At Independent, Labrador, by One of the Crew, James Brown.

On August 19th, the fish having lacked off, the captain decided to go north as far as the Turnavicks. On the 22nd a storm of northerly wind raged which destroyed a lot of gear. With one trap still in the water at Huntingdon on the morning of the 23rd, dependent, all the crew, except the aptain, went to Huntingdon and took skipper with five men (Azariah Dawe was among the number) have a little ousiness to transact at Huntingdo ent there and took up the moorings There were still left the moorings of the back of Independent Island. A 5.10 in the afternoon Wm. Dawe, Wm. Spencer, Richard Jackson, Edward Spencer, Richard Jackson, Edward and James Holmes got in the boat and left the vessel to take these in. Azariah Dawe, James Brown, Wm. Parsons a how and Ellen Pussell of sons, a boy, and Ellen Russell, of Country Road were left on board. Aza-riah Dawe, with his suit of oil clothes inder his arm, was about to get down the captain told him he could stay and help James Brown shift some fish in the hold. Up to about 4 o'clock the day was fine and calm, but at that hour the wind came up from the south no' there was a sea running. They hould have been back to the schooner 7 o'clock, and when 8 o'clock came d they did not return we began to uneasy. We remained on deck in n the boat to go with the others who state of anxiety for about an hour nd at 9 o'clock we went on board the Energy and reported the matter aptain Kelly. Returning to our own

chooner we walked the deck until 1 'clock, when James Brown noticed mething like four sticks drifting to ward the vessel. It being very dark ne object could not be distinctly dis erned an dthe two men got in the the traphoat the five men had been in had befallen their comrades, and th only hope was that they may have climbed on some rocks or clung to part of the boat and drifted shore-

Capt. John Kelly's crew boarded the shore and informed Mr. James Dawe he captain's brother. About 11 o'clock e and eight of his men manned their vind and sea was so strong they were orced to retreat. Returning to the aritime they took some lanterns and orches and walked to Mark's Point. he scene of the tragedy. There they iscovered part of the broken boat and ars thrown ashore on the rocks.

Saturday, the 24th, the wind blew hurricane and no boat could put out. to they went again to the place by land that could find nothing but the wreckar could find nothing but the wreckge of the trap boat. The following day (Sunday) was fine but a heavy sea was running. Wm. French, a brothern-law of the captain, walked out to the stern of the boat in the water, he reurned to the harbour, and getting a rap boat he and some men went again to the scene. Attached to the stern of he boat was a fishing line, on which was found the body of Edward Holmes. The line was caught in the

moorings of Henry Brown's trap, about 15 or 20 fathoms from the point.

Monday and Tuesday was still stormy. Wednesday, Aug. 28th, the ishermen gave up fishing and nine peats went to search for the bodies intil Sunday Sept 1st. On that date our boys—George Brown, Arthur Keland two Mesher's-went to the Cov and found the body of Richard Jackson in the beach. Search was still kept up until the following Sunday. when the body of James Holmes was liscovered in Mark's Cove, some disance from water-mark.



LIVERPOOL, Oct. 6. Sir Thomas Lipton has sailed for New York, and is prepared to again challenge for the America's cup. This statement of Sir Thomas, that he is about to make a fourth attempt to win back the cup, confirms a recent rumor that he intended to issue another challenge. Since the last race in 1906 a new code of rules has come into force, and it is to consider their effects there in connection with American yacht clubs that Sir Thomas i now going to America.

Special Evening Telegram.

FIFESHIRE, Oct. 6. "The British Government wil no bow to such threats as the Unionis leaders made in Ulster." declared Asquith, speaking on Home Rule. "They had raised the snirit of lawlessness but they must not imagine they could confine their doctrine to a case which happened to be politically convenient at the moment." He continued. "if what four-fifths of the Irish people demand is not granted, and if Irish men see their long cherished aspirations frustrated, they may turn and say we will take the law in our own hands. No body of responsible politicians ever struck a more deadly blow at the foundations of democratic government." Asquith declared to-day that he lost all hope that the unspeak able calamity of war might be averted by the Powers working together with careful and loyal means for the pres ervation of peace, in addressing his constituents. He said he could say no more at present than that every thing was being done to prevent such an immeasurable catastrophe. He admitted that not for a long time had the international horizon wore such a threatening aspect as to-day.

Special Eveing Telegram,

FARIS, Oct. 6. A favorable response to France's suggestion of intervention in the Balkans, was received from Britain today. At the same time the British Government suggests that whereas intervention at Constantinople should be made by the great Powers acting as a unit, the intervention at the Balkan capital should be left to Austria and Russia. The German foreign minister accepted the proposal on be half of Germany, and now only awaits formal word of confirmation from the German Emperor.

Three million five hundred thousand ounds for herring! That is the highv satisfactory result of the fishing season on the north east coast of Scot land, which is now rapidly drawing to

During the last four months th nightly labors of fishermen in the Minch and in the Pentland Firth have been attended with considerable success, and at Lerwick, Stronsay, Peter-CAPTURED FOUR FOXES. -Four head, Fraserburgh and all the other centres of industry the land ings show a considerable advance compared with that of last year.

Up to date the landings, on the north coast of Scotland reach the substantial total of 1,430,000 crans The cran measure contains about 750 herrings, so that during the 1912 season no fewer than 1,072,500,000 indivto supply some ten dozen "caller herrin" fresh drawn from the sea to every family in the United King-

No official statement of the prices realized has yet been issued, but it is an excedingly conservative estimate to put the average value per cran at 25s. On that estimate the fishermen have recived for the herring landed in Scotland this season £1,790,000. But that by no means represents the actual value of the herring fishing to the other centres of the important industry. To the sum mentioned must be added the wages of carters, fish curers, laborers, coopers, clerks and the little army of fish sales men, middlemen and retailers. The usual estimate is that about 100 per cent. must be added to the prices paid to the fishermen in order to obtain the actual value of the herring harvest to the country. On that basis the total catch on the north east coast of Scoland represents the substantial sum of £3,500,000.

Many of the Highland fishermen have already returned to their native glens with well filled purses, having earned enough to keep them in tolerable comfort until the opening of the spring fishing next year .- Pall Mall Gazette.



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
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
