To reduce it down to hours, we find at 13,512 hours have passed since remier Borden had the power to carry out his promise. effect at any future time. His colleagues in the Saskatchewan election insisted that the promise was good only with Conservatives in office in that province. His leading suporters in Alberta say that he should ave no dealings with any but the faithful. So there we are. The people of Alberta never heard a more finite election promise made. They ave never seen an election promise nore flagrantly and corruptly violated. Surely they will always resent this crude attempt to bribe them to defeat





### SIR MAX AITKEN AND RATE-PAYERS APPROACH AGREE-MENT ON STREET RAILWAY

Medicine Hat, Alta., April 25.—By a unanimous vote this afternoon, the city council decided to submit to a vote of the people an agreement with the Montreal Engineering company for the installation of a street railway n Medicine Hat. The date for getting the views of the burgesses in tangible form was set for May 22, the earliest possible after the advertisement.

For the last six or eight months the city's representatives have been en-deavoring to reach an agreement for Sir Max Aitken, who is interested in the Montreal Engineering Corpora-tion. Several times the contract has been sent back and forth, the city having the advice of the best legal talent, not only locally, but in Calgary and Winnipeg, to look after the interests of the city, and it is believed that a contract that will be entirely equitable and fair to both sides is the result, and which will be voted on in less than a month.

A day or two ago the agreement was finally received from Montreal, duly signed, and last evening, at the request of Mayor Spencer, a general meeting of the board of trade was held. After full discussion the board of After full discussion the board of trade unanimously decided that the matter should be referred to the vot-ers, and the council took the necessary action to that end today.

The franchise is for 20 years, with the privilege of renewal for five years, the city to have privilege of taking over by arbitration at the end of either period. If the former, then to pay 15 per cent in addition to valuation, payment to be made in the city's five per cent debentures at the mar-ket price. Work is to start within three months of passing the bylaw, and three miles to be completed within nine months, three more miles within nine months, and an additional three miles in twenty months, all routes to be by resolution of the council. Three routes are to be arranged at first, namely, city hall to fair grounds, city hall to Canada Cement company's site, and city hall to Maple Leaf mill site.

Power will be purchased from the city, either in the form of electricity or in that of natural gas, the latter at the rate of five cents per 1,000 feet, and the power house must be located in the city limits. Many other provisions are contained in the agreement, including use of poles by city, rights for tearing up streets, schedules of running, equipment with 80-pound rails, extensions, paving, forfeitures arbitration, etc. An important feature is that the company will pay the city five per cent on the gross earnings with taxes after the city reaches a population of 40,000 by police cen-sus, and after it has a population of 100,000, the rate is ten per cent and

city should install its own street rail-way, the entire city council, with the expensive experience of other Alberta cities in front of them, and with a program that will require millions in the next few years for general public expenditures, did not feel like recommending a municipal railway to the voters at this time. The concern will likely be known as the Medicine Hat Electric Railway, and with the im-portant financial interests identified with it, it is believed that it will not only provide much needed transpor-tation here, but will attract many new industries to be added to the list which is now lengthening monthly.

### CAPT. ROALD AMUNDSEN **COMING TO CALGARY** TO GIVE A LECTURE

It was a very thrilling moment in the world's history when five hardy Norwerian explorers raised the flag of Norway upon the southernmost extremity of the earth. One can vaguely imagine the elation of Captain Abundsen and his men, who braved the terrors of the Antarctic barrier, the bitter cold, the yarning crevasses, and the perilous, trailless mountains, that they might complete the conquest of the earth.

The world knows the essential facts of the discovery, but the people of Calgary will see on May 28 the leader and hero of this history-making expedition who will tell the thrilling story of the dash for the world's last unknown place; and recount the feelings of joy in this supreme hour of glosy, as they tore aside the veil of mystery—and one of the carth's secrets ceased to exist.

Most sverybody now knows considerable about Captain Amundsen's discoveries but comparatively few know much about the man. Who is this persistent explorer, who, at the age of 40 years has navigated the Northwest Passage, relocated the North Magnetic Pole and discovered the South Pole?

Roald Amundsen was born at Borge, near Sarpsburg, Norway, in 1872. He en-

North Magnetic Pole and discovered the South Pole?

Roald Amundsen was born at Borge, near Sarpsburg, Norway, in 1872. He entered the Anderson Academy and graduated from the college in 1890. Then he studied medicine for two years at the University of Christiania. Although a bright student the dull routine of school life didn't appeal to young Amundsen, who was strong and athletic. When Dr. Nansen left on his expedition to the North Pole Amundsen would have gone with him, but his mother would not let him go, thinking he was too young to go out on expeditions yet. But Amundsen wanted to go to sea and so he entered the Norway-Sweden naval service and became a lieutenant. In 1897-99 he was first orficer on the "Beigica" of the Beigian expedition, which explored the region west of Graham Land. In 1891 he made valuable observations of the East Greenland curren. In June, 1893, he headed the expedition sent out to relocate the Northwest Passage. Both of these objects he accomplished in the summer of 1994. He safely brought his ship, the Gjoa, through the archipelago into Alaskan water in 1905, the first ship in the world's history to traverse the Northwest Passage.


