

Wheat ranged from 92 to \$1, according to quality. Oats soid at 93 and as high as 96 i cents. Peas were steady at 90 to 93 cents, and beans \$1 to \$115. Hay was a little cheaper, running from \$2 to 90 cents, and beans \$1 to \$115. Hay was a little cheaper, running from \$3 50 to \$8 50. The stands usually occupied by flower dealers were bare and deserted, and only about a third of the usual number of women dealers huddled and shivered on the exposed benches on the west side of the market house. Sales were dull and prices unchanged in poultry, butter and eggs. Eighteen to 20 cents a dozen was asked for hen fruit, from 30 to 50 cents a pair for the hen itself, and butter ruled at 25 cents. Turkeys sold at 8 and 9 cents a pound, or from 60 cents to \$1 25 apiece. The supply of potatoes about equaled the demand, sales being made at 70 to 85 cents. Apples were scarce, and what were shown were of poor quality and high priced. As high as \$1 25 a bag was asked. The noble army of butchers were conspicuous for their numbers and the amount of meat in hand. The prices were much the same, and the only relief to monotony was the tall figure of Medical Health Officer Hutchinson as he stepped from wagen to wagen on the lookout for diseased meat. 
