Tokio, Jan. 3.—A number of the Japanese soldiers were surrendered to the Japanese today. Tokio dispatches say that the terms of capitulation were signed last night, and that the Russian officers will be permitted to return to Russia on parole, retaining their side arms.

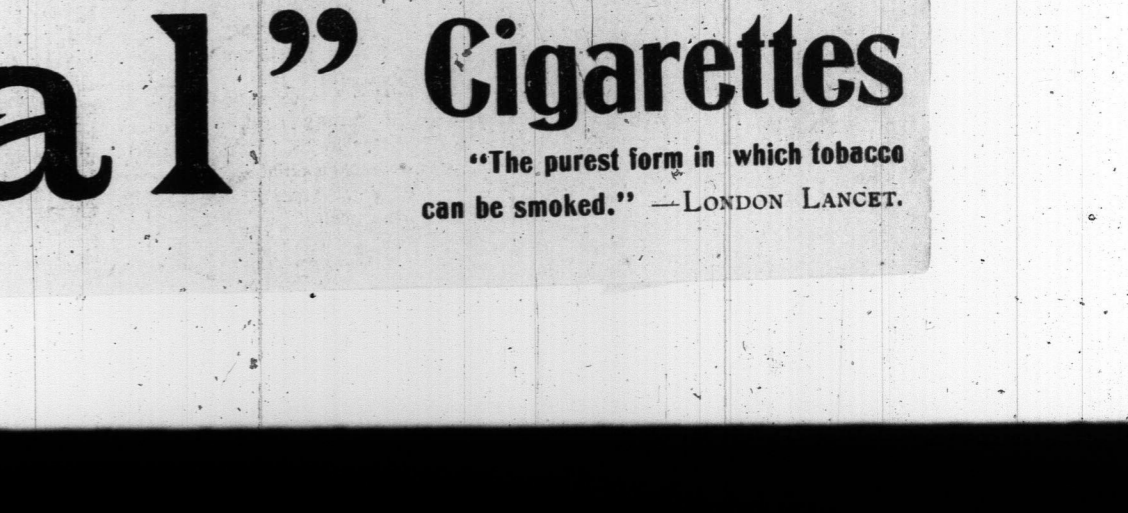

**CANADIAN APPLE TRADE.**  
 Deal in All Sections — Exporters Losing Money.

The importance of the apple crop to the production of Canada cannot easily be overestimated. With a reputation in the motherland surpassed by no other nation, it is not a matter of surprise that any matter touching the future of this great industry should be regarded with interest here. In some quarters the fear is expressed that too great a laxity is being shown by Canadian growers and shippers in the quality of the fruit forwarded from Canadian ports to the British and other markets. It is not so much that the fruit does not arrive in the condition most desirable, but that the quality is not uniform throughout. The British public are most discriminating and the belief once thoroughly implanted in the mind of the British consumer that the Canadian product is true to name and appearance, will possess a power of strength that the Canadian shipper, happily, the majority of the men engaged in the export trade in Canada today are actuated by high business principles, and to this fact may be attributed the enviable position which Canadian fruit occupies in the foreign market to-day. That the season is in its height, and that the fruit is abundant, is a fact which is not to be taken as an excuse for the laxity of some growers and shippers. The world was fortunate in securing from some of the local dealers engaged in the export trade, a large quantity of the finest of the fruit, which was sent to the financial aspect of the situation. Harry Dawson of the Dawson Export Co. is not a good one for the Canadian exporter, and this opinion is shared by the majority of the men engaged in the trade. "I saw Francis Mulvey, a lawyer, but he told me that he had no information as to what had happened. We went to police headquarters and there we found that there had been no communication from the department at Philadelphia."
