AGAINST THE ARISTOCRACY

MR. GLADSTONE'S RECOGNITION OF THE HOUSES.

Feb. 7.—The several changes among the men in office which Mr. Gladstone has just made, have somewhat disturbed the impression of harmony and permanency which was given by his first appointments.
