William Harwick was appointed Superintendent of Water Works to be paid at the rate of \$2.00 per day, and Lewis Murphy was appointed Superintendent of Streets, to receive the same pay.

The Education Report of the Nova Scotia legislature shows that during the school year the number of schools increased from 2292 to 2303; the pupils enrolled from 98,710 to 100,555; the number of teachers from 2301 to 2309; the number of Normal School trained teachers from 499 to 616; and the total days' attendance of pupils from 5,325,348 to 5,342,300. \$77,838 were voted by school sections for building and repairs.

The amount voted by the school sections for teachers' salaries is increased more than \$35,000 over the \$339,848 of last year. The Provincial Grant to teachers also increased \$14,970 over the \$167,452 of the same year, giving the teachers the largest Provincial Grant yet paid them—38 cents to class D, 57 cents to class C, and 77 cents to class B over the previous maximum. The average salaries of teachers in various counties, or of some classes in the whole Province, have not advanced, but there has been an advance in the sum total. The reason why there are yet sections with no school is not the scarcity of teachers, but the weakness or smallness of many sections. It is also gratifying to notice that the tendency of the late changes has been to diminish the rate of decrease of male teachers. For the present year the diminution in the number of male teachers has been only one as against forty-one the previous year. There are indications that during the next year the number of male teachers will increase, instead of following the general law of diminution prevalent everywhere during the past quarter of a century or more.

161 sections were without school in 1895. Schools in operation 2305. Teachers 2309. One hundred and ten schools have served 20 years or over—School property in Nova Scotia amounts to \$1,401,146. Provincial grant \$238,760. County funds, \$119,900. Section assessment \$484,144. Total for education \$811,804. The progress made in public education is gratifying.

An airship of aluminum and bamboo has been constructed by Prof. Bell, of Anderson, Ind., who has demonstrated to his friends, it is said, that the concern will work successfully. Theirship weighs 40 pounds, and it is claimed, will carry 250 pounds and attain a speed of a mile in three minutes. It is composed of a series of parachutes or umbrellas, a propelling wing and a rudder to guide it. It is worked by a gearing much after the plan of a bicycle, and is very easy to handle. It folds up and can be carried with little trouble. The machine can be constructed cheaply, the inventor says, and can be used in all kinds of weather.

General A. W. Greely, of Arctic fame, begins in the March Ladies' Home Journal his articles on George Washington, which are expected to create considerable discussion. General Greely has read over 200 of Washington's private letters, and he writes in a frank, unbiased way of the personal side of Washington. His first article will deal with the loves and courtships of Washington and his final marriage to the widow Custis. General Greely's articles are not likely to confirm the sentiment of those who regard Washington in an ideal way. But they are truthful and admirably portray the man as he was, in his private life.

A Promiscuous Literature.

"Can one go upon hot coals and his feet not be burned?" Two highly important factors, in moulding character and developing there-in a disposition for good or evil, are the books we read and the companions we associate with. We read "A man is known by the company he keeps."

Such a truth might with equal appropriateness be rendered, A man is known by the books he reads. It would be difficult to say to which of these we would assign the most important place, in accomplishing their work, right or wrong, for the power of either for good or for evil is scarcely to be estimated.

In view of the variety and magnitude of the literary issue of the Press Room of our land, a necessity more than ever seems to exist that there should be a gulf wide and deep fixed to separate the product, good and bad. Some sort of preliminary inspection at least should be provided for, with a view to prevent conception of the indigent germs of moral and mental decay that so frequently lie hidden between the covers of many books, and that develop themselves in the character of those who innocently peruse them.

How often does it happen that the corrupting literature of bad books is the confessed first cause and inducement to departure from moral and mental rectitude, and even crime among our youth. The existence of bad and worthless literature in a community is scarcely less an evil to be deprecated and fought against, than the presence of intoxicating drinks, yet while the latter has become recognized enemy, the former is permitted to flourish and do its work, with little or any definite opposition from quarters where such might be expected.

