

Yet we have been getting "reports" from time to time that everything was roseate to the northward. We have several times written deprecatory words regarding these mis-named reports from sub-collectors and others in our outports; and any reasonable person will readily un-

derstand that these reports are not only misleading but valueless. The reports are based on hearsay for these officials have no means of getting accurate information. Hence, they were better unpublished, as they must necessarily influence the foreign markets. Now comes the announcement that the Labrador fishery is almost a blank. There are few places on the coast where any quantity of fish has been caught and we are told that nearly all the fishermen have gone north.
