

OUR COMPLEX BRAIN

HOW NERVE MESSAGES ARE CON-VEYED TO AND FROM IT.

Control the Key to Preserving Ita

The seignce of medicine is year after ear be coming more and more perfect. Its d'agnoses are more reliable, and its me' hod of treatment is more rational.

Although the brain is the chief part of the animal man, yet there are many things about the brain which scientists have not yet fathomed.

But great strides have been made in that knowledge which has only within recent years been discovered and which reveals to us what the cranium really contains. Shelving what has gone be fore and what has been taught as medical law, the following interesting data on how the brain works are now what is accepted at the present time as the orrect theory:

The cerebrum-front and top-is the hief part of the brain and the immediate source of all our mental action. The gray matter of the outer surface is made up of layers of nerve cells. These are the thinking centers. Experiments have clearly demonstrated that each convolution has a special function, and if destroyed it cannot be replaced.

It has also been found that the left side of the brain is more active than

How has that been found out? Well, if an epileptic commences a fit by would find its cause in its nerve center on the left side of the brain. It is only within the past few years that medical men are now able to make a map of the surface of the brain according to the various functions performed.

All impressions received from the outer world, whether through the medium of sight, smell, hearing, taste or touch, are carried direct to the surface of the brain and recorded in the brain cells of their respective areas, while all movements are the result of impulses from the cells in the different motor areas.

Now, there are five large sensory reas in the make up of the brain. First, sight, which is the largest, at the back of the brain. Smell, taste and hearing have their positions at the side of the head in the temporal (temples) region and inner surface. Touch has its domicile at the top of the brain, while the large motor (giving motion) area takes up the bulk of the middle

These are so splendidly arranged by nature that the motor cells of the lips are in front, then those of the hand, arm and so on to the foot. To give you an example how the sensory and motor nerves work: If you touched anything hot or sharp, the impression would be conveyed to the sensory area along the nerves connected with it. The sensory cell which received the message would immediately communicate with the motor cells to pull your hand away.

Why is it easier to rei ject than, say, a mathematical formula or a poem? The reason of this is that whereas the former has impressions stamped on several brain centers, such as sight, touch, smell, taste and the rest, the latter are stamped on centers which are not nearly so retentive as the former.

In repeating poetry, for instance, it is the sound of the last line which suggests the next line, but an object presents itself to the brain centers oncerned immediately. You know an apple or an orange when you see it because you are aided in distinguishing it by a set of centers which are not only more numerous, but quicker in perception. Though poetry is revived in the sight and sound centers, it is not so well fixed there as in the other case, because it calls up fewer cen-

An apple, for instance, is stamped twice in the optic center, once as a green fruit and once as the printed There is an optic word center and a pictorial or photographic center. The poem is only stamped in the former, as of course it is not an object which can be pictorially represented.

The brain is nothing less than a big album of photographs and other sensory impressions. The prefrontal region may be compared to a registry office where certain records are kept. In the brain that particular part is the starting place for the memory. If we wish to recall a subject, the stimulus must pass to the prefrontal or registry office of the brain, whence the stimulus is sent to the brain cells containing the sensations to be recalled. It is like a

signal box on a railway. Now, unless your blood be in good order the active life of the brain will be affected. Blood is the nourishing agent, and if it be of a poor kind the work it does in the way of nourishment will be of a worthless character practically. Poor blood is an enemy of the brain, but happily it is not so disastrous a fee as worry. In that you have the real enemy of the brain. Worry disorganizes the machinery of the brain and mind and is little inferior to

shock, which usually paralyzes both. Worry causes irregular nerve action, and if it be continuous it produces a confusion of ideas. This depresses the cells of the brain, and the usual result is if there is no abatement in the worry complete failure of the brain's action and consequent mental disturbance. Self control is the key to preserving the equilibrium of the brain and to maintaining its natural healthy state.

