Steady progress is being made by

The French also have entered the German second line in Argonne forest. German counter attacks on Vauelers plateau south of Laon have been repulsed. Since the beginning of the offensive last Monday more than 19,000 Germans have been made prisoners. Guns captured the past five days exceed 100, not in cluding machine-guns. Northeast of ments of farmers or the trades of the Soissons the French on Friday occupied the village of Sancy, a mile east of Nanteuil Lafoss. They have continued to advance toward Chemindes-Dames, paralleling the Aisne four miles to the north of the river on Vauciers Plateau. In the region of Ailles and Hurtebia the Germans are reported by Paris to have launched an attack with large effectives. The effort was frustrated by artillery and machine gun fire. Artillery fighting in this region is reported to be continuing very actively. East of Rheims and Moronvilliers the French have taken several important positions of support. German resistance there is reported to have been stubborn. In Argonne French detachments penetrated German positions as far as the second trenches. A great number of German dead were found by the French. The abandonment of the ank of the River Aisne between Conde and Souhir is admitted by Berin, who declares the action completed the occupation of Siegfried positions which Berlin says the French followed hesitatingly. THE SHORTAGE OF DENTISTS.

It is remarkable that in this country, with its population of over 40,-000,000, there are only 5,000 duly qualified and registered dentists. Even among this small number-although the recent report of the Cocaine Committee does not mention the fact-a considerable proportion of the dentists were registered without examination, on the ground that they were in practice before the Dentists' Act was passed. On the other hand, there are in this country 8,000 engaged in the practice of dentistry who are not qualified, but as any person is legally entitled to practise dentistry provided he does not call himself a "dentist." or a "dental practitioner. there is at present no means of testing the capabilities of unregistered persons. The committee contents itself with recording the facts with regard to the dearth of registered dentists and makes no recommendations, for the simple reason that it was not within its province to do so, the committee's sole duty being to consider the question of the use of cocaine in dentistry.
