The Baby Doll Lady.

We call her the baby doll lady because that is her pose. She is at least twenty-five—we are inclined to make it nearer thirty—but apparently she is not conscious of the fact. For she wears funny little gingham frocks that would look young on a girl in her teens; she has them so short that almost any mother would order her sixteen-year-old daughter into the house for a similar display of legs; and she actually appeared last summer with a straw hat with an elastic on it.

Now if there is anything I love, it is a man or woman who is still young despite the passing of the years, who can still enjoy the sports and games of childhood, who can still feel the enthusiasm of youth long after childhood and youth have fled—in short the men and women who always keep the child heart somewhere within them, even though "daily farther from

the east they still must travel." And yet, if there is any woman in our town that I come pretty near to disliking, it's the baby doll lady. You think that's inconsistent? Not at all. In the same proportion that anything is beautiful, its cheap imitation is likely to be hideous, and so it always seems to me that that girl's pose is an insult to real youth. I have known grown women who really laughed with almost childlike glee when they were especially delighted but they didn't know that it sounded that way. This girl does. Household Notes.

One teaspoonful of clear lemon juice taken fifteen minutes before each meal and at bedtime is a good preventive for headache if taken when the first symptoms appear.

To keep small screws, brads and tacks from rusting, it is best to place them in a small wide-mouthed bottle tightly corked. The bottles should be perfectly dry before using.

Cucumbers, turnips and carrots should be firm to the touch when fresh. Lettuce, if of the headed variety, should have firm bleached hearts, showing no trace of rust.

The oiled paper which comes around butter, lard, etc., should be carefully removed and used to line cake tins or as a covering for the steamed pudding.

For sunburn and freckles, use half an ounce of elder flowers into three pints of boiling water and let them infuse for two hours. Strain the mixture thoroughly and use as a wash.

Chiffon can be renewed by spreading a wet cloth over a very hot iron and holding the chiffon over the steam until it is free from wrinkles. The chiffon should be dried quickly.

When the white trimming on a coat or dress becomes dingy, wring a clean white cloth out of thin starch, place it on the trimming, then put a dry cloth over that and iron with a hot iron.

Remember when filling a cake tin to spread the batter as much to the sides as possible, leaving the depression in the centre; then, when the cake is baked, it will be level and more convenient for icing.

When plaster of paris is used to fill cracks in the plaster, mix it with vinegar instead of water. It will not harden so quickly, whereas if water is used the plaster will harden before you can successfully use it.

Frying fish can be prevented from absorbing the grease and becoming sodden if the fat is almost boiling hot before the fish is put in the pan. A blue smoke will rise from the fat when it is in proper condition.

A blackboard eraser is the handiest thing to use about a stove. Keep it in a convenient place and use it to mop the top of the stove. Grease and dirt can be easily removed, and the hands will not come in contact with the black grease.

A very good scouring mixture for boards can be made by working into a paste half a pound of soft soap, half a pound of sand and a quarter pound of lime. Put it on a scrubbing brush instead of soap and then wash off with plenty of clean water.

When linen has been scorched in ironing, make a paste of fullers earth and white soap, moisten with a little vinegar and the juice from a boiled onion. Spread this mixture upon the marks, and after the linen has been washed no stains will be visible. To cleanse fine lace, spread the lace out on a paper cover it with calcined magnesia, place another paper over it and put away between the leaves of a book for two or three days. After that

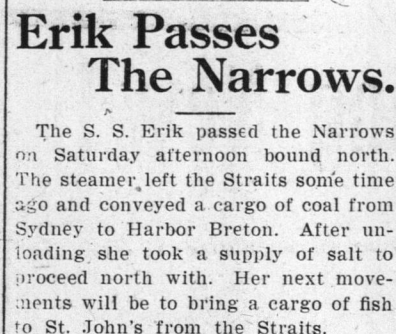
Golden Jubilee at Witless Bay.

On Wednesday last, October 2nd, Sr. M. Gertrude Walsh, of the Presentation Convent, Witless Bay, celebrated the Golden Jubilee of her religious profession. She was born at Garrison Hill, St. John's, and at an early age entered the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, St. John's, where she received the religious habit soon after, A. D. 1860. In the same year, a few months after the foundation of the Convent here, she came to Witless Bay, where she has ever since remained, and where she, with Rev. Mother, who has been here since the foundation of the Convent, and the good Nuns, has done noble work in imparting secular and religious knowledge, and in moulding the characters of the young generations at Witless Bay. She was professed by the late Dr. Mullock, on Oct. 2nd, Feast of the Holy Guardian Angels, 1862. Very Rev. Dean Cleary, Mother Magdalen, venerable foundress of the Order in Newfoundland, and Mother De Pazzi—all of whom have long since passed into the silence of the grave, were present at her profession. On Wednesday last, the day of her Golden Jubilee, Very Rev. Dean Roche referred to her in feeling terms, and asked the people present to offer up prayers and the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass for her. The children flocked around her in the schoolrooms to congratulate the venerable Jubilarian, and get a holiday in her honour. The venerable Jubilarian still looks fresh and blooming after her fifty-two years of labour and sacrifice in the battle ground of the religious vineyard. We congratulate her and we hope and trust that she may yet long be spared to labour in the vineyard, and to do the noble service for the youth of Witless Bay.—Com.

