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COUNT BONI AND PRINCE HELIE IN A ROUGH-AND-TUMBLE FIGHT

Report That the Prince is Engaged to Marry Anna Gould the Counts Former Wife.

Paris, Jan. 6.—Count Boni de Castellane, from whom his wife, who was Miss Anna Gould, of New York, recently was divorced, and Prince Helie de Sagan, who on several occasions was reported to be engaged to Mme. Gould, had a personal encounter yesterday at the Church of St. Pierre de Chaillot.

Count Boni spat in his cousin's face. Then came the clash of canes, followed by a rough and tumble fight on the pavement, which ended in the gutter, where the men were finally separated by a big butcher.

All three were marched off to the police station, where they made "explanations." Some More Particulars. Paris, Jan. 6.—The newspapers of this city to-day publish long accounts of the encounter yesterday between Count Boni de Castellane and the Prince Helie de Sagan in the Rue de Chaillot.

BRITAIN'S ASIATICS. TRANSVAAL REGISTRATION LAW RAISES IMPERIAL QUESTION.

Two Thousand Natives of India in Transvaal Refuse to Submit to the Law—Prominent Indians in Britain Predict Weakening of Loyalty in the East.

London, Jan. 6.—Great Britain is experiencing what might well be called an almost startling awakening to the grave problems caused by the immigration of Asiatics to her white colonies.

The reports of further racial rioting at Vancouver come at a particularly inopportune time on account of the negotiations now under way between Canada and Japan, and they are very annoying to the British Government.

HUMAN BATTERIES. LITTLE ELECTRICAL GENERATORS IN THE BODY OF MAN.

A Chicago Physician Has Found the Way to Make Them Work and Will Prolong Life by Supply of Additional Vitality.

Chicago, Jan. 6.—Dr. J. C. Siebel, a physician of this city, announced to-day before the American Association for the Advancement of Science that he has discovered a method of generating energy within the human body.

Paris, Jan. 6.—There was a violent quarrel in the Rue de Chaillot to-day between Count Boni de Castellane and Prince Helie de Sagan. The Count is reported to have denounced the Prince in unmeasured terms.

COULDN'T SEE HIS PICTURES.

OCTOGENARIAN PREFERS DEATH TO SIGHTLESS LIFE.

Wealthy Retired Merchant of New York Commits Suicide Because of Failing Eyesight—Engaged in Chinese Trade.

TRANSPANTED KIDNEYS. Doctors Are Now Able to Transfer Vital Organs.

New York, Jan. 6.—Announcement was made yesterday in the official organ of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research of the experiments conducted by Alexis Carrel, of the Institute staff, in the transplantation in man of kidneys from one cat to another, and doctors with whom his efforts were discussed said it was not a far cry to the time when it may be possible to transplant one of the vital organs from an animal's body to that of a human.

Recent experiments were conducted by Mr. Carrel at the Rockefeller Institute between February and October of last year, five of which were failures because of unfavorable conditions at the time of the operation.

A MOTORIST'S ESCAPE. His Car on Brooklands Track Broke Through the Fence.

London, Jan. 6.—After breaking the world's speed record for fifty miles, and attempting to lower the 100 miles record in a spectacular race against time in a six cylinder car on the Brooklands track this afternoon, H. C. Cyon, the well-known racer, escaped death in the most remarkable motor accident known.

MAN CHARGED WITH BLACKMAILING RAIN MAGNATE.

Killed Brother in a Fight—Letter From the Accused Making Threats of Disclosures Read in London Police Court.

London, Jan. 6.—Carl Ludwig Von Veltheim, alias Frank Kurtze, who was arrested in Paris three months ago and extradited on December 28th, charged with attempting to blackmail Solly Joel, South African mining magnate, was again before the Guildhall Police Court to-day.

PROVINCE GETS \$24,000. Result of Court's Decision in Woodruff Estate Litigation.

Toronto, Jan. 6.—The Province will collect \$24,000 more in succession duties from the estate of the late Samuel D. Woodruff, of St. Catharines, if another appeal is not entered in the action brought by the Attorney-General against the executors.

WORKING UP A WAR SCARE. Paris Matn Professes to See Danger in U. S.—Japanese Situation.

Paris, Jan. 6.—Some of the Paris newspapers, notably The Matin, which have been giving considerable prominence to the American-Japanese "war scare," have taken the cable reports of Japan's refusal to accept the American conditions in the matter of immigration, together with the decision of the Navy Department to keep the torpedo-boat flotilla and the battleships together for the remainder of the cruise to the Pacific, and made of them a subject for fresh alarm.

CALL IT MILITARY DUTY. The Petition of Mennonites Against Flags on Schools.

