TO HAVE SECURED OPTION ON LONDON STREET RY. STOCK

Canadian Northern Interests, Says the Story—Also Looked Over London and Lake Erie Traction Company With a View of Buying It.

COMPANY IS AFTER MANY FEEDER LINES

Representatives in This City Who Had Charge of Negotiations-Some of the London Street Railway Directors Deny the Story.

It is stated on the best of authority that the Mackenzie & Mann inerests have been looking over this city and its possibilities.

Some time ago they had agents in the city of London taking stock of the London Street Railway and the London and Lake Erie Tractica Com-

They made close inquiry into both propositions, dealing with their capital stock, earnings and the rest of it with an eye to their value as in-

It was also stated that they had secured the option on all the stock in the London Street Railway held by local persons, and had approached Mr. A. H. Everett, of Cleveland, for a price on the stock.

The president of the road was on a trip around the world, however, and could not be seen, and, as a result, the deal could not be consummated. However, he has returned, and it is understood that a definite proposition will be submitted to him when he is able to transact business at his office in Cleveland.

AFTER THE TRACTION COMPANY.

With the possibility of doing business with the London Street Railway, they have turned to the Traction Company, and will make an offer for that system in a very short time, it is claimed.

This would give the Canadian Northern lines and franchises from Tointo to London, access to the big manufacturing industries of this city and practically all of Western Ontario.

They have at the present no connection with this district, and those on the inside say that they are anxious, extremely anxious in fact, to get their foot in here in order to supply their western line through the west.

ARE BUYING MANY LINES. "There is no doubt about the proposition," said a man in close touch rith the traction situation of this section. "Mackenzie & Mann, as a matter of fact, are purchasing lines in every direction. They are using radials as feeders to their big roads, and London, with its geographical situation is in a position to afford them great possibilities in the future for development of trade. They will eventually secure this whole territory, and in my mind will take hold of all the traction projects in this city.

You can readily see how an over-zealous district attorney or sheriff, goaded by the executive, could narass those who wanted to live withn the provisions of the law. It opened the gates to collusion, and the gentlemen who are interested in a sport which they believe to be clean, would not go on, but determined to have a test of the measure, which they have been advised by the most eminent legal authorities is unconstitutional. Mr. Marshall, who drafted the Perkins-Agnew bill, said that he had been forced to go so far, and to such extremes, to cover every point, because there was no other way to stop all sorts of betting. Under the present law a man is liable to arrest if he bets a pair of gloves or a hat on a baseball or football match, on an election, or on any other contingency. It is prohibition gone mad, and the courts will be asked to set it aside on the ground that it is not only cruel and inhuman, but farcical into the bargain, and tends to hold us up to contempt. It was Cardinal Gibbons who said that morals could not be egislated into a people, and I regard him as a most eminent authority.


