### CABINET NEW

Chancellor Bonar Law May Leave Ministry If Party's Rank and File Disapprove of the New War Policy Announced by Premier.

London, Nov. 14.—Premier Lloyd George explained to the House of Commons today that the Inter-Aliled Council, the establishment of which was arranged for at the recent conference of British, French and Italian representatives, would have no extensive power. He said final decision in regard to the matters of strategy and the distribution and movement of armies would rest with the several governments of the Allies. The new council, Mr. Lloyd George said, would be charged with the duty of surveying continuously the field of operations as a whole in the light of information derived from all the governments and staffs, and also of co-ordination plans and making plans of its own, if necessary, for the better conduct of the war.

Looseness of Election Act Coming Home to Londoners Who Must Insure for Themselves by Seeing That the Enumerator Has Recorded Names.

The manner in which a Conservative Government en deavored to "frame" itself into power by means of the most puzzling election act ever perpetrated is coming home to Londoners.

Richard Bayly, returning officer for the electoral district, himself a lifelong Conservative, has not yet announced his list of 76 enumerators, whose duty it will be to compile a new voters' list, solely by means of whatever old lists they choose to make use of, together with a doorto-door canvass of the city.

There will be an enumerator for every subdivision in the city. No time is stipulated as to when these enumerators commence work. The matter rests entirely with the enumerator. The only rule that governs the enumerator is that he shall have his list prepared and posted fifteen days before election. He may use as the basis of his list any part of any provincial or municipal list in force, or last in force, applicable to his poll. He adds those qualified, including women, and scrikes off those disqualified.

The enumerator continues to operate largely to himself. He completes, dates "at his place of residence," and signs his completed copies of the list fifteen days before voting day. Then he must post up in two places, one of them being "a conspicuous place outside and adjoining the main entrance to such polling station" (where December winds and storms may take a hand in the election) and the other place the postoffice-76 documents all in a

The enumerator must send a third copy to the chairman of the voters' registration board, and also give copies to each candidate in the election. After that the enumerator has nothing whatever to do with the list.

Every citizen aspiring to a vote must see that his or her name is on the list. If the name is not on the list, the elector must forthwith appeal, or if absent some elector

## ITALIAN LINE STILL HOLDING **AGAINST HEAVY** TEUTON DRIVE

Hun Battalions Badly Cut Up When Crossing the River-Enemy on Four Fronts.

Italian Headquarters in Italy. Tuesday, Nov. 13—(By the Associated Press)—The Piave line still helds in the main against heavy and continuous artillery fire from the eastern bank and the cforts of the Austro-Germans to cross the stream. These attacks have not taken the special of the provided of a general movement, but several battalions crossed the river on pontoons near Zenson. The Italian artillery concentrated its fire on the raiding parties, either destroying them in mid-stream or pushing them back on the river bank. The fighting here was desperate and sangulsary. Men who have returned from the batteries along the Piave says the German fire is extremely heavy but from middle-calibre guns.

The German Plan

Chief attention is now directed towards the eastern sector of the Trentino front, where it runs across the Aslago plateau to the upper Plave River. The enemy is making preparations there which are either a diversion or a prelude to a heavy attack, with the evident purpose of getting down into the valley toward Bassano and the plains below, thus separating the Italian army on the Trentino from that on the Plave.

On Four Fronts.

Reports indicate that the enemy is operating on four main fronts. ## KERENSKY FORCES **COMPLETE VICTORS** IS LATEST REPORT OF RUSS STRUGGLE

Korniloff and Kaledines Said To Be With the Premier, Who Is Reported In Control of Entire Capital-Red Guard Destroyed.

Stockholm, Nov. 14.-Premier Kerensky has entered Petrograd, according to a dispatch received from the correspondent of the Swedish News Agency at Haparanda, on the Russian border.

ALL RUSSIA WITH KERENSKY.

London, Nov. 14 .- The Finnish Telegram Bureau says the whole of Russia, except a small part of Petrograd, is now in the hands of the provisional government.

The provisional Russian government referred to in the foregoing is the government of Premier Kerensky, which the Bolsheviki attempted to overthrow.

CAPTURES ENTIRE CITY.

London, Nov. 14.—Premier Kerensky is now in Petrograd, and has taken virtually the entire city, the announcement of the Finnish Telegram Bureau says.

RED GUARD DESTROYED.

London, Nov. 14.—According to these advices, which were received in a cablegram filed at Stockholm at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon Premier Kerensky defeated the Bolshevíki at Tserskoe Selo. The Cossacks are reported to have destroyed the Red Guard. The telegraph lines are now in M. Kerensky's hands, the Telegram Bureau reports.

CONFLICTING REPORTS.

Near Zenson on the Plave, about twenty miles northeast of Venice, the invaders have succeeded in crossing the river in boats, but were repulsed in an attempt ta debouch from the brildgehead they had constructed.

The Austro-Germans attacked in force and gained some defences, only to be thrown back by the force of Italian counter-attacks. Berlings ays that Mont Longara has been captured, but Rome reports officially that the position here has been held against Teuton efforts. At Canove, west of Aslago, an Italian counter-thrust repelled the invaders and resulted in the liberation of Italian prisoners.

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



Duncan Ross Tells the West Middlesex Electors of Political Trickery.