Winnipeg, Jan. 6.—The petition of the Mennonites, asking for exemption from the law which requires the Union Jack to be flown over the schools, was made public to-day. They base their claims on letters addressed to their leaders in 1873, before they left Russia, by John Lowe, Deputy Minister of Education. These letters guaranteed that no military duties of any kind would be required of them.

OFFERS TO MARRY SUFFRAGETTE. A Farmer at a British Meeting Creates a Sensation.

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FAR AND GARDEN

The Small Yield Cow. Dairying in the United States is depressed by one element that must forever stand in the way to block the dairymen from success.

That element is the small yield cow, and the steer that costs \$20 or \$30 a year for keep and returns her own \$25 to \$35 for milk. Many a milk producer, with a herd of 20 such cows, representing an investment of \$1,000 or \$1,200, is losing money regularly, and must lose as long as he insists on breeding with such cows.

The truth is, that they cause 'stagnation' in the dairies. One correspondent says that last year he had a herd of 20 so-called 'dairy farms' he found less than twenty herds whose average yield was large enough to bring the cost of production inside of the average price of the year.

COWS NEED CONSTITUTIONAL VIGOR. This is the element that produces endurance under great strain of any sort—in the race horse under the strain of terrific speed, in the milch cow under the strain of enormous production.

The difference in the growth and development of the young of the different breeds. Of the one they live and grow without special care or attention; of the other they perish easily if they do not have the best of care. The difference is simply in constitutional vigor or vital force born in the calves of the one and not in the calves of the other.

The improved sire is without question the most economical investment in any dairy herd. Wilber J. Fraser, Chief of Dairy Husbandry, University of Illinois.

A JOLT TO A JINGO. The Toronto Saturday Night has the following incident: A good story has reached the city concerning a speech recently delivered in Washington, D. C., by Mr. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Globe, Mr. Macdonald, who has been much in demand as a public speaker, was one of the leading orators at a big Y. M. C. A. gathering at the American capital a few weeks ago.

Amonged at this inopportune jingoism, some of those present asked Mr. Macdonald to say something in his speech on the following night to offset it. Others facetiously dared him to use the word 'peanuts.' He did both. As he rose to speak he was encouraged by three Canadians, who occupied seats at the front of the hall, who had been 'The Maple Leaf.' His subject was 'The Call of the Nation,' and he pointed out that the greatness of a nation is not counted alone in the size of its territory, but in the quality of its people.

Then he warmed up a bit. 'It may be true, but it is not so beautiful as you think it is. I told last night that the world with ninety-seven per cent. of this, eighty per cent. of that, and ninety per cent. of something else. Among other things he said the United States supplied the world with ninety-seven per cent. of peanuts.'

Visitors of the Ontario Agricultural College, during the past summer were shown a Holstein-Friesian cow, called 'Bouletje Q. Pieterje deKiel,' which was expected to produce twenty thousand pounds of milk within the year. As a matter of fact, she has actually exceeded this estimate. From Oct. 27th, 1906, to Oct. 29th, 1907, she has given 20,778 pounds of milk, testing a fraction over 3.76 per cent., and containing 781.91 pounds of butter-fat. The cost of the feed, as charged up by the College authorities, was \$1,572.22. The value of the butter-fat, at prices that have been paid neighboring farmers by the College creamery, was \$1,588.38. If the 20,000 pounds of skim milk and butter-fat were to be valued at, say, 20c per cwt., it would amount to \$4,000. Adding this to the value of the butter-fat, the total yield of butter-fat and skim milk would equal \$230.38. Deducting the cost of feed, we have a profit, over feed consumed, of \$157.72. At the price of cream which have been received during the past year by her former owner, Mr. Geo. Rice, of Tillsonburg, Ont., the butter fat in this cow's milk would have been worth \$224.37. The skim milk in this case would have been, say 175 cwt. worth \$35, making total proceeds of \$259.57, or a profit over cost of feed of \$186.91. To state this cow's record another way, according to the rule for estimating butter yield by adding one-sixth to the butter-fat, the estimated quantity of butter which could have been made from the cow's milk was practically 912 1-4 pounds, which is about six times the yield of the average cow of this country. This is a wonderful record, one which very few cows would be capable of making. Prof. Dean writes that so far as he is aware, it is one of the best, if not the best, ever made in Canada, and he doubts whether any cow beginning her record before she was four years old had a better one.—Farmer's Advocate.

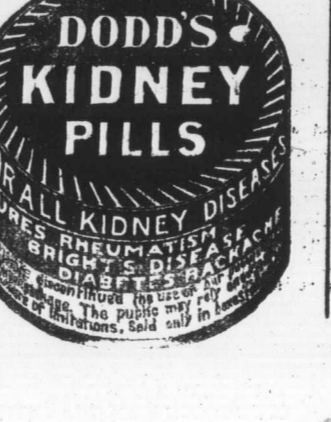
