We desire to abstain from any language which would cause an undiscriminating and unreflecting feeling of indignation; but we cannot but observe that this etime removes all doubt as to the nature of the struggle in which we are engaged. Our path will no longer be secured by the shadow of political consideration. The Fenians have cast the glare of a great moral crime upon the debatable ground which separates us, and we can no longer hesitate in what direction to advance No man deserving the name will venture to adduce political discontent in paliation of such an outrage as that of Friday. It excludes all considerations but one, that of protecting by every possible method the elementary rights of humanity. Warfare, however desperate, is not to be waged by these means, and if there can be any reasonable and responsible persons still engaged in the Fenian sonspiracy, they are as much interested as we ourselves in putting down such atrocities, It is fair to notice that Burke and Casey themselves, when brought up before the police court on Saturday protested their abhorrence of the means which had been employed on their behalf. On the most favourable view, however, they cannot shake clear of the responsibility of having employed agents who have proved capable of such an outrage. If they are proved to have taken part in organizing the Fenian conspiracy, they cannot escape the guilt of having deliberately let loose on this country a set of wholessale murderers. This is a fact we must now steadily face, and which has been indelibly imprinted on the public mind. We are confronted by a gang of reckless criminals, who respect no laws, human or Divine. We are far from saying that this is its practical issue at the present moment. That, and nothing better, is what it has come to jand we must also add that those who, after the exhibition of the characters who have been called together by the conspiracy, continue to belong to it, cannot be excused from responsibility for all its consequences.

A Tale of the Covenanters.

A Tale of the Covenanters.

The war between the two parties, the Resolutionists and Protesters, waxed so fierce and hot as to divide the Church asunder, and so to weaken it. It was the stricter Covenanters who were in the minority, but who made up for their deficiency in numbers by their zeal and faithfulness to the Covenant, which the whole nation and the King himself had sworn to adhere to, but which was in danger of being departed from.

At length Cromwell died, and it became evident that the Restoration of Charles was approaching. In view of this, the Resolutionists, opindirity of the rulers in the Kirk, entered into Inegotiations with Charles, abroad, for the support of Presbyterianism in Scotland in the event of his Restoration, and sent as their emissary in charge of the interests of the Kirk, the minister of Crail—James Sharp—who was desdined to become so notorious. Instead of proving faithful to his trust, he betrayed it, and arranged with Charles and Charendon that Episcopacy should be set up in Scotland, and that he, James Sharp, should be made Primate, and Archbishop of St. Andrews. Little dreaming of what was being concocted, the Resolutionists wrought on, against the opposition of the Frotesters, for the return of the King, and, in combination with the Royalist in the month of May 1690.

Alas! now for the Presbyterian Kirk in Scotland, and for the Protesters, the strict and true blue Covenanters. A terrible blunder had been committed. Before Charles was restored the English people exacted from him an indemnity for all that was past, but either by accident or design, no indennity was granted to the Scottish people, who were therefore liable to be visited with the vindictive revenge of the King; and it soon became apparent that the Royalists, disappointed of prey in England, were determined to reap a harvest of spoliation and retaliation in Scotland.

Middleton was appointed the King's Commissioner, and the Parliament of 4651 was

in Scotland.

Middleton was appointed the King's Commissioner, and the Parliament of 1651 was opened by him. This was but the semblance of a free Parliament, for measures had been taken to have it composed of those favourable to the designs of the King, and who would pass measures which would open the way for the introduction of Episcopacy. The first thing this Parliament did was to impose an oath of allegiance, making the King supreme in all matters, both civil and spiritual. They also condemned and disallowed the Covenant, and finished up by an Act repealing and abolishing the whole Scotlish statutes for the previous twenty years.

A pretty spell of preparatory work this we must admit, and well calculated to pave the way for the formal and undisguised introduction of Episcopacy. But the Royal vengeance was going haud in hand with it, for the Marquis of Argyle and the Rev. James Guthrie, of Stirling, the civil and spiritual leaders of the Protesters, or strict Covenanters, were brought to trial and executed, their deaths forshadowing darkly and significantly the cruel and ruthless policy which the Government meant to adopt towards those who were abiding faithful to the national oath.

At length, then, in September 1641, the King by a letter to the Frivy Council ordaned the establishment of Episcopacy in Scotland, and Sharp, and universal horror and amazement, declared that he was appointed Archibishop of St. Andrews. His atrocious treachery and apostacy filled the public mind with inexpressible indignation and disgust, which he braved with seeming indifference, though no doubt the guilty conscience which could not but reside in his bosom goaded him to the manifestation, of that savage and ferocious cruelty with which he persecuted those who remained steadfast to that Presbyterian faith which he had so solemnly professed, and so wickedly betrayed. Sharp forthwith appointed his Bishops, and amid great pomp and display they were received into the Parliament of 1652—a most memorable year in the history of the Cove

hop of the diocese before the 20th of September.

So much for the selt-willed high-handed proceedure of the King and his obsequious tools in the Government. But how did the people feel in relation to the new order of things? Were they tamely acquiescing in and patiently submitting to it? Did they receive it in silence and give no sign of opposition? Most unquestionably not. Alramed and indignant voices were raised everywhere in protest, remonstrance and warning. The faithful and conscientious amongst the ministers preached against it from the pulptt.
