MANY MINERS SUFFOCATED. Melbourne, Sept. 13.-Fire has been discovered in the Broken Hill mine, between Jamison's and the Broad Ribb's shafts. Two hundred men, who were engaged in efforts to extinguish the flames, were overcome by the poisonous fumes. Fifty have been brought to the surface and of these three are dead. Efforts to subdue the fire are continued from the top of the mine.
