

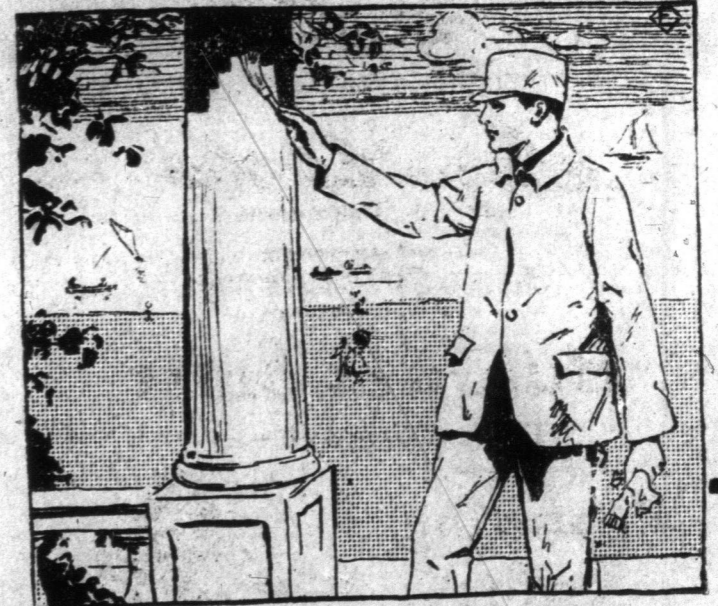

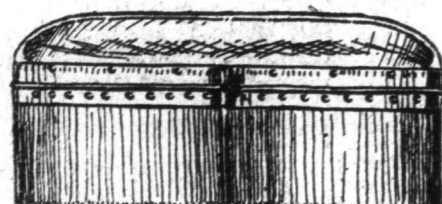

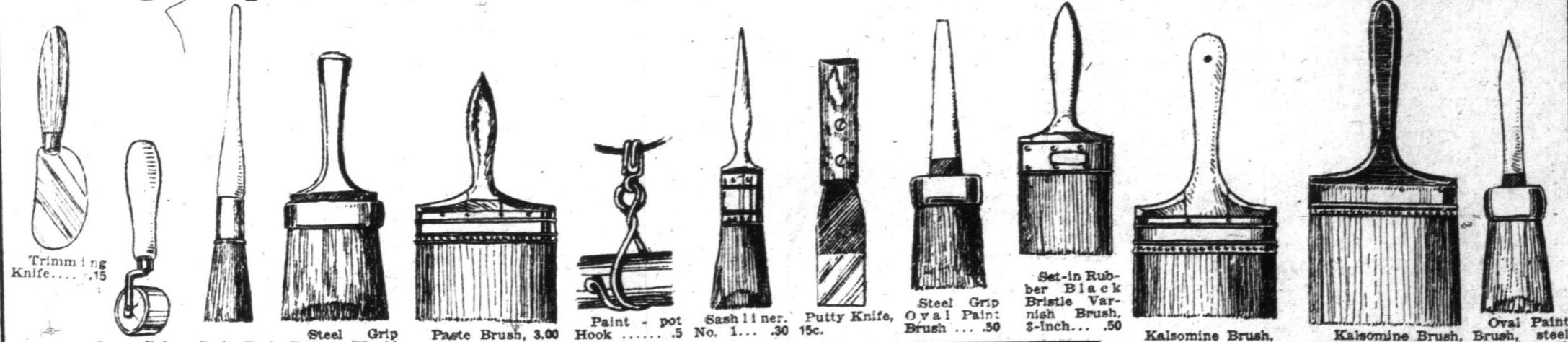

SILENTLY HONOR HEROIC STUDENTS

Nearly Four Thousand University Men Are Serving the Empire.

HOLD CONVOCATION

Sir John Hendrie and Dr. G. C. Nasmith Honored at Annual Ceremony.

The annual convocation of the University of Toronto was held yesterday afternoon in Convocation Hall with all the accustomed ceremony before an audience of students and friends which practically filled the spacious hall. Degrees were bestowed by the chancellor, Sir William Meredith, and with him on the platform were President R. A. Falconer, Principal Maurice Hutton, Sir John Hendrie, Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, Sir Edmund Walker, Dr. J. A. Macdonald, Justice Riddell, K. J. Rowell, K.C., the members of the staff, the board of governors, deans of the various faculties and others. The graduates numbered less than in former years. Fifty graduates upon whom degrees were to have been bestowed were absent on active service, and as a result it was decided to defer the degrees until the men return rather than bestow them in absentia.