**What About
Those Concessions
To Americans?**

It will be remembered that we published some time ago certain statements which had appeared in the New York Fishing Gazette and the Gloucester Times as to an agreement between the Booth Fisheries Company and the Government of Newfoundland, negotiated by Sir Edward Morris. Contracts were stated to have been drawn up with the Colonial Government subject to examination of the fishery grounds, &c., by the agents of the Company. During the summer experimental fishing trips have been taken on the coast, and in all probability the Company by this time has made up its mind what to do. In any case it is not about time for the Government to inform the public what is being done in this connection?

The Gloucester Times said the Chicago firm was reported to have the inside track on Newfoundland bait. It was also said that "The Newfoundland Government has never sold an ounce of bait or ice to foreigners, and the satisfactory terms of the contracts made with the Booth Fisheries Company give the company the exclusive concession for years of these

vital materials." When we directed the attention of the Government to the nature of these reports, their accuracy was denied. Something was doing, and the Booth Company were experimenting and investigating, and an arrangement was contemplated. So much was admitted, but the Government declined to let the public into their confidence by the publication of the details of the arrangement proposed. Surely the time has arrived now for further publicity.

Last August the N. Y. Fishing Gazette gave a flattering notice of the widespread interests of the Booth Fisheries Co., and in it were the following: "The concessions recently acquired from Newfoundland is evidence of unusual foresight. They will prove invaluable to the Company."

"The Booth Fisheries Company have been making some radical changes in their policy, all of which will be for the best interests of those financing the company. Results are looked for, and the new management expect to produce them or know why they are not forthcoming."

Last Saturday we found the following notice of the same company in the N. Y. Fishing Gazette of Sept. 28th, 1912. It speaks for itself:—

"The Booth Fisheries Co. have had a meeting of their executive committee. They have declared the usual quarterly dividend of one and three-quarter per cent. on the preferred stock, payable Oct. 1. Vice-President Ames stated that the business and financial affairs of the company were in excellent shape, and he believes the company will be in a position to pay a small dividend on the common stock next year, probably two per cent., from the earnings of this year."

The man bled profusely and was unconscious for 35 minutes. Dr. Tait was called, stitched the wound in his head and found that he had been dangerously hurt about the chest and body. He will be weeks confined to his bed. The horse was stopped down near Long Bridge and the owner is known.

Fell Over Stairs.

Unconscious Since Thursday Last.

Thursday night last, at the residence of her brother-in-law, Bell Island, Miss Lizzie Martin, daughter of Mr. A. W. Martin of the General Post Office, met with an accident which it is feared may cost her life. Miss Martin had been suffering from an affection of the head and some time ago went under an operation. In going up the stairs of her relatives home she took one of these "megrims" and fell backwards from the top of the stairway to the landing below. The poor girl struck the back of her head with great violence on the floor, was picked up unconscious and has been so ever since. The doctors on the island gave her every attention on Saturday her father and Dr. Anderson went over in a motor boat. It is feared that she suffers from concussion and her condition gives her parents the utmost anxiety. We deeply sympathize with Mr. Martin over this unfortunate affair.

**Details of the
Drowning
Fatality**

At Independent, Labrador, by One of the Crew, James Brown.

On August 19th, the fish having slackened off, the captain decided to go north as far as the Turnavicks. On the 22nd a storm of northerly wind raged which destroyed a lot of gear. With one trap still in the water at Huntingdon on the morning of the 23rd, and eight moorings on the back of independent, all the crew, except the captain, went to Huntingdon and took up the trap. On the second trip the skipper with five men (Azariah Dawe was among the number) have a little business to transact at Huntingdon, went there and took up the moorings. There were still left the moorings on the back of Independent Island, 5.10 in the afternoon Wm. Dawe, Wm. Smeucer, Richard Jackson, Edward Spencer, Richard Jackson, Edward and James Holmes got in the boat and left the vessel to take these in. Azariah Dawe, James Brown, Wm. Parsons, a boy, and Ellen Russell, of Country Road were left on board. Azariah Dawe, with his suit of oil clothes under his arm, was about to get down in the boat to go with the others when the captain told him he could stay and help James Brown shift some fish in the hold. Up to about 4 o'clock the day was fine and calm, but at that hour the wind came up from the south and there was a sea running. They should have been back to the schooner by 7 o'clock, and when 8 o'clock came and they did not return we began to get uneasy. We remained on deck in a state of anxiety for about an hour, and at 9 o'clock we went on board the Energy and reported the matter to Captain Kelly. Returning to our own schooner we walked the deck until 10 o'clock, when James Brown noticed something like four sticks drifting toward the vessel. It being very dark the object could not be distinctly discerned and the two men got in the boat and rowed toward it. After rowing about a gunshot their boat struck what they discovered to be a part of the trapboat the five men had been in. They knew then that some misfortune had befallen their comrades, and the only hope was that they may have clung to some rocks or clung to part of the boat and drifted shorewards.