Following this, with the suddenness of the turn of a kaleidoscope, came a dream in which I was having a most exciting experience with a purple mastoden with long shining gold tusks, of which I was trying to rob him to make a gun rack for the reception hall. I forgot all about the previous good story. I knew that I was forgetting it, and in my puny struggle with the mastodon I made a violent mental effort to retain the story and at the same time secure the tusks. Just as I got the better of the mastodon I awoke and tried to think of the story that I might get up and make copious notes of ft. But the story was clear gone, and the mastodon incident was so utterly foolish that I turned over in disgust and went

to sleep again. "One night I dreamed a most excruciaingly funny story about the adven-ture of a character called Fiddlesticks. As I dreamed it I reckoned it at about five thousand words, and knew every word of it, so that had I been awake I could have written it word for word as it occurred in the dream. It was great, and, knowing my weakness of orgetting my dream stories, I resolved to remember it. I did remember it in the morning, and it was the most incoherent, silly stuff in the world. That Is always the way with dream ideas.

"Again I dreamed a story. This was the best of all. As I dreamed it I thought what a sensation it would produce and what a reputation it would bring me! The story was complicated, yet simple, and such a plot as the most ingenious intriguer could hardly produce. It was full of situations both humorous and pathetic, and the diaogue was witty, erisp and convincing. If I could only make notes of this, said I, 'I would be all right, for I am sure to forget it by morning.' Just then I had a pad of paper before me and a pencil in my hand. I worked away feverishly making copious notes of everything and elaborate descriptions of the persons in the story. 'Now,' said I, 'I'll fool the dream demon this time.' Then I feel into a calm When I awoke and while half asleep I thought of those notes Where had I put them? I got wo and searched everywhere, but could not fit/1 them. I had a hazy, tantalizing memory of the details of the story, but I must have the notes I had made to write it as I had drean ed it. I seached everywhere in an agony of apprehension at their loss. Then I woke up again and found that the notes and the search for them had both been dreams.

"My dream stories give me more trouble than those that I conceive and write while awake. They seem so good when I dream them, but while dreaming I know that they will be utterly impossible and ridiculous when I awake.

Tea and Coffee.

A German professor has been investigating in elaborate fashion the effect on processes of digestion produced by the use of tea and coffee. He prepared an artificial gastrie juice, and mixed it with coagulated egg albumen, with and without additions of tea and coffee infusions. Walle the gastrie juice by itself was able to digest 94 per cant. of the egg albumen in the space of eight bours, when tea was added the proportion digested was reduced to 66 per cent. When a decoction of coffee was mixed with the albumen the gastric fluid was only able to digest 61 per cent., or less than two-thirds of the albumen. The digestive power of the gastric juice appeared to power of the gastric juice appeared to vary with the strength of the infusion, the disturbing effect being less when the solutions of tea and coffee were weakened. The professor is of opinion that the deleterious effect produced is due to she tannin which is extracted during the process of making, and not to the presence of thein and caffein and he mentions that tea which has not been allowed to stand more than two or three minutes is less injurious because a smaller quantity of this undesirable ingredient, tannin, has been produced than when it is boiled up or left in contact with the leaves for a considerable length of time.



Down in the Maritime Province -The C. P. R. Suffers Severely.

St .John, N. B., Oct. 15 .- Two hun dred passengers who left Boston and Montreal on Thursday arrived here by river boat at 10 o'clock last night in consequence of washouts which oc-curred on every branch of the Cana-dian Pacific in New Brunswich on

dian Pacific in New Brunswich on Thursday.

The eastbound express was caught at Green Point and for three days could not move a mile. The passengers were taken into Fredericton Junction and cared for. Yesterday the twenty-mile Fredericton branch had been partially repaired and the passengers were taken to Fredericton with a transfer at Glasiers, where there is still a 200-foot gap. At Fredericton the passengers were put on a river boat, which made the eighty-two-mile run to St. John in six hours. It will be at least a week before the damage on the forty miles of main line between St. John and Fredericton Junction can be repaired sufficiently to permit the resumption of traffic, and the river route will be used until then.

The storm has been so severe that so far thirty vessels are reported ashore from Halifax.