A Terrible Test.

"Never in the history of the university," said the president, "have our men been so terribly tested and never have they proved themselves so splendidly. They have gone thru and are going thru the most terrifying experiences, and we must believe that a God of righteousness and justice is holding the balance and slowly our men are being found wanting." To the graduates he said that their education had been received under conditions so unique as to give them distinction beyond all that had gone before. One year of their university life had been passed during an era of peace and three during a period of war. Theirs was a most searching education, with conceptions of public service instilled by frequent words and the emptying of class rooms by the manifold endeavors of the university and by all those who had come and gone.

Honor Late Mrs. L. Solman at Impressive Memorial Service

An impressive funeral service was yesterday held in honor of Mrs. Lawrence Solman at Queen Street Methodist Church, with Rev. J. C. Cochrane officiating. Mayor Church spoke of her character and amiable qualities. After the service the remains were taken to the Necropolis. Among the many beautiful floral tributes sent were those from the Toronto Ferry Co., Mayor Church, Toronto baseball players, the Robins Players and Major Wright.

MUCH DISCUSSION OVER ERECTION OF A GARAGE

Street Commission Asks Works Committee to Recommend Big Sum for Building. The erection of a garage to house ten motor trucks of the street cleaning department proved a contentious matter before the works committee yesterday afternoon. Commissioner Wilson told the committee the department was seriously handicapped in its operations, and that the motor equipment was being injured thru lack of proper housing accommodation. He proposed to build a garage on city owned property on the north side of Wilton avenue, adjacent to the Don incinerator, at an estimated cost of \$35,000. The upper storey of the building would be used for the instruction of employees of the department and for stock room purposes. The money, he said, was available under the garbage disposal bylaw.

A deputation yesterday waited upon the Hon. F. G. Macdormand asking that the minister receive next week a representative deputation from the Townships of East and West Whitby and Pickering to urge that the government adhere to its original plan to follow the Kingston road in the construction of the provincial highway southward from Toronto.

WILLS PROBATED

Andra Neelands, who died on April 20 last, left an estate valued at \$9000. To her niece she left her late residence at 150 Geoffrey street. The residue of the estate is to be invested and the interest divided equally between her sister and brother, Charles and William Neelands. Herbert and John Edwards share equally the estate of their father, Edmund T. Edwards, who died in Toronto March 28, leaving an estate worth \$5555.

TWO DIE SUDDENLY.

Special to The Toronto World. Guelph, May 18.—Two aged residents of Guelph have passed away in the persons of J. S. Heyer and Michael Healey, both aged 85. They were well known and highly respected, and death came to both suddenly, within a few hours of each other.

O.S.A. Commission Deal With Seven Thousand Returned Men

A total of 6798 returned or discharged soldiers have up to date passed thru the hands of the Ontario Soldiers' Aid Commission. Of these 58 were British reservists, 683 discharged before their units went overseas, and the remainder who had returned after active service in England or France. The directorship of the work department of the soldiers' aid commission has been given to W. J. Flatt, a returned soldier of the 3rd (Toronto) Battalion. He succeeds R. J. Buchanan who will be exclusively engaged in interviewing large employers of labor in regard to placing returned soldiers in any vacancies which may exist in the city's industrial plants.

APPLICATIONS FOR WORK

Labor Department Announces That 162 Men Were Given Positions. The labor department of the department of public works reports for the first half of the month that a total of 119 men, 172 boys and 85 women applied for work in Toronto, 162 were placed in positions, while 164 others were recommended for positions. There were 160 applications for help, 62 men, 98 boys and ten women being requested.

CHARGED WITH PERJURY.

Witness, Arrested at Trial of Dr. J. M. Johnson, Appears in Police Court. Arrested after giving evidence in the sessions Thursday at the trial of Dr. J. M. Johnson, who was arraigned on a charge of performing an illegal operation upon Margaret Vernon, Reginald Barker faced a charge of perjury in the police court yesterday. At a preliminary hearing of the Johnson case in the police court, it is alleged that Barker swore that the woman Vernon was his wife, while at the sessions he admitted that which he had sworn was untrue.

