





Celebrations At Greenspond.

Thursday and Friday, 22nd and 23rd, will remain a long time in the memory of the people of Greenspond and the strangers who happened to be here on their way fishing, as the most enjoyable ever spent here.

A public meeting had been called early in June to make arrangements for celebrating the Coronation of Our King, in as good a way as we knew how. After several meetings of the committee the following programme was drawn up: -

1. Parade of children, Societies and general public to start from St. James' Hall at about 10 o'clock, march to Magistrate's residence, where our worthy Magistrate delivered a short address and read the Governor's message to the children; this was followed by a speech from Rev. A. J. Pittman, and another by Capt. James Blandford. A royal salute was next fired; the church bells pealed out merrily; everybody joined heartily in singing the National Anthem and giving three cheers for the King and Queen. The procession then wended its way through the 'own back to St. James' Hall where oranges and candies were distributed to the children. Lots of our children were detained at home through the neesles. The committee carried canies and oranges to those who could not get out;

2. Boat races took place at 2.30 p.m. This item had to be postponed until next day on account of the stormy weather;

3. Foot races immediately after boat races; this also had to be postponed;

4. Climbing the greasy pole, also postponed;

5. Tug-of-War, this also was put off;

6. Illuminating houses at night. On this part a good deal of rivalry was noticed between the different households. It was a pretty sight. Most of the houses on our principal street and all our public buildings were nicely illuminated. Crowds of people thronged our streets watching and enjoying the brilliant scene;

7. Fireworks to be set off at about 9.30 p.m. Not much fault can be found with the kind of fireworks, and none can be found with those who had been appointed to set them off, but the place where they were set off was not the best which could be chosen. A good many citizens did not come to see them at all;

8. Bonfire. Immense quantities of tar barrels, pitch boards, puncheons and boughs were collected, but owing to the rain, which came down freely, this did not show off to best advantage.

On Friday the postponed items were taken in order.

In the races three boats entered. One from the Young Britons, one from the Glover Orange Lodge and one from the S. U. F. This was an exciting race, the Young Britons brought in their boat first; the Glover Lodge, second, the S. U. F. third. No person entered for the second race which was a single scull race. For the third race, a paddle boat race, 2 sets for each boat, six boats entered. A Coward and John Hiscock brought their boat in first, with H. Hutchings and P. Haskins, second. The fourth would have been the most

Interesting but for accidents.

Six boats entered in this race—all four-oared boats; on starting two fouled each other; two others broke oars, and one had to abandon the race. The Glover Lodge boat ended first in this race.

In the Foot Races about ten entered for the first race which extended for about a mile and back; ages ranging from 18 to 60 years, Peter Barry, of Newell's Island, finished first, with Isaac Davis a very close second. The other races, about 6 in number, were very interesting and caused much merriment among some of the on-lookers.

When the Tug-of-War came off the winners were found to be strangers belonging to schooners in the harbour. In this item our committee put up a good fight, but had to give in to the bone and sinew.

The pole climbing caused a good deal of mirth. Numerous persons tried but failed. At last George Cranter captured the ham which was placed on top of the pole, amidst great cheering.

Our worthy Magistrate next thanked the people for the way they had helped the celebrations, and sang the National Anthem which brought Friday's festivities, as arranged by programme, to a close.

Perhaps the most amusing part of the celebrations took place about 10.30 on Thursday night. The fireworks sub-committee and several citizens joined the procession and paraded the town singing "The Union Jack of Old England." They carried with them, besides sticks and lanterns, an immense shute. The particular use of this was not known, some supposed it was to shoot the rain off; others supposed it was to shoot their voices towards the Homeland, Great praise is due to Mr. Franklin, of St. John's, who happened to be here. He gave generously, adding 2nd prize in all the boat

Other races, he provided the money for the tug-of-war and gave the ham for the pole. Besides his financial help he assisted the committee in giving them timely hints and suggestions on different parts of the programme. Everything went off without a hitch and everybody seemed to enjoy their different parts in the programme. All are agreed that never has any event been so universally celebrated as this, the Coronation of Our Good King George V.

During the boat races the harbour reminded one of the St. John's races. Every place where an advantageous look could be obtained was commanded. 