Capt. John Kelly's crew boarded the Maritime shortly afterward, and being told of what was seen they rowed to shore and informed Mr. James Dawe, the captain's brother. About 11 o'clock he and eight of his men manned their boat and started for the scene, but the wind and sea was so strong they were forced to retreat. Returning to the Maritime they took some lanterns and torches and walked to Mark's Point, the scene of the tragedy. There they discovered part of the broken boat and oars thrown ashore on the rocks.

Saturday, the 24th, the wind blew a hurricane and no boat could put out, so they went again to the place by land but could find nothing but the wreckage of the trap boat. The following day (Sunday) was fine but a heavy sea was running. Wm. French, a brother-in-law of the captain, walked out to the point by land, and seeing part of the stern of the boat in the water, he returned to the harbour, and getting a trap boat he and some men went again to the scene. Attached to the stern of the boat was a fishing line, on which was found the body of Edward Holmes. The line was caught in the moorings of Henry Brown's trap, about 15 or 20 fathoms from the point.

Monday and Tuesday was still stormy. Wednesday, Aug. 28th, the fishermen gave up fishing and nine boats went to search for the bodies until Sunday Sept. 1st. On that date four boys—George Brown, Arthur Kelly and two Meshier's—went to the Cove and found the body of Richard Jackson in the beach. Search was still kept up until the following Sunday, when the body of James Holmes was discovered in Mark's Cove, some distance from water-mark.

Search was continued for the bodies of Wm. Dawe and Wm. Spencer, but up to the time the Maritime left (Sept. 16th) no trace of them had been discovered, although everything has been done and will be done in the hope of finding their bodies. If they were not killed by the sea it is thought they, being good swimmers, held on to part of the boat or oars and was carried some distance away from where the other men were drowned. The two spreads and the sculling oar were not

found.

It is thought that the accident happened by a heavy sea breaking on them while they were passing Mark's Point Rock, breaking the boat in pieces and killing the men or else leaving them to struggle helplessly in the water. Such is the history of the events which led up to the awful fatality which cost the lives of five of our best fishermen. — Bay Roberts Guardian.

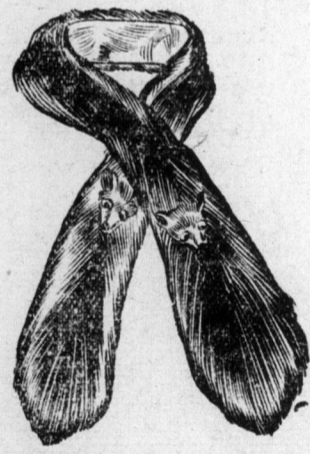

Their Liability.
Special Evening Telegram.
NEW YORK, Oct. 6. The limit to the liability of the owners of the Titanic, which sank on April 15th, is set at \$98,000, as compared with claims for damages, which aggregate over \$1,000,000. The limit is set by the United States District Court, upon petition of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company which owned the vessel. The company has furnished a bond for the amount, as security for paying the claims pro rata. Petitioners explained to the Court that the company's interest in the vessel is limited to the fourteen life-boats recovered, prepaid passage money amounting to \$255,212, freightage amounting to \$2,073. Everything with the steamer, except the fourteen lifeboats, became a total loss in the disaster, and petitioners claimed exemption from liability under the United States Statutes and the general rule of the Admiralty.

Clergymen Arrive.
Rev. Mr. Plowright, a Congregational minister, arrived by the Carthaginian. He will be attached to the Congregational Church at Little Bay East, Fortune Bay, but will be temporarily stationed at the Queen's Road Church here until a successor to Mr. Thackeray is appointed. Revs. Wheeler and Bevis, both Congregationalists, also arrived by the Allan boat. The former is accompanied by his wife and two children. He is en route to Kingston, N. S. Yesterday he preached at the Queen's Road Church. Rev. Mr. Bevis is returning to his parish at Canoe, N. S.