TWO MONTHS' SENTENCE.

Alleged to be a user of drugs, Philip Morris, a well-dressed young man was sentenced to jail for sixty days when he appeared in the police court yesterday. Detective Levitt, who arrested Morris, swore to having found a quantity of cocaine in the room occupied by the young man, which Morris declared had been left there by a former lodger. A second excuse, that the drug had been prescribed for him for headache, had no effect upon the magistrate, and sentence was imposed.

MANY BOYS FARMING.

The Provincial Employment Bureau has received several splendid reports from the high schools of the province in regard to the numbers of pupils who are assisting in farm work. From Brantford high school the report was received that 30 boys and 20 girls are now on the land and another 5000, 70 boys and 20 girls will start work as soon as the school closes.

Good Cheer for Those at the Front.

Nothing that has been done in Canada since the war started will give us courage or give us any reason to be less than determined that they are no longer to be left unsupported. It will put a new spirit and a new heart in the Canadian army, officers and men alike, to know that at last their own people are behind them, no longer ignoring their efforts, but prepared to back them up to the limit.

"Greatness Thrust Upon Them."

"Some men are born great, some achieve greatness and some have greatness thrust upon them." This is the view that should be taken of the conscription measure, or selective draft, which the prime minister announced yesterday was to be adopted in order to redeem Canada's promise to the empire and to humanity that half a million Canadians would testify to their faith in the just cause of the entente alliance. They are truly great who went in the first place out of their own innate and primary conviction that there was one thing and one thing only to be done when Canada was at war. Many a one of these has sealed his faith in immortal honor with his blood, for there "loved not their lives even unto death." They did not need to be reminded that they who seek to save their souls shall lose them.

There have been thousands of men who have achieved greatness by following the shining example of the hero who set them. They had the heart and the spirit to know what was meant and right, and they went to the front. They went to the front because they were there. They were not there to go, they were there to stay. Many a man among them has found in himself the strength of a giant, and he would be as well as any, and he would be as well as any man who could say which was the braver men at the front. But the odds were being turned, and there were none left with the great heart in them, or the clear vision, to feel or to see what was the duty of the hour.

Now there comes the high call of the nation itself, and for those who lagged and faltered and were blind to the bitter need of the broken ranks in France and the glory of taking their places with the heroes of the great war. They have greatness thrust upon them, and they should be proud to be thought worthy of standing beside those who were born so or who achieved it. To be eligible to fight in the great war and to go down to the grave with the consciousness of having shirked is a fate not to be envied. Many a man who fears to-day will rejoice a year hence that he belonged to a nation which set his duty before him and gave him a chance to discover his own manhood.

Not all the men who shun military service are cowards. They may be faint-hearted; they may not have been taught control; there may be physical inertia to overcome. But when the effort is made, when they stand themselves shoulder to shoulder with men like themselves, the old fires of the race of heroes to which they belong, dim smouldering under the ashes of pleasure, or snobbish, or mistaken affection, or some other unmanly clog, will burst forth in sun-bright flames and warm their whole nature into nobler life. To be baptised by fire in this sacrament of the world's faith in God's truth is the finest thing that could happen to our young men, and, thru them, to the nation. It is a national consecration.

What They Should Do.

All the young men who are eligible for the first draft, or who may think or fear they are, should make a virtue of a necessity today and save their reputation by volunteering for the corps in which they would best like to serve. It will be more pleasant to go than be brought; and there will be the option of choosing one's service, rather than being placed where the authorities will. After all, a volunteer stands higher than a conscript.

But the conscription is the democratic method, and the only fair one. There are men in the late fifties overseas today, while others in their early twenties sit at home at ease in Canada. This is not democracy; and it has been a puzzle for long why, after the mother country and all the other democracies adopted the system, Canada still delayed. The last thing of any use in war time is chewing the rag over what is past and done. It has been an evil year past for recruiting, but it is over and done, and we must set our faces forward and make up for the lost time. There has been no halt at the front. While we were slacking the Germans were putting their whole strength into their efforts, and are so much the better prepared. Un-

til we have done everything of which we are capable there should be no more thought of slowing down.

