House of Commons Draped In Black, Flags Half-Masted on Opening of Second Session of Canada's Thirteenth Parliament

Governor-General in Speech From the Throne Declares That Legislative Bills Embodying Civil Service Reform, New Electoral Laws, Prohibition Measures, Revised Pensions and Others L. sking to Improvement of Conditions Will Be Submitted t Present Session.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.- The second session of the 13th Parliament assembled at 3 o'clock this afternoon in a heavily-draped House in black. The opening ras shorn of all pomp and display and was of comparatively short duration. The black rod summoned the Commons to the Senate chamber, and there his excellency the governor-general delivered the speech from the throne in English and French. The speech thanked God for victory of the Allied arms and prayed that out of that victory may come lasting peace and a happy period of reconstruction.

The speech also mourned the death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and extended the deepest sympathy to the one he left behind.

Legislation embodying civil service reform, new electoral laws prohibition measures, revised pensions, etc., are to be announced The great front door of the Victoria museum is heavily draped Manitoba Legislative Assemwith purple and black, as also are the stairways and the railings overhead within the buildings. The chamber itself is in deep mourning, and there is a vacant chair to the left of the speaker which men are now wondering how to fill. On Thursday next, from both sides of the House, will rise tributes to the memory of the man who for over 40 years has been in Parliament. When the legislators leave they will bring Sir Wilfrid in, and for a day and two nights he will silently hold state while the multitude of mourners come and go. The chamber will be almost completely filled with flowers.

Following the speech from the chrone, members of the Commons, headed by the speaker, returned to the House. But the proceedings here were brief. Formal motions incidental to the opening of the session were presented by Sir Thomas White. There was a motion that the remains of Sir Willfrid Laurier bearing the process of the common services. HUN TROOPS IN was a motion that the remains of Sir Wilfrid Laurier be given a public funeral, "That in the opinion of this House, the mortal remains of the Right Honorable Sir Wilfrid Laurier, G.C. His enforced inaction is weighing heavily upon the premier, however, and the doctors find him a bad patient, unwilling to obey their orders. He insisted in receiving visitors all day yesterday and in discussing current business with Stephen Pichon, the foreign minister, who called upon him late in the evening for the third time after the shooting. The premier raised the question as to whether the supreme council should sit this afternoon, as had been arranged, and expressed the wish that the decision be left to the delegates of the other great powrs. Consequently Paul Dutaste, the general secretary of the peace conference, was instructed to call upon the British, American, Italian and Japanese delegations and gather views. It was considered probable early today that the delegates would suggest waiting for a few days, possibly until the beginning of the next week, before resuming

Personally, M. Clemenceau is impatient to resume his place at the head of the conference. as provided in last year's legislation, as it was, and always will be, productive of confusion with long-established custom and practice.

My proposition, to avoid this confusion, is to enact the statute to read that the statutory ten-hour day for all classes of the community, other than the rural or farming class, shall begin at 6 o'clock standard time, and end at 5 o'clock for the duration of the time in each year in which it is intended to be operative—in my opinion not later than the first day of October in each year.

This means that there shall be no change whatever in the clock time, which will remain constant throughout the year. By this method there will be no necessity for changes in clock time of railways, public institutions, schools, churches, etc., to suit the new conditions, and everything will go on smoothly and harmoniously as usual.

My object in exempting the rural classes from the provisions of the act is to allow them to begin their work any time it may suit them best, as the experience of the past season proved that it was inexpedient for them to start their work in the fields at so early an hour as 6 a.m. In case there might be objections on their part to stores and offices closing at too early an hour in the evening for their convenience in trading, this could then bedone in the early morning hours, while the dew would be drying in the fields, as all business places being open from 6 a.m., no time need be lost by having to quit work in the afternoon for this purpose.





Thousands Will Follow Great Statesman to His Grave.

PROFUSION OF FLOWERS

Body Will Be Taken to House of Commons Early This Evening

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—The funeral of Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be the largest and most imposing ever held in Canada, not even excepting that of Sir John A. Macdonald at Kingston. Thousands have already passed before the casket since it was laid in the big drawingroom. They pass every minute of the day—men and women and little children, people of every walk of life, worknamen, with the grime of their day abor upon them, mingling in the fragrance-laden chamber with richly dressed ladies, businessmen, legislators, minisgers priests excellent. adies, businessmen, legislators, minis-iers, priests and nuns, the latter with sad faces looking from out their black

sad faces looking from out their black cornettes.

There is a quiet majesty about the old soce. Sir Wilfrid is attired in his Windsor uniform, which in life he did not frequently affect. The silver star of the Order of St. Michael and St. George gleams from the red of the gold-frogged coat and the silver-handled swort by his side.
