

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WEATHER PROPHESYING.

That science will yet ascertain a way of foretelling storms, we firmly believe. Indeed, the telegraph is even now usefully employed for this purpose, and its agency, we hope, will at some not distant date serve to warn our coast dwellers and coastwise crafts of an approaching storm in time to enable the one to prepare to assist the other. Since the publication of Professor Espy's Theory of Storms, much attention has been devoted to this subject, and although a system which is entirely reliable and generally applicable, has not yet been perfected, it is to be hoped that the progress of scientific investigation will yet evolve such a system.

The weather prophesying, however, of experts, who calculate by the phases of the moon, by the comparison of one season with another, by cycles of storms, by the variations of the barometer, and the fluctuations of the thermometer, we deem of no value whatever. Nothing has ever yet been adduced to prove that the moon has any appreciable influence over the climate of this planet, or the temporary changes in the climate of localities. The comparison of former years with the present afford no criterion. The changes on the surface of the inhabited earth, by the destruction of forests and the multiplication of civilized habitations have much to do with alterations of climate. The theories of storm cycles are yet in embryo. Sudden fluctuations from causes beyond our knowledge are not taken into account by storm theorists; or if so, these fluctuations upset all their calculations, and they are left in the dark. The variations, neither of the barometer or the thermometer, are to be confided in. They are unrealiable.

The astronomer, who from the top of his tower, or from a mountain summit; or the sailor, who has a more extended field of vision, may, from the appearance of the clouds and the condition of the atmosphere, prognosticate the advent of a storm and its direction. So, also the farmer and the hunter, by long experience, necessitated by their pursuits, learn to read the heavens, or, rather, the atmosphere, to some benefit; but when our weather prophets presume to foretell a dry summer, a lean harvest, a cold winter, from their yearly observations, based only on observation, and not on a thorough knowledge of natural laws, we choose to place but little reliance on their prognostications.— Scientific American.

Saturn's Rings.

These rings will be visible all this year, the visual line making an angle of little more than 26 deg. with the plane of the rings. Their northern surface is visible, the Sun and Earth being elevated above that side. They appear eliptical, and this year rather more than twice as long as wide.

There will be four Eclipses this year, two of the Sun and two of the Moon, as follows : I. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 27, in the evening, visible in this Island. Eclipse begins 8h. Sm.; greatest obscuration, 9h. 17m., and eclipse ends 10h. 28m. II An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, February 11, invisible in North America, but visible in the southern part of South America and South Africa. III. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, July 23, invisible in North America. IV. A total Eclipse of the Sun, August 7, in the afternoon. The Eclipse will be total at noon in Alaska, the line running southeasterly, touching the coast near Sitka, thence passes into British America, and enters the United States near the origin of the Milk River, from thence it passes through the south-west corner of Minnesota, crosses the Mississippi river at Burlington, Iowa, and proceeds through Illinois, just north of Springfield, and crosses the Ohio river near Louisville; it then runs through Kentucky and North Carolina, entering the Atlantic near Beaufort, N. C. North of this line the eclipse will be partial, and as such it will be visible on this Island. Eclipse begins at 5h. 46m. in the evening, and will be visible until sunset.

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

A Happy New Year.





The days are much longer, and they should show notably more work done than those of Dec., or even January; nevertheless, their is comparative leisure, and season for reviewing the past year's work and laying plans for the coming months, when so much hard labor will be demanded that the mind will not give itself readily to continuous thought. Whatever plans are made, on this very account, if for no other reason, should be put upon paper, so that when the time comes for their prompt execution. they shall not be forgotten. The season of field work, when it does come, will be likely to come all at once, and then you will feel as if every moment were gold, as if the horses though doing their utmost. did not walk half fast enough. Therefore use the leisure of this month to get all ready for spring work.

The Wood Lot still furnishes work in cutting firewood and clearing up stuff already down, cutting bean poles, splitting rails and posts, dressing and hauling them.


Animals, toward the close of the winter, often begin to show lack of appetite staring coats, vermin, etc., and, if these are neglected, more serious maladies. This indicates neglect of some kind, and the master must look better to his own.


Beeves should be well fed; their gain in flesh is of far less consequence than the gain in the manure pile, but both are equally affected by good food. The great gain in beef cattle ought to be in the autumn. In the winter, if the stables be warm, beeves will keep on gaining very well, as a general thing, but in cold stables, the gain will be of an expensive kind, food being used as so much fuel only.

