

Three Cars Hurled Down Embankment and Many Passengers Injured. Corning, N. Y., Jan. 14.—The Fall-brook railway passenger train, No. 6, was wrecked at Pine, Pa., or the Pine Creek division, at 3:30 o'clock this after-noon. A huge tree came down the mountain side, which rises almost per-nendicallerly with the track and struck pendicularly with the track, and struck the train, raising it from the track.