This very questionable right to circulate promiscuously and to read indiscriminately because written, is not adjudged allowable by at least one body of Religionists, who relate to themselves the right to pronounce what shall be permitted to their adherents and what not. While the plan of prohibition judiciously adopted and followed by the Roman Catholic Church may provoke just criticism and appear to outsiders as arbitrary and severe, yet such a course seems to savour of wisdom and to have not a few advantages over the free license system which regulates or fails to regulate the production and publication of all sorts of literature, regardless of consequences, to the reading public.

Unless some wise ark of safety is provided against the present deluge of debasing and evil producing books which soil the shelves of many of our publishing houses, a degrading and vitiating of what is mentally and morally best in the lives of many will undoubtedly follow. Many a young man or woman living in Christian homes, prudently warned against the temptations of so called worldly literature, has silently and unknown to inconsiderate parents been innocently developing the seeds of immorality and lawlessness through the reading of harmful literature. The ever widening opportunity, now practically within reach of all, for obtaining the lighter sort of literature, affords a double reason why this channel of information and character building, should be protected and kept clean.

How best to accomplish this is a question eminently worthy the thoughtful consideration of wise thinking people and, especially of all those who have at heart the mental and moral training of the youth of our land. In the neighboring republic, the warning note has been raised and her right thinking men and women are already grappling with the problem. It remains for others now inactive to follow their example and awake to action.

For the present, let us see that those in whom we have hopes for the future can readily satisfy their longings with the best books, strive to cultivate in them a desire for such only. A taste for the good will thus presently be formed and a preference established which may eventually be relied on with safety, and the possessor left entirely to his own choice.

An interesting meeting of the St. John Board of Trade was held on Tuesday, at which P. G. Giffins of the D. A. R. was present. He stated that the Prince Edward Island Railway route again as soon as repaired; that she would make 313 trips per year, plus the extra trip in the summer during the time the double daily service was maintained; that the rates for freight would not be higher than on the Monticello, and passenger rates would remain as now; but the service between Halifax and Digby would be better than ever, as a person leaving Halifax in the morning would reach St. John at 7 p.m. The D. A. R. wished to obtain a subsidy from the Dominion Government. A resolution was passed asking the government to grant a subsidy which would enable the D. A. Railway to maintain a daily service for passengers and mail.

A good deal of interest is awakened among scholars by the announcement that the Greek government has granted to the American classical school at Athens the vote, right to excavate on the site of the ancient Corinth. In spite of the fact that so much of the art treasure of this important city, was carried away by the conquering Romans, it is believed that there will be found much of interest and value to reward the labors of the excavator.

Archbishop O'Brien of Nova Scotia, Bishop Howley of Newfoundland, Rev. Dr. Morice of Halifax, Rev. Father St. John and Donnelly of Newfoundland, will leave Halifax next Saturday on a pilgrimage to Rome.

St. Valentine's Day.

Mr. H. H. Wickwire, M. P. F., has the honor of the ACADIAN for parliamentary papers.

The members of the Propylaeum Society of Acadia, give a reception in College Hall this evening.

The Senior class of Acadia College, were on Tuesday evening last entertained at the residence of Mr. Lawrence Eaton, Canard.

Special evangelistic services are in progress at the Baptist church. Meetings will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings of each week, to continue for several weeks.

Says the Boston Herald: The Dominion Atlantic makes another fine display of apples from the Land of Evangeline. There are 11 different varieties in the collection, and their red and yellow coats make the mouths of thousands of people water every few hours.

The annual meeting of the Halifax Sailors' Home Society was held the other day and it was discovered that while all the departments were in a flourishing condition, the deficit on the year's operations amounted to about \$400, while the whole deficit is \$7,000.

The Weather.

Temperature of January, 1896, at Wolfville as observed by G. Thompson. Minimum average for the month 8.55, maximum average for the month 17.77. During eight nights the mercury fell below zero.

On the night of the 20th the thermometer marked 18 deg. below zero, being the coldest of the winter as yet. Highest temperature for the month was on the 4th, when it reached 47 deg.