Most farmers dry their cows early, in order to save the labor of milking. This is poor policy, unless the cows are valuable chiefly as producers of beef animals. It injures a cow to give milk after she begins to make bag, and as the time of the very beginning of bag making is indefinite, it is well to milk up to within four or five weeks of calving, and then dry off rapidly and stop.

Sheep.—The strongest should be by themselves, weak ewes and lambs by themselves, so that the feed shall be equally distributed.

The coming of this month brings the renewed stir and activity of pressing work, or the preparation for work soon to be undertaken. March is a month in which farmers should be hauling mussel mud, ploughing, setting fences, and engaged in other field work before its close. Where much snow has


lain, winter grains and fields newly laid down to grass will be benefitted, but where the ground has been bare, the deep freezing of the soil, and the exposure of the plants to both cold and heat before it thaws, will be likely to injure both grain and grass, and render the applica-tion of some "hand manure" very desirable. After a severe winter an early spring is anticipated. This is rejoiced in by most farmers, but it is accompanied by many more dangers to fruit trees and field crops than when the cold holds on, and the warm weather, coming later is subject to few or no great fluctuations of temperature. Loamy or clayey soils should never be worked before they are so thoroughly dried as not to pack before the plow in pasty clods; and no seeds, except those of grass and clover sowed upon winter grain, should be committed to the soil before it is warm and mellow. The error of too early plowing is a common one; every body wants to be at work in the spring, and no one really feels as if he had begun farming before he smells the fresh earth and sees the long furrows turned. So we get the manures spread and the plowman's feet are loaded with pounds of sticky clay, and water even stands in the furrows in the low spots. This is all wrong, for thus we burden ourselves with the care of rough. cloddy fields which will hardly get in good tilth before autumn.

work, rainy day work, and work for fair days when the soil is wet ; this makes three good divisions. Nothing should interrupt the work in the field and garden while the soil is in good condition for working. With proper diligence all that needs to be done indoors, or that can be done on rainy days, or v hile the soil is too moi t to work, may be without infringing upon the good day's field work. If plans are not well matured for the summer compaign lose no time before forming them. If there are seeds to buy, tools to provide, or anything of that kind to do, delay not. If we begin the season with good "help," good teams, good tools, good seeds, all the manure we can get, and the best plans we can make, after doing all we possibly can we may rely upon Providence for sunshine and showers and fruitful seasons.

Draining may often be done in the spring better than at any other season, and spring draining has this great advantage: the filling has all the summer to settle, and there is much less danger of the surface water washing in and gaining direct access to the tiles than when the draining is done in the fall. On this account it is advisable to do the draining on side hills, and where early in spring much surface water flows, at the present season of the year, after the heavy spring rains have passed.

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
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

Y. The average temperature grows warmer and our cold storms are less cold in May than in April, yet they are cold enough. Seeds will rot in the ground; the plows will be dragged through the pasty soil, and mold it into clods, which will stand as mementos of indiscreet haste ; sheep will shiver and snuffle, and lambs will die for lack of protection. We judge these and other things will happen, because it always is so. There is no need of their occurring, or very little, at any rate. May is always unreliable, except for storms and showers of rain. Sometimes we have many days of fine, clear, dry weather, but usually everybody is tired of seeing it rain. Proper efforts having been made, there need be little delay in the more important labors. Year by year, one's practices should improve; year by year, the farmer's reasonings should be more accurate, and his judgment better. This month the great bulk of the grain crop and more than half the potato crop is planted, much wheat is sown, as also roots of all sorts, except those of the turnip family. There must be hands and teams enough to do the work. No more must be included in the plan for the summer's campaign than can be carried out. The plans for daily labor must be sufficient to keep the men employed all the time. It is very desirable to have men about you, who you know will set themselves at work, but it is a poor plan to give them a chance. Always keep men informed as to what work they are expected to do. With the commencement of steady hard work, it is most important to start right with men and teams in the field, and scarcely less with household arrangements. The meals must be promptly ready, if the hands are boarded at the house; if they "find themselves," accuracy of hours must be exacted as far as possible.

