

Caused in London by the Steamship Disaster.

A Survivor Describes the Sinking of the Drummond Castle.

Too Sudden to Lower the Boats-Women and Children in Large Numbers

HOW THE STEAMER WAS LOST. Brest, France, June 18.—The details, which are slowly being obtained of the loss of the Castle Liner, Drummond Castle, Capt. N. W. Pierce, bound from Cape Town to London, with 247 souls, 144 passengers and 103 officers and men, early yesterday afternoon show that the disaster was probably the most sudden on record of its kind. It is now established beyond ably the most sudden on record of its kind. It is now established beyond doubt, that the steamer was going at full speed shortly before midnight on Tuesday, June 16, heading around Finisterre, from the Bay of Biscay, and making for the Chops of the British Channel. Off Finisterre, is the Island of Ushant, about 20 miles northeast of this port, one of a group northeast of this port, one of a group of some 30 islands, the largest of which are Ushant, Molene, Leconquet, and St. Michael. The Drummond Castle, to steer a safe course, should have been away outside of Ushant, upon which island is a lighthouse and signal station. But for some reason not satisfactorily explained, the steamship headed inside of Ushant. Between that point and the mainland of France is a line of islands, including Molene and Leconquet, and connected by ridges of rock with each other. At different places there are passages through which vessels can pass; but between Ushant and Molene, the latter island being about half way to the main-land, is a sunken reef of rocks with deep water on both sides of it, and covered in parts even at the lowest tides. It was on this ridge, it is now established, that the Drummond Castle struck while

GOING AT FULL SPEED. As intimated in these dispatches yesterday, the steamer must have struck so as to tear a big rent in her bottom from stem to stern, thus fill-ing all her water-tight compartments ing all her water-tight compartments almost immediately and sending her to the bottom on the other side of the reef in about three minutes. The Drummond Castle was well equipped, built in 1881 at Glasgow, was about 2,350 tons burden, and 365 feet long. She was owned by Sir Donald Currie & Co., a firm noted for the careful manner in which its vessels are equipped and constructed. Yet only two boats were lowered after the Castle liner struck. One of these cansized liner struck. One of these capsized, and only three men were saved out of the 247 people on board. And this in spite of the fact that the British secceeded in reaching Molene Island. About ten bodies have already been recovered off Ushant, but further details of the wreck are expected when tugs which left here yesterday for Ushant return.

THE SURVIVOR'S STORY. Marquardt, one of the survivors, has and confirmed made a statement in which he says that Capt. Pierce had just gone to his cabin for a brief rest, when there was a terrible shock, which caused the Drummond Castle to quiver as if shaken by a dynamite explosion. This was followed by a horrible grating, rasping sound, the noise of in-rushing water, the cries of the passengers, who sprang from their berths in terror, and the sharp words of command from the officers on the deck, who ordered out all hands to clear away the boats for lowering. But the rents in the stricken steamer were so wide and deep that but few of the passengers had time to scramble upon deck before she gave two or three heavy rolls, an awful lurch, accompanied by some interior explosions, and then she sank, with a moaning, hissing sound, beneath the angry waves which were breaking mercilessly over her. Marquardt, contrary to the reports of the two seaman of the Drummond Castle, who were rescued, said that the steamship went down so suddenly that there was no time even to launch one boat, much less two, and that even if a boat had been launched, the seas were running so heavy and in such rapid succession, a peculiarity of the seas on that part of the French

The Vote Stood 816 to 105 for the Gold Standard-Immense Crowd.

St. Louis, Mo., June 18.-The day broke bright and clear for the third and probably final day of the Republican convention. 


