whilst the collection is being taken up. We have had valuable hints from our friends at Kingston, who have successfully conducted such meetings for two years back.

CHMULATIVE VOTING.

FARMERS AND THE TARIFF.

(Monetary Times.)

If the farmers, breaking loose from parties, take a stand on the tariff question their influence will not be inconsiderable. Acting in their capacity of Patrons of Industry, they make it plain to the Government that they desire the removal of the duties on coal oil, binder twine, corn and fencing wire. Fencing wire, binder twine and corn are materials which aid the products of the farm; coal oil is an article of personal consumption. The first three occupy nearly the same place that raw materials do in the factory, and may fairly claim the same exceptional treatment. The coal oil, too, has some affinity to the old English tax on windows, and must be classed as obnoxious. Its total repeal involves other considerations; it cannot bergarded as standing on the same ground as the other three articles. The Patrons cannot be said to have made any unreasonable demand, though that about coal oil comes nearest to this description. The farmers have it in their power to effect considerable changes in the tariff, if they agree among themselves as to what they want. 

On that date it is expected that the Ulster Orangemen will begin to riot, and the House of Lords will reject the bill. Then there will be an autumn session to pass the bill through the House of Commons a second time, as well as to complete the other parts of the Government programme. These are the present calculations of Gladstone's supporters.

A London correspondent cables: "A gloriously beautiful Easter season throughout Europe has for the moment banished the public contentions which have brought the affairs of at least three great nations to an acute if not critical stage. The brightest smiles of a Canadian June are not more charming than the face of nature during the past few days on this side of the Atlantic. All Europe is holidaynaking, and not for another two or three days will the game of politics, interrupted at a serious moment, be renewed with added zest. Then in these islands at least we shall see some strange moves. The opposition to the Gladstone Government will open its militant campaign on Tuesday. The opinion is now broadcast that, whatever the Tory leaders may say publicly, they tacitly approve at heart the plan of violent resistance to the home rule enactments."

William has recently been giving a great deal of personal attention to the sctions of these legues, and has had agents appointed to attend all the sessions of the different organizations, with instructions to send himfull telegraphic reports of the proceedings. The feeling which the leagues entertain for Bismarck seems to be reciprocal. The old statesman is reported to have expressed himself as being in full sympathy with the agitation.



I am impressed with the magnitude and age of this tremendous pile and with the desolation that surrounds it. Here are forgotten tombs and neglected temples of broken idols. I have crept into the dark heart of this old tomb, and have measured the king's chamber, the queen's chamber and the coffer in the king's chamber.
