The city of London, the London cerned, will be the paying over of the Street Railway Company, Hunt Bros., \$650 agreed upon closing of the west end of Bathurst when the street was closed the city cut off all means of entering a lot owned by the G. T. R. on the north side of Bathurst street, running alongside the river and abutting the company's embankment.

It was to accommodote the street railway that the street was closed. The company wanted to build an addition to its power plant, and erect extra barns, and offered to pay the city the valuation which the assessment commissioner should put on the ground.

The sum agreed upon was \$650, and rumor says it has not as yet been paid, though the deal is a couple of years old.

known theatrical managers in the country. He was born in New York pimples and sores as they ever were. and made his first appearance on the stage with a minstrel troupe at the age of nine years. A few years later he became a clown and for fifteen years he was paintedface funmaker in the circus ring. But it was as a comic singer that Tony Pastor made his greatest successes. He commenced his career as a singer of comic songs in 1861 and was so successful that in four years he had amassed enough money to get control

of a music hall. For ten years he was manager of a music hall on the Bowery. In 1875 he opened the Metropolitan Theatre as Tony Pastor's Theatre, securing such stars as Lillian Russell, Nat Goodwin, Francis Wilson, May Irwin and others in their first successes. In 1881 he opened the Tony Pastor Theatre in Fourteenth street, next to Tammany Hall, and presided over it up to the time of his illness

His loss to the theatrical profession from a sentimental viewpoint will be a great one. For many years he was engaged in a secret system of charity, whereby he paid a small sum each week to some of the actors who helped him to his success and who are now poor. He would never tell who these pensioners were.






