



DR. BAIN, LIBRARIAN, DEAD
AFTER A QUARTER CENTURY'S
VALUABLE SERVICE TO CITY

To His Knowledge and Work Toronto Owes Possession of Great Collection of Books of National Interest and Information.

The death of James Bain, Jr., following so closely on that of his venerable father in his 92nd year, only a few days ago, removes one of the best-known and most quietly influential citizens of Ontario. He was seized by an acute malady of the liver only a few months ago, hope of his ultimate recovery being abandoned almost from the first. Dr. Bain was born in London, England, Aug. 2, 1814, and was therefore in his 94th year. With his parents, who were both natives of Edinburgh, he came to Canada early in life and was educated at the Toronto Academy, the Jarvis-street grammar school and Toronto University. He obtained his first business training in his father's bookselling and stationery business, and later with James Campbell & Son. In 1870 for this firm he began to visit England as a buyer, and opened a branch establishment in London in 1874. This was continued till 1875, when he became a partner of John Nimmo & Co. and as Nimmo & Bain remained in business until 1882, when the firm dissolved. He then returned to Toronto and was for a short time manager of the Canada Publishing Co. In 1883 he was appointed first chief librarian of Toronto Public Library, which position he held till his death.

POLICE CAN CONFISCATE
TOBACCO ON CHILDREN

One of the Provisions Contained in Aylesworth's Anti-Cigarette Bill—Cannot Prohibit

OTTAWA, May 22.—(Special.)—In the house to-day Hon. Mr. Aylesworth introduced his bill "to restrain the use of tobacco by young persons." He explained that it was an attempt to meet a call that had been heard for legislation, but he could not pretend to hope to satisfy those who desired prohibition of the sale or manufacture of tobacco in a form supposed to be particularly deleterious. It was proposed to make it an offence to furnish or sell to any person under 16 years of age tobacco in any form for consumption, and a penalty of \$1 for second offence and \$4 for third offence may be imposed. Any police constable will be authorized to seize upon and summarily forfeit tobacco found on any girl or boy under 16 years of age. He said prohibitory legislation was on the statute books of some of the provinces, but there was room for doubt whether or not this legislation was ultra vires.


HUGHES DEFENDS
AND FOWLER
JIBES

Acrimonious Debate in Commons, in Which Cleavage in the Party is Made Clear.

OTTAWA, May 22.—(Special.)—This was an afternoon of Sam Hughes and George W. Fowler. Col. Sam warmly attacked his colleague, Col. Worthington, while Citizen Fowler "dressed down" the veteran Hughes. The government side sat back and watched the civil war proceed with evident enjoyment.

It was all over the Ross rifle, of which Col. Hughes is an ardent defender. He rose amid provoking silence. When R. L. Borden saw that the colonel was pausing for a little encouragement he gently tapped his desk, and then the government side burst into applause. "When the Conservatives went into opposition Sir Charles Tupper asked me to take charge of the militia affairs of the country, and when Mr. Borden succeeded to the leadership of the party he renewed that confidence, and his request has invariably been to probe to the bottom any expenditure of this department," declared the colonel. He (Hughes) accepted the chairmanship of the militia committee of the opposition on the understanding that this department should be removed, as far as possible, from the arena of politics. He hoped he might induce his leader to see the error of his way in allowing this matter to be thrown into politics. He thought he could make Col. Worthington "smile on the other side of his face," and he would challenge him to show that in the United States any politician would be base enough to make any capita out of a question of arming the militia.

TRIO MAY BE
BAD ACTORS

Those Art Vendors Arrested at Buffalo, and Chicago Operations May Have Been Their's.

Upon information furnished by Superintendent Welsh of the Canadian Detective Bureau, M. F. Terry, R. Lee Van Wermer and H. S. Levy, the three gentlemen art vendors who were "chased" from Toronto where they tried to put thru a deal with a wealthy Sherbourne-street resident, are in custody in Buffalo under suspicion of being about to perpetrate a fraud in that city.