Another Man Drowned.
Passengers who arrived here by Saturday night's train from Placentia say that a boat belonging to the west side of St. Mary's Bay while running up the Bay out of a storm Friday night ran ashore on a sand bank. She struck heavily in the dark and tempest and the sudden shock threw one of her crew overboard and he disappeared in an instant. It was so dark and such a sea ran that no effort could be made to get him. The drowned man, our informants say, they think was single. They could not remember his name though they had heard it.

A LARGE ATTENDANCE.—It is a rare happening to see an overflowing audience to an afternoon performance, but such was the case on Saturday at the Nickel Theatre when the "Colleen Bawn" was shown for the last time. Standing room was at a premium and many people had to go away disappointed.

VESSELS DELAYED.—The Dunure has been ready to sail for Brazil since Friday and the Evelyn since Saturday. The vessels could not go however, owing to some of the crew absents themselves, a proceeding which is becoming annoying and expensive to owners and masters of vessels.

SPORTSMEN RETURN.—Messrs. W. A. Wood and his brother Ted arrived here by Saturday night's train after having been two weeks shooting on the Witless Bay line. They found birds very scarce, roughed it a great deal and only by travelling long distances did they secure fair bags of partridge.

Record Season For Fishing.
Total Catch Off Scotland Coast Estimated at \$3,500,000.
Three million five hundred thousand pounds for herring? That is the highly satisfactory result of the fishing season on the north east coast of Scotland, which is now rapidly drawing to a close. During the last four months the nightly labors of fishermen in the Minch and in the Pentland Firth have been attended with considerable success, and at Lerwick, Stronsay, Peterhead, Fraserburgh and all the other leading centres of industry the landings show a considerable advance compared with that of last year. Up to date the landings on the north coast of Scotland reach the substantial total of 1,490,000 crans. The cran measure contains about 750 herrings, so that during the 1912 season no fewer than 1,072,500,000 individual fish have been landed—enough to supply some ten dozen "caller herrin" fresh drawn from the sea to every family in the United Kingdom. No official statement of the prices realized has yet been issued, but it is an exceedingly conservative estimate to put the average value per cran at 25s. On that estimate the fishermen have received for the herring landed in Scotland this season £1,790,000. But that by no means represents the actual value of the herring fishing to Peterhead, Fraserburgh, Lerwick and the other centres of the important industry. To the sum mentioned must be added the wages of carters, fish curers, laborers, cooper, clerks and the little army of fish sales men, middlemen and retailers. The usual estimate is that about 100 per cent. must be added to the prices paid to the fishermen in order to obtain the actual value of the herring harvest to the country. On that basis the total catch on the north east coast of Scotland represents the substantial sum of £3,500,000. Many of the Highland fishermen have already returned to their native glens with well filled purses, having earned enough to keep them in tolerable comfort until the opening of the spring fishing next year.—Pall Mall Gazette.

Fire Alarm.
At 9.15 Saturday night an alarm of fire was sent in from Box 334, bringing the Western and Central firemen to the residence of Mrs. Rooney, Patrick Street. Mrs. Rooney had put some chemical in the stove which she was told would clean the chimney of soot. This caused it to blaze up furiously and the firemen on arrival mounted the roof and quenched the blaze with water passed up in buckets.

The Fogota Here.
The S. S. Fogota, Capt. Baxter Barbour, arrived here from the north at 11.30 last night. She had fine weather all through except on Friday night when it rained hard and was very thick. She made all her ports of call and brought a full freight of fish in casks and oil. Her saloon passengers were: Mesdames A. and R. Frozen Alive And Then Resuscitated.
Experiments With Animals Successful. May Revolutionize Meat Export.
St. Petersburg, Sept. 26.—Experiments made by Prof. Bachmetieff, formerly of Sofia, and now of Moscow University, have proved, it is announced, that animals may be frozen alive and then resuscitated none the worse. Prof. Bachmetieff calls this process "Anabiosis." The first experiments were made with cold blooded animals and insects, and afterwards warm-blooded animals and mammals were experimented on. Two hundred tests were made. Nearly all succeeded. Bats were refrigerated and kept "dead" for a long time, and later completely restored. These experiments open out remarkable prospects for the future. In fact, it is stated that it may even be possible to send refrigerated animals across the ocean and resuscitate them on arrival at their destination.

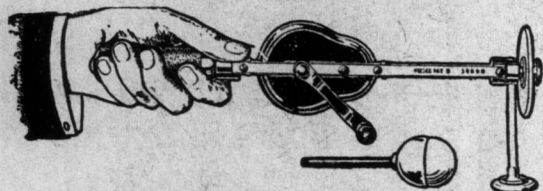


