THE NATIONAL PARTY.

Party leaders hate nothing like new issues. They fly away from them just as Melbourne did seventy-five years ago. "Why can't you let things stay as they are?" the old Whig demanded.

But the Canadian people are getting into the way of making new issues. There never was a time in the history of Canada when there was a greater mass of voters standing between the hide-bound partisans on both sides.

Their chief enemy is the Laurier party in the house of commons—a party whose members have been bought, bludgeoned and jolted into an integrity acquiescent, automatic machine.

Had the house of 1872 been as subservient to the government of that day as is the house of 1905, would Sir John Macdonald have been compelled by his own followers to walk out of office?

Of course, the old party leaders will find nothing too strong to say in the way of derogation against the rebellious political freethinkers. The samut of denunciation will be run from disparagement to innuendo.

It is a struggle going on in both the old parties. Men are breaking away day by day. They are making no noise about it, but they will be there with their votes to help to smash the old systems when the time comes.

There will be a sufficient opinion of itself to say that it is engaged in one of the severest struggles ever known in the history of Canadian newspapers.

It is fighting for public rights against the corporations and those politicians who live by the corporations. It is also often fighting lone-handed.

Most of these corporation papers were at one time advocates of public rights. The papers that the corporations control in Toronto jumped with one accord to sing the song of the Canada Life Assurance Company.

And now let us come to this question of life insurance. When the revelations were first made in New York the government at Ottawa was asked in the house if they were watching the situation and were they certain what had been uncovered in the States was not more or less extensive.

Mutual Life President Loses His Temper and Persistently "Declines to Discuss"—Company Has a Professional Press Agent.

New York, Oct. 17.—Testimony in the insurance investigation which was resumed yesterday after a week's adjournment of the legislative committee, taken because of the death last week of S. Fred Nixon, speaker of the assembly, was most exciting throughout the entire day.

Mr. McCurdy, president of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, testified that he had been asked several times during the day's testimony to temporarily interrupt the testimony. These requests were made by Mr. Hughes, the counsel for the committee.

In Mr. McCurdy's testimony to-day it was disclosed that the Mutual Life Company had a secretary named McCurdy who was sent out to the press of the country to give the impression that the company was in a financial straits.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—(Special).—The appointment of A. Bruce Smith of the G. N. W. Telegraph Co. at Toronto, as manager of telegraphs on the Grand Trunk Pacific has given rise to a report that the G. T. P. is to have a competitive telegraph line from ocean to ocean.

It is probable that, within the next five years, there is to be a fight to a finish between the G. T. P. and the G. N. W. Tel. Co., that is to say, the Goulds, for it is they, as principal stockholders in the Western Union, who control the G. N. W.

In order to make an independent telegraph system a practicable success, it is imperative that offices be established in all the large cities and towns in Canada, without regard to whether the railway company's tracks enter them.

The increasing demand for iron and steel in Canada, due chiefly to the proposed tremendous development through extensions and new construction by the principal Canadian railroad systems, is the vital concern of the G. T. P.

In answer to a question yesterday, Premier Whitney stated to the committee that he had no objection to the settlement of the steam railroads would not do so.

The arrival of Dan on Monday night was opportune, and no doubt had something to do with the board of control's ruling yesterday, that the pace with a continental fair was to be abandoned in the view of Torontonians.**

It was not an easy matter to get permission for Dan, Noble and Aid, McBrice, who represented the Driving Club, had to use much persuasion. A motion by Controller Hubbard, that the Driving Club be allowed to carry out its compact for an exhibition on Saturday, was in favor of the racing exhibition, objected to its being given under the club's auspices.

However, Dan Patch will perform, and the rest of the card will also be given, but that will end the career of the Driving Club in the exhibition track is concerned.

**Jeuneau Still Wait.**

The controllers are not yet prepared to clinch matters regarding the exhibition of Toronto Junction, and Mayor Smith and the department of council are waiting for the result of the investigation. Incidentally, a bit of discussion developed, in which it was pointed out that the city would agree to nearly all the conditions except assuming the junction's debt, which particular condition the mayor acquiesced in. The suggestion that reports be had from the city engineer as to the advisability of a system of installing a tramway system at the junction was adopted.

**Concerning a Payment.**

A deposition of residents in the northwest end of the city appeared before the board to ask for the laying of a pavement on Bloor-street, between Dundas and Bathurst-streets. It was claimed that the roadway was in a miserable condition, and that the city was paying out a great deal of money for the maintenance of the roadway, and that the city should be allowed to lay a pavement on the roadway. The members of the department were told that Mr. Rust would be glad to lay a pavement on the roadway, and were advised not to sign any more petitions gotten up by companies.

**Persistent Unpleasantness about the safety of the old fort brought before the board yesterday the case of the Empire Loyalist Association, including President MacLaurin, Canon McNair and Lieut.-Col. Shaw. They were told to wait until the city engineer had recommended a route.**

It was stated by the mayor that the property commission had found an available site for the suggested new road, and that the location of the road is being held back for the solid reason that there are no property owners on the site. The price would probably be raised to a prohibitive figure.

**Island Committee.**

It was not a particularly weighty matter that came up yesterday, but it had its points of interest. The I. A. A. had had a meeting at the city hall, and had adopted a resolution to erect a new clubhouse on Long Pond below Hallam's Bridge, and yesterday A. A. Denison, secretary of the association, appeared to urge the matter. The assessment committee of the city, which was asked to grant a special license for the erection of a building, and that a yearly rental of \$50 be paid besides taxes for the lot. Denison said it was only desired to spend \$5,000 or \$4,000, and that the amount of the license should be reduced if the club was designed for social purposes and would not yield revenue. The committee decided to wait for more information. A precedent appears to have been established in the case of the erection of the R. C. Y. C. at a \$50 yearly rental.

**Lighting Contracts Delay.**

The awarding of contracts for the city's street lighting will probably be deferred for a time. City Engineer Rust has been unable to get the necessary department having asked that there be delay until the gas lamps offered in the tenders have been examined, and until it has been made clear why the electric light company tendered under the old, not the new specifications drawn up.

They spend huge sums in sight-seeing, and they thought it was a pity that Canada organizes a huge party and conduct tourists thru this magnificent country? Our scenery cannot be surpassed by any other scenery in the world. The people would not then spend their millions out of the empire."

Prof. Odium has been twice sent to England in connection with trade and immigration matters, once by the British Columbia government and once by the Canadian government. Prof. Odium made a fortune in the gold mines of British Columbia, and for the last few years has been devoting his life to the interests of science and ancient history.