A Long, Stiff Fight.

Lord Derby's interview on the relation of the United States to the war should help to dispel any illusions that may be entertained about what is needed to bring the struggle to an end. Eighteen months ago we were warned by Mr. Lloyd George and the King himself that we could not win the war if we did not put forth our utmost effort. At that time Germany's resources were estimated at considerably less than they have since proven to be.

Lord Derby reiterates the former message and adds to it: "This war will not be over until the full weight of America has been thrown into the scales."

This means men, money, munitions, food, the whole paraphernalia of war, and what it means for the United States it means for the rest of us. It is to be a long, stiff battle yet, and we shall need all our power, and all our will.

The prompt action of President Wilson in directing a division under General Pershing to proceed to France will have splendid moral effect on all Europe. We need not expect to hear much more about this until we hear that the division is in France and ready for action.

With the new start at Ottawa on an active policy we trust that Canada will be kept well abreast of the necessities of the situation, and that food control and production, and a proper provision for next winter's fuel will follow immediately on the conscription measure.

Russia Settling Down.

It was pleasant to have confirmation yesterday from Pétrograd of our anticipations of the turn of political affairs in Russia. The latest news was entirely favorable to the allied cause, and even the military news was of an encouraging nature, a heavy attack by the Germans upon the Russians having been repulsed. Premier Lvov's summary of the situation presents a steady view of affairs. The democracy is beginning to realize the responsibilities of freedom as well as its privileges.

The peasants' convention, with 600 delegates from all parts of the country, will afford an opportunity for an authoritative appeal to the people in general thru their own representatives. It is absurd to suppose that Russia is less capable of imposing its democratic ideas than China, and we may be sure that when authentic information is laid before the nation, citizens, soldiers, peasants will all be united for self-preservation. This, and no less than this, is what co-operation means to Russia at present. There need be no alarm over what are called concessions to socialism. We have had the spectacle not long since of Prof. Maslov, of the University of Toronto, denouncing such concessions to socialism as the Hydro-Electric system.

The great matter, in Russian affairs is the loyalty of the army. And we need have no fear while Alexeff remains in command with such generals as Brustoff and Gurko at the front.

RETURNS FROM FRANCE.

Toronto Doctor Recalled for Special Service.
"The Canadians made themselves famous at Vimy Ridge by fighting in the greatest battle yet fought" was the terse statement made yesterday to a reporter for The World by Lieut.-Col. George R. Philip, Commander No. 10 Canadian Field Ambulance, just returned from Vimy Ridge. He established dressing stations one mile on the other side of the ridge. After serving thirty months in France, with only about five weeks' rest in that whole period, he has been recalled for some special duty in Canada. GOLD OUTPUT INCREASES
Department of Mines Report Shows Decrease in Silver.
The quarterly report of the department of mines issued yesterday shows a considerable increase in the production of gold in the province. Copper and nickel have also been produced steadily, but silver shows a decrease. The output of gold was 127,832 ounces, valued at \$2,601,700. The value of the ore from Hollinger was \$1,200,000; from the Dome, \$528,000, and McIntyre, \$428,000. The output of silver was 2,574,349 ounces, valued at \$2,618,000. The output of nickel, copper matte, for the three months was 18,995 tons, compared with 80,000 tons for the whole of 1916.

GIRL LOST CASE.
Justice Kelly in the non-jury assizes yesterday afternoon dismissed the action of Lillian Hughes against Doctors J. A. Spiers and William T. Hamilton, for \$2,500. The plaintiff is 14 years of age and while playing on Mutual street in July, 1914, fell and broke her arm. The defendant attended to the girl's arm, and it was alleged that, owing to their negligence, gangrene developed which resulted in the arm being permanently crippled.

SOLDIERS' INSURANCE DECIDED TEMPORARILY

Brothers and sisters of men with homes in the city and who are killed while on active service will be paid their share of the civic insurance, while payments to brothers and sisters of men living outside the city will be withheld until it has been definitely decided whether or not they are entitled to any portion. This was the decision of the board of control yesterday on the suggestion of Controller Cameron. The mayor stated that there were only twenty cases of soldiers who lived just outside the city and had a claim for insurance at the time they enlisted. He proposed that the city obtain permission to pay the \$20,000 insurance, as the dependents were in straitened circumstances.

