(5) Any Master of any vessel or steamer sail-

Electric Lighting

For Outports!

For a number of years there has been a growing demand for a satisfactory electric lighting system for use in the outports. There are dozens of so-called "farm lighting systems" on the market. Almost without exception they are unable to produce a steady flickerless current, without first charging storage batteries and then taking the lighting current from the batteries. In using this system they are up against many difficulties:—batteries of fair capacity are expensive; they require constant attention. When they are new, about 15 per cent. of the current is lost when passed through batteries; after one or two years this proportion rapidly increases; this means that a large proportion of the current is wasted; batteries that will produce 110 volt current are very expensive, therefore the manufacturers of most battery systems use what is known as low-voltage. A low-voltage current will only give a satisfactory light when used close to the battery. If the current is carried by wires to other buildings a short distance away, a great deal of energy is lost and it gives a poor light.

Low-voltage systems cannot use standard lighting equipment such as lamps, electric fans, electric irons, electric toasters, etc., but require special low-voltage apparatus from the factory.

After comparing the various lighting systems on the market.

After comparing the various lighting systems on the market, we found one that overcomes all these difficulties. It is known as the Unilectric Lighting Machine, which is the only machine of its kind made. It consists of an engine specially designed for electric lighting purposes, directly attached to a special dynamo and electric governor. This outfit will produce a steady flickeriess 110 volt current without having to depend on batteries; it will use all standard equipment in common use. Wires can be run from the engine in any direction up to two thousand feet without change.

Three of these lighting machines have been in use in Newfoundland from one to two years and are giving perfect satisfaction. Monsignor Reardon, Placentia, lights Church and Presbytery; Rev. Father Maher, St. Lawrence, lights Church, Presbytery; Convent and School; G. C. Fearn & Son, Placentia, light their shop, office, fish stores, saw mill, blacksmith's shop and ship yard. We have also ordered for them an electric boring machine to be run by current from Unilectric machine and to be used in shipbuilding.

We are now installing the Unilectric Lighting System for Mr. Fred Ayre in his country residence. The Unilectric Corporation of Detroit are doing their best to supply the demand for these machines, but do not expect to be able to furnish them at present prices except for a very short time. They have promised us three more machines at present prices if orders are sent in promptly.



### Thoughts Upon the Times

Now that the Minister of Militia is about to return home to take up the duties of his office, it is to be hoped that all business connected with the Regiment will be co-ordinated and consolidated under one head. The matter of pensions and separation allowances should come under the Militia Department. There is no longer any necessity for returned soldiers entitled to pensions to have to beat from office to office looking for the various parties who constitute the various parties who constitute the present Pension and Disability Board. This work in future will have to be performed by the Militia Department. Besides, the present Chairman of the Board has not the confidence of the public or the Regiment to justify his permanent appointment. Let this im-portant work be placed under the management of the Department to The time has now come for the peo-

ple of St. John's (and by the people I refer to the two-thirds of the population who cannot afford to pay down the cash for their winter's supply of coal) to take whatever steps they may consider necessary in their own interests to provide themselves with a cheaper fuel than Sydney soft coal at \$16 per tone. They should begin by respectfully, but firmly, insisting that His Excellency the Governor use his prerogative to remove the matter of coal supply out of the hands of the present Minister of Shipping entirely. In fact it is doubtful if the public interests would not be better served if the Ministry of Shipping was abolished altogether. What good has it done for the public, anyway? There are many who have come to look upon it as only a shield and protection to the profiteer.

The high freight rates on all our produce to England is still a matter of serious concern to the trade. Noth ing apparently has been done by the ent or the Ministry of Shipoing to have the rates reduced. We have received no better treatment in this respect from England than have Norway or Sweden. After all we have done by our efforts to keep the old flag flying, we are entitled to better consideration. But if our own authorities are content to let matters in this respect drift we may rely upon it conditions are not going to im-

It is very strange that the Advecate, which claims to be the personal organ of the fishermen, says nothing about the opening price of new fish. A day or two ago it announced thatthe price of fish in Lunenburg, N.S., was \$12.75 per qtl., against \$9.60 for corresponding period last year. It our Newfoundland fishermen get the same increase in price this year it will mean that new fish will be anywhere from \$13.50 to \$14.00 per qtl., which will only correspond with the increased cost of living. The silence of the Advocate and Mr. Coaker on this important matter is very remark-able and the fishermen as far north as Quirpon are anxious to know what has happened the Advocate, it keeps so silent on this burning question. The Herald Editor boasts of his patriotism and all he has done to help

win the war. When one remembers that up to April last the Herald Editor did his best to prevent Conscription, and was apparently satisfied to see the Royal Newfoundland Regiment go under for lack of recruits, one is tempted to question the loyalty of his particular brand of patriotism. From a personal and financial stand-point the Editor of the Herald has certainly benefited himself by his connection with patriotic and other work. His is the brand of patriotism that pays but not to boast of. The people of this country certainly do know him, and if he has any doubts on this score, let him visit some of the outports on either coast and he will have the fact demonstrated to him in a manner which he will never
