





BROILED SALT CODFISH.-Soak the codifish in cold water to remove the salt; dry with a cloth, broil over a clear fire for ten or fitteen minutes. When cooked serve on a hot platter, with melted butter poured over.

MEAT SOUFFLE .- Make one cup of cream sauce and season with chopped parsley and onion juice. Stir one cup of chopped meat into the sauce. When hot, add the beaten yolks of two eggs, cook one minute, and set away to cool. When cool stir in the whites of the eggs, stilly beaten. Bake in a but-tered dish, and serve immediately.

PANADA .- In the sick room stale PANADA.—In the sick room stale bread is not to be despised. Panada is is one of the first dishes usually or-dered by physicians, in cases of pain-ful sore throat. Cut light stale bread in half inch cubes, put into a china bowl, sprinkle with one tablespoonful of white sugar and drop in a half daz-en grains of allspice. 