The first two are also thought to be the men who some months ago secured \$20,000 in notes and cheques from Mrs. James A. Patten of Evanston, Ill., for whom the Chicago police are still on the hunt. In Chicago those who were arrested were a wealthy wife of another millionaire for \$60,000 in notes for which her husband later paid as a compromise \$10,000 for the return of the notes. They told of selling \$250,000 worth of rare books to J. Wesley Ladd of Portland, Ore. The men whole under arrest in Toronto spoke of this sale and gave an accurate description of Mr. Ladd, who is well known to Detective Welsh. The man is on his way from Chicago seeking to identify them as the Chicago "con" artists where the game was also rare books. The trio are known to have sold a St. Catharines man four pictures for \$500 for which purpose the St. Catharines man went to Niagara Falls, N. Y. He did not receive the pictures, but refused to prosecute. Terry is now identified as a well known confidence man and "phony" cheque worker.

STIRLING STILL LIBERAL

Sir Campbell-Bannerman's Former Seat Remains True. (Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, May 22.—The by-election for the Stirling district of burghs, consequent on the death of the late Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, resulted in the return of Arthur Ponsonby, the Liberal candidate, who polled 3373, against 2512 cast for William White-law, who stood in the Unionist interest. The government majority was thus 1362.

The Stirling group of burghs was represented by the late premier for the long period of 40 years, he having been first returned at the general election of 1868. His lowest majority was 100 in 1890, when he defeated the Conservative opponent by 880; at the previous election in 1885 it was 1123. In 1906 he was returned unopposed. Mr. Ponsonby is an Englishman and was a strong opponent of the Liberal party. Mr. White-law is a native and has been before the electors for the last six months preparing for next general election. The Liberal majority is above the normal.

KING'S MESSAGE
TO TORONTO
JUNJORS

Should Live as Well as Die for Empire, Says Earl Grey, Addressing School Children.

Thousands of people witnessed the brightest spectacle yesterday that has yet been provided in Toronto in celebration of Empire Day.

Over 2000 pupils from the various schools and collegiate institutes were in line, and all along the route to Queen's Park an admiring throng applauded the young patriots. Queen's Park was in its most inviting dress. The pupils assembled at the armories at 1:30 o'clock, each school corps coming in a body, and the whole furnishing an animated and brilliant spectacle as they "wound about and in and out," in taking up their positions in the line of march. When word was given by Lieut.-Col. J. T. Thompson, the cadet band struck into a martial air and the parade proceeded.

First came the flower bearers—six little girls of selected heights from each school, dressed in spotless white and bearing tiny stretchers heaped with brilliant floral tributes.

Then came the bands of the High School Cadets and the Industrial School. Next in line were the cadets looking proud and soldier-like, the high school corps in black rifle uniforms, and the public school companies in scarlet coats. Following these were hundreds of the younger boys armed with wooden guns. Each school was distinguished by a floral badge worn in the caps.

The route of march was down University-avenue, along Queen, up Yonge to Grosvenor-street, and thence west into Queen's Park, where they were reviewed as they marched past by His Excellency Earl Grey and General Cotton, who were mounted on the steps of the parliament buildings.

At the conclusion of the decorative ceremonies the cadets and school corps were lined up in front of the pavilion, where, despite the efforts of the authorities, who had roped off a large space, five thousand people crowded close to the ranks.

In the pavilion were His Excellency Earl Grey, with the countess and Lady Sybil Grey, Sir Harry Williams, Capt. Plofing, General Cotton, Edmund Bristol, M.P., Mayor Oliver and Mrs. Oliver, the chairman and members of the board of education with their wives; Mrs. Albert Nordheimer, and Mr. and Mrs. Ramsey of Scotland. Dr. Ogden, chairman of the board of education, introduced Earl Grey.

"Sons and daughters of Toronto, citizens of this British Empire, children of the King," began his excellency. "I wish to tell you how glad I am to see you here today again. Among all the functions in which I, as governor-general, have to take part in the course of a year, there is none so dear to me as an Empire Day celebration."