JUDGMENT RESERVED.
Evidence Concluded in Case Regarding Sale of Camp Borden Property.
Judgment was reserved by Justice Casella yesterday afternoon at Osgoode Hall in the Camp Borden expropriation proceedings respecting 1,400 acres of the camp site of 17,500 acres. The evidence was concluded yesterday when Ernest Rogart appeared to the stand to testify regarding the nature of the soil. Mr. Rogart was employed by Wright & Barr, real estate agents, and said that 80 per cent. of the trees planted by the company on the land before it was sold to the government had died.

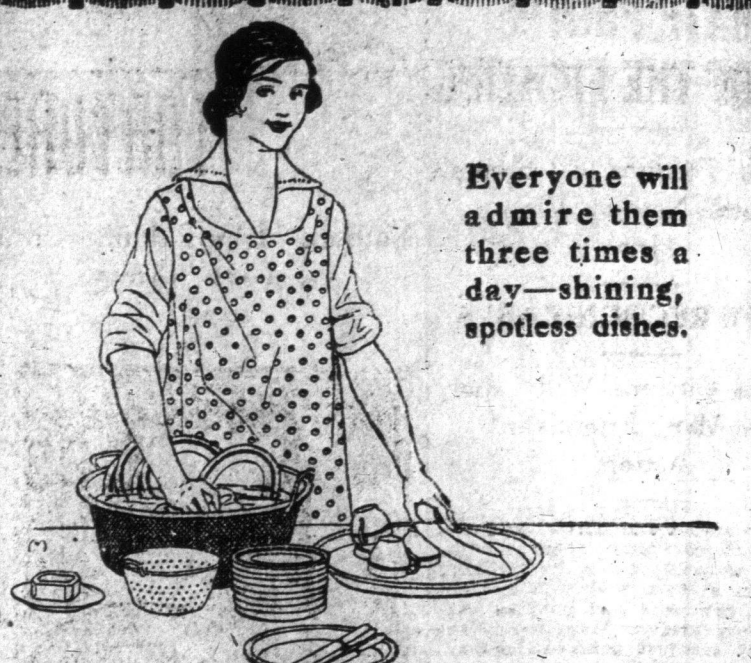

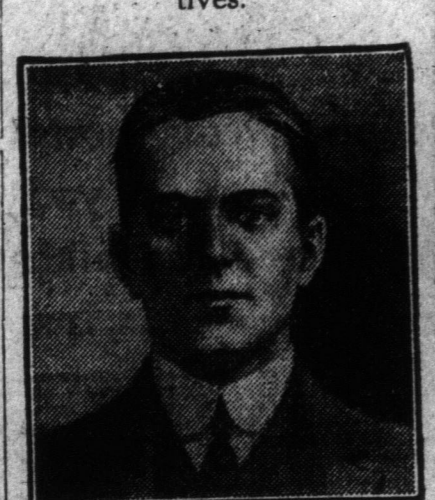

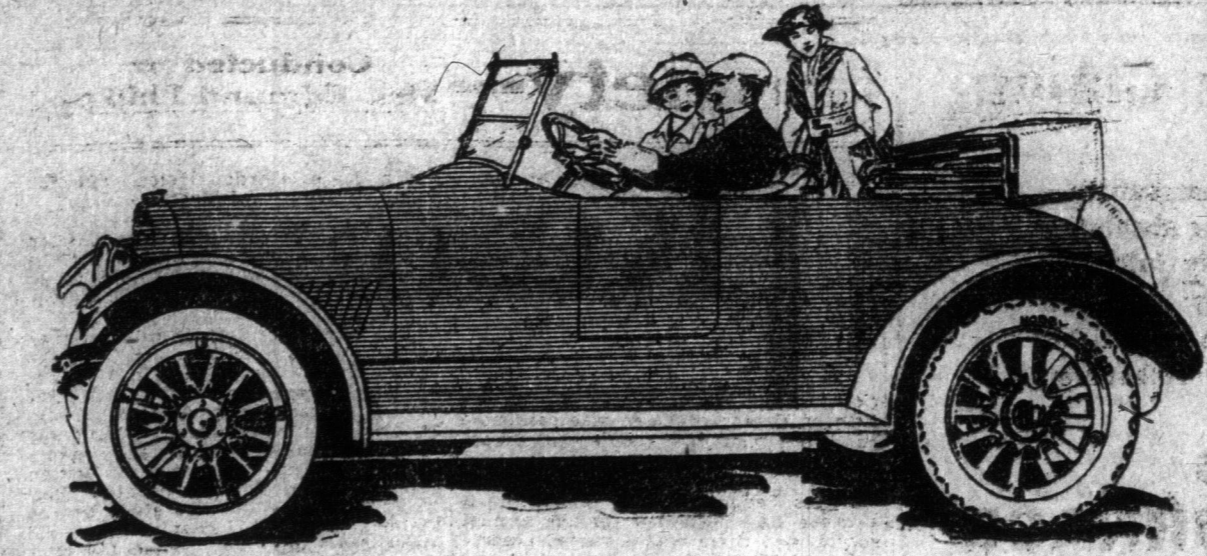