CARADOC, Nov. 18.—That opposition to Duncan Ross in West Middlesex in the form of an Independent candidate is not likely to develop was indicated at a largely attended meeting in the Cowan school on the 9th concession of Caradoc Township tonight. Constituents in this section of the riding, misunderstanding their candidate's action in failing to vote with Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the military service bill, were, it was rumored, prepared to nominate another mar. That this will not take place was indicated when one of the men who had been a prime mover in drafting a resolution urging the appointment of a candidate addressed the meeting saying that he was perfectly satisfied with Mr. Ross' views and was confident that he would faithfully represent them. Explains Stand.

Mr. Ross, addressing the meeting, explained once more that he had supported the military service bill because it was such a marked improvement on the act then in the statutes, which gave unlimited power to the Government. Sir Wilfrid, he explained, had been bound by a promise to his constituents in 1911 that he would never support any conscription measure unless the measure were first submitted to the people.

measure were first submitted to the people.

The prospective candidate asserted that when the bill was first brought down in the House he went to his leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to consult him on his attitude.

To him he made the same statements that he was now making to his constituents, pointing out the superfority of the new act to the old. Sir Wilfrid said "Duncan, you do what you think is right. If you favor it I entirely approve. I am pledged to my people."

Military Service.

Explaining his stand on the military service question, Mr. Ross read to the electors several sections of the old act, by which men could be conscripted in event of an emergency which was defined as "war, invasion, riot or insurrection, real or apprehended." It provided for calling up all men between the ages of 18 and 60 except those exemptied by law. In the event of an invasion every man cabable of bearing arms could be called up. ## BRIDGE COLLAPSE RECALLS ROMANCE OF NORTHWEST



The suspension bridge constructed by the Hagwilget Indians across the Bulkley River in Central British Columbia has collapsed and now floats in the waters of Hagwilget Canyon, held by the cables on which it was suspended for more than twenty years. The news will be received with regret by engineers in all parts of the world. This frail structure was regarded as a remarkable example of Indian skill in bridge building and had been a subject of comment in many engineering magazines, while it was also regarded as one of the many features of interest seen from the trains of the Grand Trunk Pacific line. Conceived in the mind of a native and built by his fellow tribesmen, the true principles of the modern suspen-

Conceived in the mind of a native and built by his fellow tribesmen, the true principles of the modern suspension bridge were carried into the construction work. The bridge was the third attempt to get a permanent crossing over the Bulkley River, the first two bridges having been swept away by high water. When the Indians built this bridge they had no modern tools, nor did they have nalls, spikes or bolts, wooden spikes and telegraph wire being used at joints. The bridge had a span of 146 feet and was 10 feet wide.

Interwoven with the story of the Indian bridge is a romance of the Northwest. The telegraph wire used in its construction was discovered by the Indians at a point some eight hundred miles west of Edmonton and 200 miles inland from the Pacific Coast, where it had been hidden for many years. This is how it happened: Between the date of the unsuccessful and the day of the successful attempts to lay a submarine cable which would connect New York and London, a plan was put forth for an overland telegraph line from New York to St. Petersburg. The close of the Civil War found the country full of men of mettle. Some of the old campaigners were selected and sent to work.

In the meantime, while these heroic explorers were working away in the wilderness, London and New York were coupled up by the submarine cable. Instantly, all interest in the overland disappeared, as the need of the line no longer existed. Away out on the Northern corner of this continent there is a line of fifty-year-old telegraph poles. It is easy to understand and appreciate the disappointment of these brave fellows who had fought the good fight in sun and rain for over a year and a half, only to be told to guit. And that is how they happened to leave the

And that is how they happened to leave the telegraph wire used in the bridge in a cache on the river, along whose banks the Grand Trunk Pacific transcontinental trains are now travelling. When this enthusiastic band of workers went home, the "slient places" fell asleep again, and the younger generation forgot. After forty years more of unbroken sleep, other telegraph builders blazed the trail, planting poles and stringing wires. What was regarded as a worthless wilderness was hailed as the new Empire of the North, teeming with natural riches. This time they succeeded, for the men were on the payroll of the Grand Trunk Pacific Telegraph Company, and the wires follow the right-of-way of Canada's new line. This modern successor of the overland has become an important factor in handling the telegraph business of a large section of the continent. of a large section of the continent.

## MANSLAUGHTER CASE OPENS AT HAMILTON; DEATH ROOM SCENE PRESENTED IN COURT

Quartet Plead Not Guilty to Having Caused McRobbie's Death.

Hamilton, Nov. 14.—Charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Dr. McRobbie, well-known Hamilton physician, on August 19, Harry Smith, J. J. McAuliffe, Walter Scott and Herbert Asseltine, were placed on trial today. The quartet pleaded not guilty. The morning was ccupied hearing the evidence of William Perry, a draughtsman, who made blueprints of the scene of the tragedy;

blueprints of the scene of the tragedy; witnesses who saw the prisoners and Dr. McRobbie together on the day of his death and Wm. Bell, an employee of the Crescent Oil Company, on whose premises McRobbie was found dying.

Bell's Story.

Bell told of being called on Sunday by Asseltine to the Crescent Oil office, where he discovered McRobbie lying unconscious in a pool of blood. Smith, manager of the company, and Walter Scott, an architect, were lying sound asleep nearby. McAu'lliffe was later discovered helplessly drunk in the yard in the rear of the building. Bell called for a physician, and then accompanied the police to the home of Smith, who had departed in the meantime. Smith, he said, was in a dazed condition when detectives placed him under arrest Bell was still on the stand undergoing cross-examination when the noon adjournment was reached.

The trial is attracting more than