This was the third occasion on which he had been present at a Toronto Empire Day celebration, and, with each visit he experienced renewed and increased pleasure. He agreed entirely with the emperor of Austria that children were the loveliest things in the world. The older he grew the more he loved them. He trusted that the thousands who had gathered in Queen's Park to do honor to the memory of the departed great and to the empire would not the day without making new vows and resolutions that in the coming year they would not be willingly guilty of conduct in any way unworthy of a child of Toronto, of Canada and of the empire.

The brave and martial bearing of the cadets, the cheerful happy faces of the children evidenced that each and all of them would count it an honor to offer their lives, if necessary, for their country and King. His excellency hoped it would never be necessary to exact such a sacrifice, but he had a request to make of each individual from His Majesty the King.

Well! He wants each one of you to do something which is still more honorable and therefore still more honorable. He wants each and every one of you to resolve not only to die if necessary, but to live for your country. He wants you to attend to the advice which the minister of education has given you thru the school teachers of the province, and so to live as never to bring reproach by word or deed to the empire of which you are citizens, and to prepare yourselves by every means in your power to advance the welfare of your fellow citizens whether in peace or war, whatever may be their class, creed or color.

If they resolved at once to follow the advice of their King and their teachers they would become, when grown men and women, a strong, virtuous and noble people, whose influence would radiate in ever increasing strength from Toronto, and make itself felt as a force for righteousness, not only in every part of Canada, but even the outside limits of the Empire.

Congratulations for the Province. His excellency congratulated the people of Ontario on having originated the custom of Empire Day celebrations, which were now becoming a universal feature in the life of the people in every part of the British empire. More About a Suburban Railway Service

The best argument yet advanced for a suburban railway service was the resolution passed by the Trades and Labor Council. It is, in effect, that a suburban service helps to remove the congestion of population in the centre of the city, and gives workmen a chance to have their own little houses either in the suburbs, or in any of the villages and towns within reach of the city. And also they declare that a suburban service tends to reduce rents in the city, a thing of prime importance to them all.

Because people in the city advocate a suburban railway service business men in some of the small towns think that the object of the movement is to take trade away from them. We don't believe that a suburban service has that effect, but that its effect is reciprocal and builds up the adjacent villages and towns as well as the city. But the reason the great bulk of the people of the city have for a suburban service is its beneficial effects in regard to city congestion, reduction in rents, and improved conditions that result from it for those whose life is one of daily toil.

For a moment we wish to go back to Mr. Hays' and Mr. McNicoll's statement that a suburban railway service does not pay. Did you ever meet a railway manager that ever admitted that any division of his traffic ever paid? Did you ever hear one of them say that they gave first-class passenger rates at a profit, or excursion rates at a profit, or that they sold return tickets at a profit, or that commutation tickets paid them, or that freight tolls on coal or grain paid them, or any one of the many classes into which traffic is divided. It is their trade and their duty to cry down every class of traffic, and to label it as unprofitable. But somehow, on the whole, the railway manages to pay its way and even to make fair profits. And railway business must be looked at as a whole and not in classes, and the duty involved on the railway, under its franchise, is to give a reasonable service to the community in every reasonable direction, and when it does this the whole must be taken altogether and not split into classes to see which is profitable and which is not profitable.

A city that furnishes the passenger travel and the freight business that these two great railways derive from Toronto should be given a suburban service the same as is given to every other city of size of Toronto on the North American continent. Mr. Hays and Mr. McNicoll will not for one minute be able to make their argument good before the Railway Commission, and it is, therefore, up to the city council and the representatives of the adjacent towns to get their facts together and to unite in presenting their case with a well-organized delegation, and the order will issue for a suburban service. It would be good grace on the part of Mr. Hays and Mr. McNicoll if they tried the service without this kind of compulsion; but it seems the rule in this country that to get anything from a railway you must first throw them down good and hard or into court before you can get anything from them.

INDIANA MAN KILLED
SIX, AUTHORITIES SAY

Brimmingstall is Name of Latest
Fiend from That State—List
of His Victims.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., May 22.—James Brimmingstall, aged 40, is under arrest at Dowagiac, Mich., 27 miles from South Bend, Ind., charged with six murders.

The police say he has already confessed to two. His arrest followed an attempt to murder his wife and several victims, one escaped and another was killed.

