JAPAN'S LAST VICTORY

Further Details of the Fight off the Mouth of the Yalu River.
THE MIKADO RULES THE SEA
His Fleet Has Virtually Obtained Possession of the Gulf of Peichai—China May Now Be Compelled to Ask for Terms From Japan.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—The correspondent of the Central News at Tien-Tsin telegraphs further details of the naval battle off the mouth of the Yalu river as follows: The work of transferring troops and stores from the Chinese transport vessels to the shore was proceeding rapidly when the Japanese fleet was sighted. Admiral Togo signalled to his fleet to weigh anchor and form in line of battle. In obedience to this order the fleet was formed in a single line with the exception of the Chinese Kwang-Kai and Kwang-Ting and four torpedo boats, which were formed in a second line at the mouth of the river. The Japanese fleet advanced at full speed while the Chinese columns were forming in line until they came within range, when the Japanese opened fire with their main batteries. The first column and three gunboats and five torpedo boats in the second column. The firing at the outset of the engagement was of an indifferent order, but the Japanese were creeping gradually closer to the Chinese ships, their guns were improving their aim by practice. The Chinese barbettes ship Ting-Yuen was the first to suffer any serious injury, a Japanese shell bursting in her battery. A ceaseless bombardment was kept up on both sides for an hour and a half, when the Japanese ship Saiko was rendered helpless, and, according to the assertion of the Chinese, sank. The vessels of both fleets worked very easily under steam and the Japanese were constantly manoeuvring, but the Chinese held their original position. Suddenly two Japanese cruisers, believed to have been the Akitsushima and Yoshida, endeavoured to put the Japanese in the rear. They were followed by three torpedo boats. As the Japanese ships advanced, at full speed, the Chinese opened fire. FATAL RAILWAY WRECK

Three Men Killed in an Accident Near Fraserville, Ont.
THE TRAIN STRUCK A COW.
Thirteen Cars Were Ditched and Piled Up in a Confused Mass Beside the Track—The Engineer, Fireman and Brakeman Were the Victims.

LENDAY, Ont., Sept. 24.—On Saturday a special freight train, in charge of Conductor Fred Russell, ran over a cow when coming near Fraserville. The engine was thrown over its side, burying beneath it Robert Johnson, the engineer, Nicholas Maloney, the fireman, and George Greenaway, a brakeman. There were 13 cars on the train and every one of them was thrown from the track and piled up in a heap. Some of the cars went over an adjoining track. The ill-fated special was composed of thirteen cars and a van in charge of Conductor Russell and left for Lindsay at 2:10 Saturday morning. The accident occurred at a crossing about a mile and a half south of Fraserville and was caused by a cow lying on the track. As soon as they struck the animal the engine turned aside on the track and the 13 cars piled up in a confused mass on top of her. All three were terribly scalded. It was nearly noon before the unfortunate men were extricated from the wreckage. Maloney was still alive when taken out, but died a few moments after. Nearly a Fatal Accident.
TORONTO, Sept. 24.—What was nearly a horrible accident occurred on Saturday when a motor and trailer jumped the track on the Gerrard street bridge, and nearly went over. The motor, No. 978, in charge of Motorman Davis, with trailer 172 attached, was going east at a fast rate down grade. When they got about 30 feet on the bridge they jumped the track and struck the slight iron railing at the side. Only the weight of the trailer kept the motor car from going clean over. As it was being run on the level of the bridge, there were three passengers in the motor car, and they, with Motorman Davis and L. Dunstan, another street rick driver, who was beside him, escaped unhurt. The distance from the level of the bridge to the ground below is 40 feet.