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



A late wet season makes June a hard month for the farmer. Under the most favorable circumstances no month of the year puts his executive abilities more thoroughly to the test. Without wellmatured plans, and a knowledge of about how much the labor, both of men and animals, will accomplish, the best farmer will be likely to fall behindhand. The weeds grow so fast in moist, warm weather that the fields must be heed almost as soon as planted, and the growth of the grass in the meadow is so rapid, that the necessity for laying down the hoe for the scythe is often a most trying one. It is very rare, in our latitude, that June is not, on the whole, a prosperous time for the crops. Very dry Junes are of rare occurrence, and a drouth at this season is productive of great injury-quite as much so as a sharp frost. Farmers whose spring work has been delayed by the wetness of the ground have in this way the value of thorough draining impressed upon them.

Butter .- June butter is considered the best made during the year. Good butter makers pack it to keep the whole year. There is now difficulty about it if the buttermilk be thoroughly worked out, the butter salted one ounce to the pound, and worked again after standing 12 to 24 hours. It is packed in layers in firkins, with a thin layer of salt on the bottom, and salt between each layer. The butter must be packed airtight, if possible-that is, without holes-and pounded down flat and solid. The less butter is handled, the better, and the lower the temperature at which it is worked, provided it be soft enough to work thoroughly, the more waxy and firm will it be. If the tub cannot be filled at once, cover the butter with a strong brine.





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Farmers naturally feel greater solicitude in regard to the results which this month will effect than about those of any other similar period. And well they may. It is not farmers alone who are interested; every man, woman, and child, in the length and breadth of the land has a personal interest in abundant crops, well gathered. Upon no other thing does the prosperity of the whole country so much depend. The great bulk of the grass crop is harvested in July. The character of the season settles the amount which will be realized from spring sowed grains; and in fact most summer crops. Where drouths prevail this month they may almost, if not entirely, destroy the potatoes, pastures, and aftermath. Protracted rains will cause great damage to hay, not secured ; standing grass will become tough and wiry, losing much of its nutritive value, and will fill up with a new growth, chiefly of clover, which is not really healthy when cured for hay. One of the most important things for us to do is to provide forage crops to take the place of short pasturage in the fall. We should arrange good plans for quick work. When the weather is favorable, keep the soil among hoed crops always mellow, not working it so deep, however, in dry weather as to cause the crops to wilt. The progress of the age is shown more in the application of machinery and horse power to save the labor of human hands than in any other way, and it is essential to profitable farming, that, so far as possible, we avail ourselves of the most valuable helps. Smooth land is essential, if we would make the best use of hay-

Isn't it time to begin to cut up green fodder for the cows and other stock? It pays well to plant

Indian corn to be cut green when the pastures are dry and parched in the burning sun. Have you ever thought what an enormous burden of fodder you can raise on an acre of ground well tilled, and sown thick with corn in rows? You would hardly believe me if I should tell you what I have heard and seen too. It beats all. A good lot of extra fodder, roots, etc., helps out the season, both summer and winter. With fodder enough you can keep more stock ; more stock will give you more manure; more manure will enable you to keep up the fertility of your land, and add to its profits. It's a good plan, I think, to stock up to the full capacity of the farm, and it is better to have to buy a little hay, than to sell, unless you have some extra facilities for getting manure.

The purple-top strap-leaf turnip may be sown broadcast the first of this month, if you failed to get in the seed in July. Look again at the remarks made on top-dressing last year. Ploughing, ditching, draining, and sowing grass-seed, will fill up the month with useful and profitable work.

SELF-INDULGENCE AND SELF-DE-MIAL.—The receipts of seven theatres in Boston, in 1867, were \$818,-283; the contributions to the American Board!for the work of foreign missions from New England were \$195,799, and from the whole United States less than \$344,000. The aggregate receipts of the theatres in New York for 1867 were over three million dollars, or much more than double what is contributed for foreign missions by all the Christians of the United States.



I can name a hundred places where the first crop taken has nearly, and in many of them quite, paid the cost of the whole improvement. You will find them, if they are well "brought to," the most fertile and productive parts of the farm. Perfect draining is, of course, at the bottom of it all. The harvest is now fairly begun, and a jolly time it is. The luscious fruit, the golden corn, the carts loaded down with potatoes and pumpkins, the barns bursting with the bountiful crops, this month and next, ought to make the farmer's heart swell with thankfulness and joy. How many of us say it is only the pay for our own labor, and forget that the showers and the sunshine, the gentle dews and the drying winds, had about as much to do with it as we? So it goes. The heart never will soften at the goodness that scatters blessings so liberally.







