Editorial Brevities.

The suggestion first put forward by W. S. Gregory, Leamington, Ont., to make the second Monday in November Canada's permanent thanksgiving day, is meeting with a large measure of popular support.

A plate of very attractive apples was on exhibition in one of the windows of J. E. Hales & Co.'s store this week. They were of the 'Winter Bananas' variety and were grown in the Okanagan Valley, B. C., and were sent to Mr. H. F. Davidson by a friend in Summerland.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with all the members present except Couns. Sherwood and de Witt. Aside from routine the only business was the appointment of Messrs. R. E. Harris, W. H. Evans and F. W. Woodworth as assessors for the current year, and the passing of a resolution exempting the Wolfville Evaporating Company for a term of five years from all assessment for plan and building over one thousand dollars and the granting of the use of the town water at the nominal charge of five dollars per year.

Canada's adoption of the thrift stamp is a natural and a logical result of the splendid response to the Victory Loan campaign. The purchase of Government bonds by thousands upon thousands of the Canadian people has created an interest in that form of security which should never lapse.

For the people of France, the wonderful people of France, the British soldier has an admiration, a respect, that has grown with the years the two nations have been comrades in arms: common abusers of much sorrow. That the French people reciprocate these feelings has been made plain by their kindly hospitality, their generous sympathy, during four hard years. Now, in their demonstrative greetings to King and Prince, they are giving public expression to sentiments, shown in unnumbered kindly and thoughtful ways in the days that are history. These aid in binding closer those ties which unite Britain and France, and make for the permanence of peace, won by their joint sacrifices, in the cause of liberty and justice.

By thrift and industry the French people paid over the huge war in demerit of 1870 to Germany in an incredibly short space of time. The same thrift and industry, if exercised by Canadians now, will reconstruct and make Canada a prosperous country. To achieve this end there must be individual vigilance. Watch food advertisements. There is always a best and cheapest place to buy any commodity. By watching the advertisements of foodstuffs in local papers, much can be accomplished. Merchants do not advertise unless the price and quality of the goods are attractive; they know they cannot retain the business of the public unless they 'make good.' Help the most progressive merchant in your locality by following his advertised prices and patronize him. Competition does more to regulate prices than anything else.

Quite a quantity of pork is being shipped from Antigonish to the Halifax market just now, says the Antigonish Casket. The quantity, however, continues the Casket, is not nearly as large as it was at this season some years back. Then it was the practice to market all our pork during the months of October, November, December and January. During the other eight months of the year only a limited amount of fresh pork was offered for sale here. This practice of marketing all in a few months has changed. Now marketing is distributed over all the months of the year, which accords for the smaller shipments now. Dealers say our pork is excellent in quality. In October the prices were 110 to 125 pounds, 25 cents; 125 to 150 pounds, 22 cents; 150 to 250 pounds, 20 cents; over 250 pounds, 19 cents. In November quotations are: 120 to 150 pounds, 20 cents; 150 to 250 pounds, 19 cents; 250 to 350 pounds, 18 cents; over 350 pounds, 15 cents.

Honor to Whom Honor.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ACADIAN:—Dear Sir,—I notice by the county report of the 'Red Triangle' fund in your last issue the magnificent amount of \$75,000 credited to Ward 8, exclusive of the town of Wolfville. This, of course, is a very grave error, due largely to the allocation of the various districts in the ward previous to the canvass. By this division of districts Wolfville has the credit of those collections taken in Ward 8 immediately east, south and west of the town. These amount approximately to \$172,000. The Grand Pre and North Grand Pre collections taken in Ward 8 have gone to the credit of Ward 9. These amount to some \$253,000. Then, the collections from the portions of White Rock and Gasperus situated in Ward 8, have gone to the credit of Ward 7, amounting to some \$105,000, or a total of approximately \$630,000, raised in Ward 8 but credited to other sections. Greenwich has been credited with \$75,000. Further collections have been made, increasing this to \$346,000. The collectors here were C. C. Brown and C. H. Forsyth, not my self, as reported.

Reverting to the amount raised in Ward 8 we find it sums up as follows: Credited to Wolfville \$72,000; Ward 7 195,000; " " 8 346,000; " " 9 253,000. Total raised in Ward 8 \$966,000 instead of \$75,000 as per report. I have been to some little trouble to get these figures but I think they are correct or approximately so. Thank you for your space.

Children's Aid Society. The sixth annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society for Kings County was held at the Council Chamber, Wolfville, on Friday evening, Nov. 29th. The president, Rev. G. W. Miller, was in the chair and there was a fairly good attendance—not so large, however, as it should have been considering the importance of the work being done. The president reviewed the work of the past year in an interesting manner and gave a number of useful suggestions regarding the future, and the financial statement was presented by the treasurer, Mr. Patrigois, showing that the affairs of the society are being faithfully administered. During the year the society has been well supported by many sections of the county, Kentville in particular, contributing generously. The report of the agent, Mr. Herbert Stairs, was full of interest. He reviewed the different activities of the Society during the past year. Since the organization of the Society, six years ago, over forty children have been taken from various surroundings and placed in good homes. Surely this is a reward that more than justifies the effort put forth. Officers for the coming year were appointed as follows: President—Rev. Mr. G. W. Miller; Vice President—Dr. Elliott; Sec. Treasurer—C. A. Patrigois.

Wolfville Boys Returned.

Among the returned men by the steamer Aquitania which arrived in Halifax on Thursday of last week were two Wolfville boys, L. Corp. Ralph Ewe and Pte. James Paris.

They reached Wolfville on Friday morning and Saturday morning, respectively, and were given a glad welcome by relatives and friends.

Lance Cpl. Ewe enlisted in July, 1915 in the 40th Batt., with which he went overseas in October of the same year. He was transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles and was buried while on active service with them in Belgium in June of 1916.

Pte. Paris enlisted in the 85th Batt and went overseas in October of 1916. He was wounded in the stomach and hip at Passchendaele. Both are looking well considering the experiences they have gone through.

At The Baptist Church.

The services at the Baptist church on Sunday last were under the auspices of the College V. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. and were of a missionary character, being the closing meetings of a missionary conference held by the above societies last week.

Interesting addresses were given by returned missionaries.

It was announced that the College Societies would endeavor this year to raise \$200.00 for missionary purposes, which is about double the sum raised last year.

4 10, 1918. DEAR MADAM—I regret to inform you of the death of your husband, No. 322141, Corp. Abbott, F. M. I. who was killed at duty 25 9, '18, in the service of his King and country.

I cannot expect by any words of mine to alleviate the sudden sorrow which has come upon you, but it may help you to know that your husband was beloved by his comrades in arms and by all who knew him. He always did his duty bravely and well, and he died doing that duty.

Allow me to extend to you the sympathy of every officer, a non officer and man in the Company in your sad loss.

Corpl. Abbott was a splendid soldier, always courageous in the performance of his duty. Because of his wily principles he was greatly beloved by officers and other ranks. We sincerely mourn his loss and sympathize with you at this time.

I buried his body in Farnburg 2 Aulens Arms cemetery, Plot 7, Row H., Grave 53.