In the direction of Vidmir-Volynsk in the region of Shel'vov, last night, dense enemy formations attempted a sweeping attack on our positions on one of our sectors, but were repulsed by our rifle, machine gun, and artillery barrage fire. On the rest of the front there have been fusillades and sporadic reconnaissances."

Rumanian front: There has been little firing. "Caucasian front: An attempt of a Turkish company to attack from the direction of Ognoli was repelled by our fire. "The Kurds are attacking our posts, but are being repulsed, inflicting our dead in a ferocious manner."

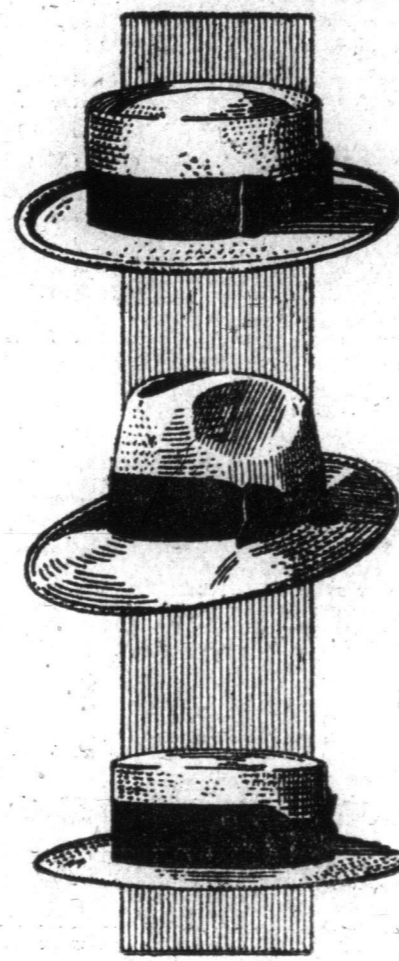

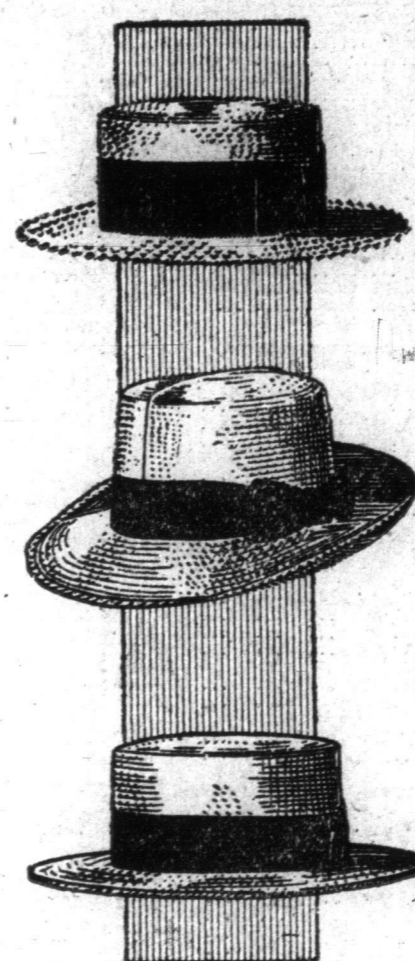