Somber, yet happy Autumn, is here; the landscape wears the sere and yellow hues, blended with red and green, the more brilliant for the contrast. But for the sighing winds and the chill that is in the air, and the drifts of leaves that are swept across the view, one might take October for the gayest month of the twelve. And it is gay. Why should the falling of the leaf inspire sad thoughts? All things grow old as do garments, and like them they are changed with the season, or in their appointed time. If we change with them it should be as the buds mature on the trees, to burst into leaf in the spring, or as the fruits and seeds ripen for the Master's use, or as the bulbs wrap up the vital germ which will rise into a new and beautiful life when the spring-time comes. This is the season of abundance, when man and beast prepare for the coming winter. The days are growing shorter, and long evenings invite to reading, study, and meditation. The experiences of the summer, the results of the harvest, the memorandums and recollections of what was seen at the fairs, furnish topics of conversation and induce visiting among farmers. Such visits will, we hope, in many instances ripen into farmers' clubs, with their reading rooms or circulating libraries, and meetings for discussion, for exchange of seed, and for the exhibition of the products of the soil, or of skilful hands.

One of the most important things for farmers to think about and plan for this month, is good winter schools. Do not say by your actions or unconcern, brother farmers, that "half an education is good enough for farmers' children," or that "larnin spiles a farmer," as the writer was once told, but strike for a first-rate public school as the very foundation of local prosperity.

The order of farm work in this country is, first to secure crops still in the field, before freezing, weather; second, to protect those already in store, as well as houses, barns, and manure stores from damage from any source; third, to put the farm in order for a sudden freezing up. Early winters come now and then, and shut down upon farm work just when a day or two more of out-door labor would save the labors of months, perhaps, from loss.

Root Crops .- These continue to grow as long as the ground is open, but it is a poor plan to trust too long to the weather. No date can be fixed applicable to different latitudes, but it will be wise to lose no time after the first of November, in harvesting roots of all sorts, Parsnips will not be injured by the severest freezing though they may be frozen up and not be available before next spring. They are wintered thus as they grew, and are ready for feeding or for market as soon as the ground opens. Ruta-bagas will bear more frost than white turnips; but neither should be subjected to severe freezing. Mangels and Sugar Beets, though they bear, perhaps an equal degree of cold without apparent damage, yet if they stand in the ground after they cease to grow, they become tough and woody, and roots exposed to freezing, if not used soon, decay at the crown. Growth ceases with Beets after a few sharp frosts; hence they should be dug and housed early. Carrots are also liable to injury from freezing, and the first frost that stiffens the soil should be a signal to harvest Beets and Carrots with alacrity, if not already done; and where the digging of potatoes has been delayed, to Nov., it should be postponed no longer, but this valuable crop ought to be housed at once, or placed in frost-proof pits.

Comfort for the stock in the barn saves flesh and food, If you don't feed at regular times, you make the eattle fret from waiting, and wear off more flesh than a good meal will put on. Now they can't feel easy with half a bushel of dirt sticking to their hair and skin. Keep them clean, therefore ; give them warm, well-ventilated, not stifled and close quarters, good food, and enough of it, and pure water in the yard or in the barn itself. As to shelter, you know a foot of boards is equal to a pound of beef. Don't try to winter many animals on little food. You can make no greater mistake. You get no growth for the food, and it don't pay just to keep stock alive. A few head of cattle well fed will put on a far greater weight of flesh on the same food, and sell better in the market. But the knell of the year is sounding, and hopefully we bid you adieu.

WATER enters into the composition of the most solid bodies. The opal is flint and water; the earth in our farms is one-third water; a man's body consists of water to the extent of fifty per cent., and vegetables contain a much larger percentage. Even the air we breathe has five grains of water in each cubic foot.

EDUCATION IN FRANCE.—The total expence of the French government is about \$400,000,000 yearly; and of this sum one-third is devoted to the army and navy, and only one three-hundreth part to popular education. The State of New York expends eight times as much in proportion to its population, and Massachusetts eighteen times as much, for education.

