Flour.—The word seems to have gone all round the country to eat potatoes and stop buying flour. There is one thing sure we were blessed with an excellent potato crop this year, and it is not going to hurt anybody to eat potatoes instead of flour. There is nobody going to starve while they have plenty of codfish and potatoes, and the beautiful old "ragged jackets" that we see daily would satisfy the appetite of the most fastidious epicure. It is getting to be a joke among the retail grocers, as to who can offer flour cheapest, as they are coming to believe, that they cannot sell even if they offered their choicst brands for five dollars a barrel. We are curious people here in Newfoundland, but there is one thing certain that "a penny saved is a penny gained." and while we are eating potatoes grown in Newfoundland we are not sending money to Canada for flour, so the country should benefit.

Beef.—The imports for the week were only 250 barrels. This brings the total for St. John's to date up to 23,-656 barrels, as compared with 23,006 this date last year. There has been a good run on Beef by local purchasers all the fall, as compared with pork, owing to its relative cheapness. The H. S. market is dull and present prices under all circumstances are considered low. It is hard to believe in view of the decline in all commodities, that Beef can be expected to go higher. Prices are Bos Flank, \$26.00; Libby's Family, \$27.00; Family, 21.00; Boneless, \$21.25 to \$21.50.

Pork.—The importations this week were 200 barrels, making the total for St. John's since New Year 19,243 barrels against 25,670 this date last year. Dubuque, Iowa, Nov. 13.-The chief topic of discussion just now is the disarmament conference at Washington. Whether it accomplishes anything worth while depends upon the attitude of the various nations. Certainly the United States has made its position clear. Entire sincerity is seen in the proposals of Secretary Hughes, while the speech of President Harding voices the attitude of America on the momentous question. This country wants no foreign territory and if it builds up a big navy it is because other nations insist upon warproviding armaments. The President brought up the morality of holding the lands of another people in a manner that should give pause to those nations who have not heeded the lesson which the downfall of Germany has taught.

It now appears that the Filipinos are not pleased with the prospect of being cut entirely adrift by the United States. 




