In a cleft of one of the hills, and not far from where the road, after traversing the moor, became lost again among the eastern eminences, stood a diapidated shelling, the decaying walls of which were not calculated to afford much shelter in that inclement season. Yet was the hut inhabited, for blue smoke curled up from the short chimney stump which graced one end of the rude building, and through the small window and half-open door the firelight began to gleam, as the light of day faded from the dreary scene.

THE HEAVY THUNDER STORM—DAMAGES IN SALEM.—The thunder storm of Sunday night—which exceeded any of previous years in point of continuance, and the torrents of rain accompanying it, did considerable damage in Salem. Owing to the river having risen several feet above its ordinary height, the ground and basements of buildings in the vicinity thereof were completely inundated as the night advanced, and at about half past five on Monday morning Mr. Eby's mill dam succumbed to the pressure and fury of the swelling water, and with a noise not unlike the booming of a distant cannon, was washed away into the seething current, with scarcely a vestige of it left to mourn the loss of the structure. The basement of Mr. Munroe's house was covered with about three feet of water, and Mrs. Mulligan, who occupies these premises, on awaking found that the bedstead, like an island, was entirely surrounded therewith. She was compelled to effect an escape through a window. Mr. Geo. Eddliston's kitchen was also flooded to the height of eight or nine inches, and we understand he had great damage done to his furniture in the lower part of his house. MORE EFFECTS OF THE THUNDER STORM.—We learn that Mrs. Stack's house, Elora and Saugeen Road, was entirely destroyed by lightning on Sunday night; but, strange to say, Mrs. Stack and three children, who were in deep repose at the time, were uninjured. A flour barrel standing at the foot of the bedstead, was shivered into atoms and the contents scattered over the room, also the cooking stove and several other articles in an adjoining room, were struck by the lightning and fragments were sent with tremendous force against the walls and windows. The roof of the dwelling house was taken completely off. An outhouse was lifted from its foundation and shattered to pieces, and a cow that was stabled there loseths life by the striking of the electric fluid. It may be almost considered miraculous that Mrs. Stack's life and that of her children, should have been saved—it is an instance of wonderful preservation.


