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
Imports of Section 20, many of which are included in the history of the early development of our County nowise pre-occupy us in these columns. Research, however, has shown that one of those last imports from Europe—especially Britain—was the Great Victoria Bridge, and the name of that bridge should the name of the monument that it was intended to be erected at the east end of the Avenue of the Countrymen. The Victoria now lies in permanent repose.

John McLean of Elginburgh, a prominent engineer, knew that the best way to build such a bridge was to let it have a flat deck, so he got his men to work on the plan, and the first model was built by the help of Mr. James Macmillan, a Scotch architect. The project was submitted to the Board of Trade, and the Board accepted it and ordered the contractors to proceed with the work. The contractors were John & Son, and they completed the bridge in 1864. It was the first bridge across the Zennor River, and it was a great engineering achievement. The bridge has since been replaced by a more modern one, but it stands as a reminder of the ingenuity and skill of the early engineers.



JOHN MCLEAN

John McLean was born in 1815 in Edinburgh, Scotland. He was a civil engineer and a prominent figure in the development of the Zennor River area. Among his many achievements, he designed the first bridge across the Zennor River, which became known as the McLean Bridge. He also worked on the construction of the Elgin Railway and the Elgin Canal.




THE OXFORD FOUNDRY.

WE have just received the results of an investigation made by a committee appointed by the Board of Trade in 1861 to inquire into the causes of the explosion of the steamship Xerxes, which took place on the afternoon of January 28, 1860. The report states that there was no negligence or carelessness in the management of the ship, and that the explosion was caused by the ignition of the gunpowder stored in the ship.

The report also states that the cause of the explosion was due to the fact that the gunpowder was stored in an unsafe manner, and that the ship should have been fitted with a better system of ventilation.