The police say he confessed to killing a man in Kansas whom he had a grudge against and was sentenced, ten years in the penitentiary. After his release he killed a companion and received a sentence of three years. He gave no names.

One of Brimmingstall's victims, according to the officers, is Man in Kansas (name not given), said to have been killed by Brimmingstall when the murderer was 13 years old.

Railroad man in Missouri (name unknown) killed seven years ago. Two men sleeping in a tent in Missouri (names unknown).

David Huff, Dowagiac, June, 1907. Smith Horton, Dowagiac, February, 1908.

Mrs. Brimmingstall, apparently distraught, appealed to prosecuting attorney T. J. Breenahan for protection. She said that "Jim" was going to kill her; she could not go to sleep for fear he would break into the house and murder her. She gave hints that led to the discovery that her husband has a criminal record.

David Huff, an aged citizen of Dowagiac, went to the Brimmingstall home to live a year and a half ago. He deeded them his property on their promise to support him for the remainder of his life. One night last June a scuffle was heard in an upper room of the house. Huff was found dead in bed with the bed clothing very much disturbed. Brimmingstall said that Huff had some sort of violent illness, cold or something like it, and accidentally choked himself to death with the bed clothing.

PRESENTATION OF PORTRAIT
Painting of the Duke of Connaught to Grace Masonic Hall.

Cavan, past master, Doric; J. Howard, past master, St. Andrew's; H. Leeson, secretary hall trust, and Bro. Thompson, past master, Ionic.

Among the prominent visitors other than the Hall Trust were: R. L. Gunn, acting grand secretary of the grand lodge in Canada; E. C. Davies, past master, Harmony; T. Smith, past grand junior deacon of Grand Lodge; A. E. Haggerty, junior deacon, Grand Lodge; O. J. Brown, past master Doric, and W. C. Hall, worshipful master of Zetland Lodge.

Bro. Jas. Lumbers and W. J. Kelly witnessed the presentation, which took place in the hall of the Zetland Lodge last night.

KILLED BY FALL OF CLAY.
Emerson Benns Meets Instant Death in Bell Bros' Brickyard.

By the cave-in of a clay bank at Bell Bros', Greenwood-avenue brickyard, Emerson James Benns, a laborer, living at 684 East Gerrard-street, was instantly killed.

Benns, who was working, was working loading clay into a cart at the foot of the bank. A third man was working at the top, 30 feet above. This had been recently blasted and the man above felt it giving away. He shouted to the men beneath but Benns, who was working between the cart and the bank, was unable to get away.

He was struck down by a huge piece of clay, weighing about 300 pounds. His skull was crushed and three ribs and his hip fractured.

The body was removed to Ingram's undertaking rooms, Coroner Pickering deciding that death was clearly accidental.

Decceased was 48 years of age. He leaves a widow and several children, one of whom is a freeman at the Bay-street station.

Freed of Forgery; Arrested for Theft
NEW YORK, May 22.—Ray S. Cogswell of Rochester was held in \$500 bail in police court here to-day on a charge of larceny. He had been arrested at Batavia yesterday on complaint of Herman Levy, a New York diamond dealer, who declared that he had delivered a diamond ring and chain valued at \$10,000 to young Cogswell on March 1, 1904, and that Cogswell had pawned it instead of the ring and chain to a jewelry firm in Rochester as arranged. Cogswell, at Batavia, was discharged on the forgery charges.

Peterboro, May 22.—(Special).—No appointment has yet been made for the position of chief of Peterboro fire department. The fire, water and light committee is dealing with the matter.

Warning Was Fatal.
SCHENECTADY, N.Y., May 22.—Calvin Milbank, an expert mechanic, accidentally came in contact with a switch in the testing department of the General Electric Company to-day and received a shock of over 13,000 volts. He died in a few minutes. He had been employed by the company fifteen years. As he passed the switch-board a fellow employe warned him of danger. Stepping closer to hear what his friend was saying he received the fatal shock. Milbank was 40 years old, and has a wife and four children.