Waterville.

Special services are still being held in the Baptist congregation at this place. The meetings are well attended and with every appearance of success. The Presbyterian church here has been undergoing repairs during the past few weeks, or rather a complete change from what it was to a more modern style, with an addition at the rear end for the choir, at the back of the minister's desk. The old-time gallery has been removed and the seats have been differently arranged. The ceiling of the whole structure has been sheathed and modern style. It is now nearing completion. The work has been rapidly pushed along by R. S. Johnson, the contractor, with only one workman besides himself at the church. The staining and painting is the work of John H. Wolfe, of Waterville. The job when finished will reflect much credit on the faithfulness of the contractor as well as the skill of the painter. The church is to be ready for use by the first or second Sabbath in March. They are to be assisted by Mr. McDonald, of Mills Brook, Halifax, who is an excellent violinist. The entertainment promises to be a most enjoyable one. Admission, 15 cents and 10 cents.

The Baptist church was crowded on Sunday evening last, the members of the College Y. M. C. A. taking charge of the meeting. Rev. Mr. Hutchins, of Canning, occupied the pulpit. During the evening a selection was rendered by the College Quartette and a solo by Miss Barker, which added to the enjoyment of the service.

New Brunswick Prohibition Convention.

A circular signed by Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., and A. H. Harrington Esq., has been issued calling a New Brunswick Prohibition Convention at Fredericton, Feb. 19-20 proximo.

The time has come, it is believed, when we are likely to be brought more directly than ever into a definite struggle for the immediate enactment of a thoroughgoing prohibitory law.

In four of the provinces of the Dominion there have been taken plebiscites which have resulted in immense majorities in favor of total prohibition.

This province has by the unanimous vote of its Legislature memorialized the Dominion Parliament to the same effect.

The report of the Royal Commission appointed by the Dominion Government has been laid before Parliament.

A general Dominion election will take place almost immediately. The reform we advocate is demanding from politicians more attention than it ever received before.

Our workers have more knowledge than ever of the strength of their forces and the sentiment of the country. It is especially desirable that there should now be laid plans for concurrent and similar action in all parts of the province, so that such electoral action may be undertaken as will ensure the return, at next general election, of members of Parliament from this province definitely committed to the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

As to representation.

Every church and society to be entitled to two representatives, and each church or society having more than one hundred members, to be entitled to an additional delegate for each hundred or fractional part of a hundred after the first full hundred members.

The following organizations are to be entitled to representation on the basis named: County, city and electoral district Prohibition Alliances, Leagues or Central Committees, Municipal or Ward Committees, Branches of the W. C. T. U., Divisions of the Sons of Temperance, Lodges of the I. O. G. T., Councils of the R. T. of T., Branches of the League of the Cross, C. T. Abstinence Societies, Prohibition Clubs, and any other prohibition or temperance organizations, Church Congregations, Young Men's Christian Associations, Salvation Army Corps, Societies of Christian Endeavor, Growth Leagues, Branches of St. Andrew's Brotherhood, Baptist Young People's Unions, A. O. F. Societies, and other young people's associations, in connection with church work.

The members of the Council of the Dominion Alliance, elected from representative, ecclesiastical, temperance and prohibition bodies, to the last Dominion Prohibition Convention, to be also members of the Convention.

All N. B. ministers favorable to prohibition will be members; and all N. B. members of parliament and members of the Provincial Legislature favorable to prohibition are also invited to attend as members of the Convention.

If I consent by silence, thought, word or ballot to the continuance of the saloon, what assurance have I, that I, or some of mine, will not be among its victims?"

The Prohibitionists have just elected their candidate for mayor in Toronto, the W. C. T. U., helping to secure this result by bringing out the full women's temperance vote in the city.

The liquor law recently passed in N. B. provides that no liquor association can be formed for doing business in a city or village, until the question whether liquor is to be sold has been voted upon by the resident men and women who have reached the age of twenty-five years.

Decisions thus reached by popular vote are valid for five years.
