London, Jan. 3. - The text of the articles of capitulation of Port Arthur garrison signed by the commissioners reing General Stoessel and General Nogi has been made public. All Russian soldiers, marines and civil officials of the garrison and harbor are made prisoners; all forts, batteries, vessels, munitions, etc., are transferred to the Japanese in the condition in which they existed at noon of Jan. 3, violation of this clause to operate as an annulment of negotiations, giving the Japanese army warrant to take

The Russian military and naval authorities are to furnish to the Japances army an exhibit of all fortifications, underground and submarine mines, a list of military officers, of ships and the numbers of their crews, and of civilians of both sexes, with their race and occupations, and all public property as buildings, munitions of war, etc. to be left in the present positions pending arrangement for their transference.

During the slege 265 per cent of the garrison were put out of action. This remarkable fact was due to wounded men returning to the front. Cases have been recorded where men have gone to hospitals four times, returning convalescent to the forts. The number of officers killed was proportionately greater than in any battle known in history.



St. Petersburg, Jan. 3.-The text of Gen. Stoessel's despatch to the czar, received prior to the surrender of Port Arthur, is published to day and reveals the stress under which he defended the fortress on Dec. 28 and 29. He declares his greatest enemies were scurvy and 11-inch shells that went thru every protection. He bemoans the fact that he has no ammunition, and that the capabilities of the defence were daily diminishing by reason of the loss & a mass of officers. He reports the final assaults of the Japs, and without putting his plea in words, presents facts that he doubtless hopes will melt the heart of his sovereign. The text of the

But should such persons leave Australia and take up their residence in Great Britain "they are not regarded as living in lawful wedlock and their children are not considered as legitimate and are consequently debarred from being able to inherit the property of their parents in that country."
