HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

To preserve meat in hot weather, wash over with very weak vinegar and water, and then cover with slices of raw onion. Before cooking renove the onion and rinse in clea. cold water.

Eggplant stuffed is delicious. Cut he eggplant in two, scoop out each half with a silver spoon, boil till tender and season, adding a small mantity of breadcrumbs. Refill the shells and brown.

Cauliflower is delicious if boiled until it is tender, then drain and put into a baking dish. Make a drawn butter dressing and pour over it: then grate cheese on the top, set in the oven until it is brown, and serve.

To reduce the expense of running the gas range the following suggestions are made: Do not light the gas and then fill the teakettle. Do not cook vegetables and try to keep them hot, but turn the gas off and then when you are ready to serve put them on to heat. Remember that when the oven is going it is possible to cook vegetables in the warming oven. After a pot has started boiling it will keep boiling on the simmering burner. Remember that red flame wastes the gas and gives less heat; irn the burner down until the flame


