From the Hamilton papers we learn that on Sunday morning last a most diabolical attempt was made to five a honge owned and occupied by Peter James Me-Kee, situated in the township of Glanford, about seven miles from the city. An examination was held before the Police Magistrate on Monany afternoon and the following facts elicited: Frank Waters, a colored man, asserts that he was instructed by Thos, Goodman, brother-in-law of Mr. McKee, to fire McKee's house, and told how to do it. According to his instructions, he went to the house, which is a frame one, and poured coal oil about the walls. He next fore a horse blanket into three parts, and having saturated them with coal oil, placed them against the wall in different places. Waters says that he lighted a match, which did not burn, and then zave up the attempt and went away. From the appearance of things in the morning, it is evident, however, that fire was actually applied and made some headway before it was put out. No explanation can be given why such a dastardly act should be midertaken, unless it was intended that the whole family should be destroyed, in which case the property would revert to Goodman. 

About the 17th of March the y-ang seals are generally cancured. In many instances the valuable "white coats" are discovered in such vast numbers that, literally, they cover every portion of the ice to the horizon on all sides. The cry raised by the young seals when heard at a distange is very like the whining of a child, and when on the point of being slaughtered, they cry so plaintively that warm-hearted fishermen are frequently compelled to delay the bloody deeds. Upon reaching the long-desired lair of the sea-calf, the crew of each vessel arm themselves with long poles called "agifs," and knives known as "sculping-knives." Thus equipped, the sealers disembark, and march forth upon the ice, two by two, to begin their campaign against the seal. They go in pairs so that one may assist the other in case of danger. The gloomy silence of the wild Northiand is broken by the loud songs, laughter and ribaldry indulged in by the hunters, whose hearts grow bnoyaut over their prospective fortune. On approaching the seal the hunters strike one blow of the gaf upon its head, which quickly depatches their viettim. There is no living thing so sensitive to any stroke in the region of the brain as the seal. One expert hunter can kill circh or ten seals within the space of a few minutes. After killing a large number, scalers is begin the essential work of skulping and skinning. The first operation is performed by making a deep cut, extending from the scal's hind dippers to its mouth. Then the fat and skin, which are generally about its inches in thickness, are easily removed from the worthless carcass, which is left on the ice. Having packed the skins together, the seal-hunters carry them in 'hauls' to the side of their vessel, where they are counted and hoisted on board. Many times the men who go from their ships in search of seals are benighted and loss sight of their vessels. This terrible accident, is very frequent during the scaline volvee. In such instances, men have remained several days without food, and have been found lying on the ice, famished and frost-bitten. When their vessels lost sight of at night, a change of wind may come and so after the appearance of the fields and boulders of ire around her, that the unfortunate scalers forfeit their only guides to their vessel's position. 
