50 TO 60 INJURED WHEN PARK PIER COLLAPSED

Wharf at Montreal Pleasure Resort Was Packed With People When Whole Centre Caved In-No Deaths Reported. Worst Cases Being Broken Legs and Ribs.

MONTREAL, June 25 .- Thru the collapse of a wharf at King Edward Park, pleasure resort on Isle Gros Bois, 12 miles from here, between fifty and sixty people were injured and the wildest excitement caused thruout the

when the wharf was packed with hunpreds of pleasure seekers awaiting the ferry boat which would carry them back to Montreal

The only warning was a crackling of strained timbers a few seconds before the whole centre of the wharf caved in. The people tried frantically to retreat, but so large was the crowd that escape was impossible and hundreds plunged downwards in the midst of shattered beams and planks.

In the city was hastened to the city pier, while rumors of 30 and 40 killed were spread everywhere. At the park, meanwhile, cooler heads organized those who had escaped the cave-in and the victims were extricated from the debris, while petticoats and handkerphiefs were hurriedly torn into bandshould arrive. As rapidly as possible the injured were placed on the ferry boats, but it was after midnight before the last of the injured had been re-

moved to the city.
So far no deaths have been reported, the worst cases being broken legs and ribs. About twenty cases were removed to the hospitals, the others reing sent home after the wounds had

The park has just been opened for the season after a great deal of new construction work having been done. Over ten thousand people visited it No official statement has been made by the proprietors of the park.



Constitutionality of Bill Now Before the United States Senate May Be Attacked in the Courts if it is Passed by Less Than a Two-Thirds

NEW YORK, June 25 .- The Washngton correspondent of The Sun writes:

"Among the interesting developments in the reciprocity situation is the statement that the constitutionality of the Canadian reciprocity bill will be attacked in the courts if it should pass by less than a two-thirds vote on the ground that it is in the nature of a treaty, which requires a two-thirds vote of the senate for ratification.

The Republican insurgents are now The Republican insurgents are now the only obstacles in the way of an agreement to vote on the reciprocity bill and the two tariff bills now before the senate. If the insurgents would consent to the fixing of a day it is reasonably certain that the regular Republicans and the Democrats could agree upon dates for votes in time to bring about the adjournment of congress before September 1.

The insurgents are still hopeful of making a combination with the Democrats by which they can amend the Canadian bill. The Democratic senators, it was learned to-day, will hold a conference next week, and it is now certain that a great majority of them

certain that a great majority of them will decide to support the Canadian reciprocity bill without amendment. Against this proposal will be arrayed not to exceed four and probably only three Democrats. Senator Balley of Texas will be commended in this for

LIAMILTON **TAPPENINGS**

INSIDIOUS FIGHT IS WASED BY CATABACT CO.

Specious Appeals to Self Interest of Ratepayers-Hope to Win by Opponent's Sloth.

HAMILTON, June 25.—(Special.)— One calendar month from to-day the ratepayers of Hamilton will settle the fate of the municipal power and light bylaw. This is assuming of course that the city council to-morrow night people, and of that there is no doubt, even among those opposed to the mea-sure. That the bylaw will be subjected to strong opposition is beyond question. The Dominion Power and Transmission Co., the Cataract Company, has already begun an attack on the project, which it is believed, on account of its boldness and spe-cious appeals to the self-interest of the ratepayers, will prove more effective than any opposition heretofore di-rected against the hydro-electric scheme in this city. Realizing the importance of organization, the Cataract has not been slothful in that direction, The employes of the company were recently called together, and after being lectured on the calamitous nature of the proposed municipal power and light system, were pledged to support the company in its effort to defeat the bylaw. It is understood that the company has also made adequate arrangements to get to the polis on July 25 every voter who can be in-

duced to vote against the bylaw.

As regards a campaign for the bylaw, a somewhat careful canvass of the situation leads to the conclusion that the preponderance of bydro sentiment exhibited in previous hydro campaigns has lulled many of the supporters of the present municipal scheme into a fancied security, and has encouraged the belief that no organized effort to pass the bylaw will be necessary. Beyond the able and consistent support of the measure by The Herald nothing has yet been done to offset the activity of the bylaw's enemies. It is understood, however, that several of the friends of the municipal scheme have within the last few days reached the conviction that energetic action is immediately necessary, and it is likely that early this week the forces favorable to the by-law will be organized, and that a vigorous campaign will be iaunched to ensure the success of the municipal magstre when it comes before the cate payers of Hamilton on July 25.
