Lavish Notes.

LENT.

The season of Lent is a recognized factor of our moral life, recognized not only by the Church, but by the world. What it is to the spiritual life of the individual we need not try to define here; but of one thing we are sure, that Lent should be a preparation for doing good, not merely for being good. Our Lent must be positive, not negative. Effort must always be the purpose of rest, and labour for the kingdom, the excuse for withdrawing from men, as did our Lord in the fast that we commemorate at this season. Those who would rightly follow Christ into the mountain must do it that with Him they may return to strengthen the brethren.

Special preachers during the month have been, The Revs. O. Rigby, C. A. Shortt, E. C. Cayley and Prof. Cody.

On Sunday, February 19th, Hymns Ancient and Modern were used for the first time in this. Owing to the battered condition of Church. the hymn-books in the Church, a new supply had become a necessity, and in an address from the pulpit the Rector gave several good reasons why Hymns Ancient and Modern should supersede the old selection. One very good reason is that, it brings St. George's into line with nearly all the other churches, so that not only in our worship but in our praise we are using the same words as our brethren. The books have been most generously provided, so as not to be a charge upon the church funds.

The congregation is reminded that the Church's On Friday, 10th inst., the Rev. Claude accounts for the year are closed on March 31st, so Andrews, of Holy Trinity, will preach at 5 p.m., that all church dues, pew rents, envelope offerings, etc., should be paid by Sunday, March 26th, int order that the accounts for the year may be as complete as possible when brought before the Annual Vestry Meeting on Easter Monday.

During February the poor of the parish were remembered by three members of the congregation who contributed five dollars each through parochial channels, besides offerings at week-day services.

It is a rule with book-sellers to make the introduction of a new hymn book into a church easier by offering the book at reduced rates. For a time, therefore, any who wish to have their own hymn or tune books can obtain them at the following rates: Tune books, \$1.15 or 60 cents, according to size; Hymn books, 60 cents, for old people; 30 and 15 cents for the sizes in general use.

GIRLS' AUXILIARY No. 2.

During the past month the above society has been formed by four members of the Guild of St. Agatha, who are able and willing to give an afternoon a week to the service of God in helping missions. After asking permission of the Rector to form a Children's Mission Band, they themselves got the children together and now, after four meetings, have twenty-one members on the roll. This Girls' Auxiliary No. 2 will work in connection with the Guild of St. Agatha, which is known as Girls' Auxiliary No. 1. The children come from the various schools they attend to the school-house, the meeting beginning about 4 p.m. Any new members will be welcomed. The superintendent of the children is of course a member of St. Agatha's Guild, but the other officers are elected by and from the children. Miss Ella Winsor is the Secretary, and Miss Bessie Howe Treasurer.