A lake has been discovered in Oregon, 12 miles long by 10 wide, 2,000 ft. beneath the urface, which will probably for ever debar men from access to the water.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Is situated in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, to the north of Nova Scotia, and between a part of New Brunswick and Cape Breton. It is separated from the border counties of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia by Northumberland Strait, which is 130 miles long, and from 9 to 30 miles wide. It is divided into three counties—King's Queen's and Prince—which are subdivided into 67 lots or townships: area, 2133 square miles; population, 85,000; persons to square miles, 40; greatest extent from east to west, 130 miles; and from north to south, 34 miles. Its northern outline resembles a crescent, the two horns being called North and East Capes. It is deeply indented with bays, the largest of which, Hillsborough, on the south, and Richmond on the north, nearly divide it into three parts. It has also numerous harbours. the principal of which are Charlottetown, Georgetown, Bedeque, Port Hill, Cascumpec, and Souris. The lots or townships were originally granted by the British Government to certain proprietors, nearly 100 in number, on certain conditions, which have never been fulfilled, thus originating a "land question" which is not yet settled. Many of the townships have passed out of the hands of the original proprietors and the leasehold system, which was formally in practice, is disappearing year by year. The fertility of the soil will induce a large population to make the island their permanent home, and it is already the most densely peopled of the British North American provinces. Shipbuilding is carried on to a considerable extent; the fisheries in the Gulf give employment to a large number of men.

A submarine telegraph connects the island with New Brunswick across the narrowest part of Northumberland Strait, between Capes Tormentine and Traverse, a distance of 9 miles. In winter the mails are carried over between the same points in boats fitted for the ice or water. Navigation is wholly obstructed from the end of December to the beginning of April.

Prince Edward Island formerly belonged to France, but was ceded to Britain in 1763, after the capture of Louisburg and Cape Breton. It was called St. John's Island till the beginning of the present century. It was formed into a separate province in 1770.

Charlottetown, (8000,) the capital, is situated on the north side of a large, safe, and commodious harbour, formed by the junction near the city of the East, North, and West Rivers. The city is 3 miles from the entrance of the harbour, and is built on gently rising ground, with very wide streets. The Colonial Building, churches, and colleges are the principal edifices. It carries on the principal trade of the Island, and considerable shipping. It is also, the county town of Queen's County.

Georgetown, (800,) the county town of King's County, about 30 miles east of Charlottetown, is an important town, with a fine harbour. Summerside (1000) in Prince County, about 40 miles west of Charlottetown, on the north side of Bedeque Harbour, is a rapidly rising town, with considerable shipbuilding, and important trade with New Brunswick. St. Eleanor's, two miles from Summerside, is the county town of Prince County. Many thriving villages are springing up all over the island.

The form of government is similiar to that in other colonies, consisting of a Lieutenant Governor, an Executive Council of nine members, an elective Legislative Council of thirteen members and a Legislative Assembly of thirty members. Education is very liberally supported, and is directly under control of the government. Lieutenant Island Pr

Attention to the following remarks by those who are in the habit of sending money by mail is strongly recommended:

Registration is applicable to all description of letters and parcels, whether they contain articles of value or not. Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced when one unregistered cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the

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receiver, or other error, may affect an unregistered letter against actual dishonesty on the part of the Post Office employees, a registered letter is incomparably more secure than an unregistered one-an unregistered letter leaves no trace behind it, whilst passing in the great stream of ordinary correspondence, though its presence as a money letter and the nature of its contents, are to any person accustomed to handle letters, as manifest, as though the letter had been singled out, and marked by the registered stamp. If the consequences were limited to the mere risk of the loss of the money so sent, the senders of money in unregistered letters might reasonably urge, that if they choose to encounter the risk, they are free to do so; but higher considerations are involved, and the chance of loss to the careless remitter is really but the smallest part of the evil associated with the practice. The department has gone to a great deal of trouble and expence to ensure as far as it is possible, the sure and safe transmission of money by mail-the safest mode of remitting is by money orders,-where there are no money order offices, the Registration system is available.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

THE QUEEN AND ROYAL FAMILY.

VICTOBIA, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; only daughter of his late Royal Highness, Edward, Duke of Kent, and Victoria, Duchess of Kent, daughter of Francis, Duke Saxe Coburg; born the 24th of May, 1819; succeeded to the Throne on the decease of her uncle, William IV, June 20th, 1837; Preclaimed June 21st, 1837; Crowned June 28th 1838; Married February 10th, 1840, to Field Marshal, His Royal Highness Prince Albert Augustus Charles Emanuel, Prince of Saxe Coburg and Gotha, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, &c., &., who died at Windsor Castle, December 14th, 1861.

1. Issue. Victoria Adelaide Mary Louisa (Princess Royal), born Nov-21st, 1840, married January 25th, 1858, H. R. H. Frederick William, Prince of Prussia.

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
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