APPLIANCES INADEQUATE. SUGAR DUST EXPLODED.

Travelers May Take Up Question of Hotel Safeguards.

A well known commercial traveler of this city called on The World yesterday in connection with the fire which destroyed the Queen's Hotel at Tillsonburg. He stated that the fire protection appliances in this hotel were very inadequate, and that the statement that there were ropes in each room was incorrect. He also stated that the fire scope was little better than useless, being in a very unkept condition.

Also not staying at the hotel at the time of the fire, he has stopped there a number of times and was well acquainted with the existing conditions. He is of opinion that the Commercial Travelers Association should take up the question of fire protection in all hotels through the country, and intends bringing the matter before the association at an early date.

He says: "If anyone is interested in the fire equipment of hotels traveling men are, since they spend the greater part of their time in them."

DUNLOP CLAIM SUSTAINED

Latest Tire Litigation Results in Decision Favorable to the Original Patentees.

British Columbia papers report the successful issue of a suit brought by the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Goods Company against certain parties who were alleged to have infringed the Dunlop Company's patent pneumatic bicycle tire. This is the latest piece of litigation reported in this cause and evidences the fact that the Dunlop tire is still not without its envious imitators. When it first appeared the Dunlop idea was widely copied and extensive litigation followed, in which the original patentees were sustained in every instance. The latest infringements in Canada were importing, and offering for sale, a tire that imitated the Dunlop in construction. The court ruled that the defendants in the case had offered for sale a tire that infringed the Dunlop patent and an injunction was forthwith granted.

The feature in pneumatic tire construction that marks a tire as a "Dunlop" is the inextensible retaining wires. No tire, having unstretchable wires embedded in its edges, around the narrowest part of its circumference, can be made, or offered for sale in Canada, by any other than the original patentees, the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Goods Company. The Dunlop idea in bicycle tire construction holds good also in automobile tires. It is applied to all forms of pneumatic tires.

The recent litigation in British Columbia followed the arrival there of Mr. John Westren, secretary-treasurer and general manager of the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Goods Company. In an interview, however, Mr. Westren denied that his visit to "the coast" was altogether prompted by patent infringements. The primary object of his visit was to inspect the company's branches in the west and to locate the Vancouver branch of the Dunlop Company in new premises.

THE EMPIRE OF SATAN

The Reign of Sin and Death to Be Followed by the Reign of Righteousness and Life—Why Evil is Permitted—Satan to Be Bound During the Millennial Reign of the Prince of Peace—"The Glory of the Lord Shall Be Revealed"—"And All Flesh Shall See it Together."

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 22.—Pastor C. T. Russell of Pittsburg, Pa., spoke twice here yesterday, to large and attentive audiences. The afternoon discourse at Court Square Theatre was on the Overthrow of Satan's empire. The large audience listened with intense interest to his new and old from the Scriptures. We report the discourse as follows:

Explain the matter how we will, but nature has not concealed that according to our own experiences and the records of history our race has for centuries been under a reign of sin and death unexplainable except in the light of the Bible, the divine revelation. The downward tendency with which we were born, and which were born in sin and shaped in iniquity, in vain have we endeavored to reconcile the present and past experiences of our race with the justice on the part of our Creator—except as we obtain light upon the situation from His word.

But nature has not concealed that should be the Almighty God, the Creator, is the King and ruler of earth; and it is charged, we read that the sons of God saw the daughters of men that they were fair, and took unto themselves wives of such as they would: and they became giants, men of renown, superior in some respects to the fallen, Adamic stock.

Powers to Angels.

To comprehend this situation it is necessary to remember that the angels in harmony with God were granted powers of materialization, as illustrated in the case of those who appeared to Abraham. (Acts iii, 21), we ask, Why does God permit sin and its train to continue? Why does He have the power to bind and to destroy Satan, the prince of this world, why has He not done so long ago? Why is it that after laughing us to pray, "Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is done in Heaven, and did not rather establish the reign of His Son, who is His only begotten Son? Why did He not prevent even the beginning of the reign of sin and death? These are great questions, and they are answerable only from the one standpoint—the divine revelation, the Word of God.
