MUST TAKE THE RISK

Government Will Not Be Responsible for Damage to Vessels Wintering in Dominion Canals.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 24.—(Special).—The following order has been passed: "The privilege of wintering vessels in the Dominion canals shall be enjoyed only by a special permit, to be granted in each case, and if granted the vessel shall be at the sole risk of the owner, and His Majesty shall not be responsible for any damage that may occur to any such vessel while wintering, whether such damage happens from the lowering of the water in, or the unwatering or filling of the canal, or without notice to the owner or person in charge of such vessel, or any negligence on the part of any person, or any officer, servant, or agent of His Majesty, or from any other cause whatsoever."

SUPREME COURT JUDGMENTS

Winding Up Order Stands in Cushing Case—Judge Barker's Judgment in Favor of Geo. S. Cushing Also Stands—Col. Blaine Lost His Case.

Fredericton, Nov. 24.—(Special)—The supreme court met at two thirty o'clock this afternoon with all the members in attendance and delivered judgments in a number of cases. Judgment was delivered in three of the appeals in the matter of the Cushing Sulphate Co. by the full court. MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—It is altogether likely that the provincial government and the Intercolonial Railway will co-operate in making a display at the coming sportsmen's show in Boston, that will do credit to the province as a game country. THINK IT OVER

The Canadian Pacific steamers paid out in wages last winter for handling freight from the sheds to their steamers, and from the steamers to the sheds, over \$75,000. This does not include the wages paid for putting freight into or out of the cars.

THE SITUATION

The Canadian Pacific Railway state positively that they have three hundred men ready to come here on Monday, and if they come it will be difficult for the company to send them away to give place to local men. It is rumored that a large number of local men have declared their willingness to work for thirty cents an hour if guaranteed three months work.

FACE THE FACTS

In all that this paper has said during the present labor dispute it has been actuated only by a desire for such a solution of the difficulty as will not reduce the amount of money to be paid out in wages here this winter by steamship companies, nor injure the reputation of the port. The Times has been criticised by workmen who will see later that it was right, and that some of their pretended friends were very bad advisers.

The street railway people stated to the Times recently that they believed they would show that the city's north end electric lights cost more than has been contended by city officials. The Times asked for a statement and published it, believing that any citizen has a right to express his views.

THE BY-ELECTIONS

Although the returns are not complete, the results of the by-elections recently are sufficiently to hand to make it plain that they are not encouraging to the government. The worst blow was given in Antigonish, where a Liberal majority of 800 was reduced to 68. The fight in Antigonish was left to the local men. The federal leaders did not participate in the contest, and such a course was certainly the part of wisdom as far as the Conservatives were concerned. It enabled the Conservative candidate to make the salary grab the issue, and that would have been awkward, if not impossible, if his leaders, who fully participated in it, had been present.

PLUMBERS AND ORPHANS

Discussing the evidence taken in the public court enquiry as to the operations of the Plumbers' Association of Toronto, the Toronto Star says: "It was brought out that in doing some work for the Sunnyvale Orphanage and the Sick Children's Hospital, the usual five per cent. rake-off was made for the benefit of the members of the Plumbers' Association, so that a number of prosperous business men in Toronto were willing to set around a table in secret and wring tribute-money for which they were going to give no value from the necessities of these two most deserving charitable institutions, maintained, as those homes are, with difficulty by the unremitting toil and generosity of generous people."

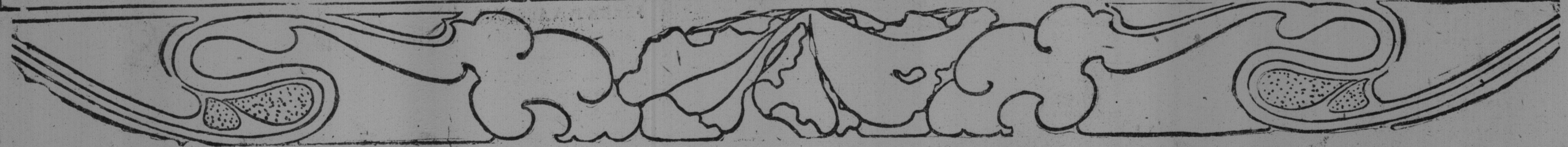
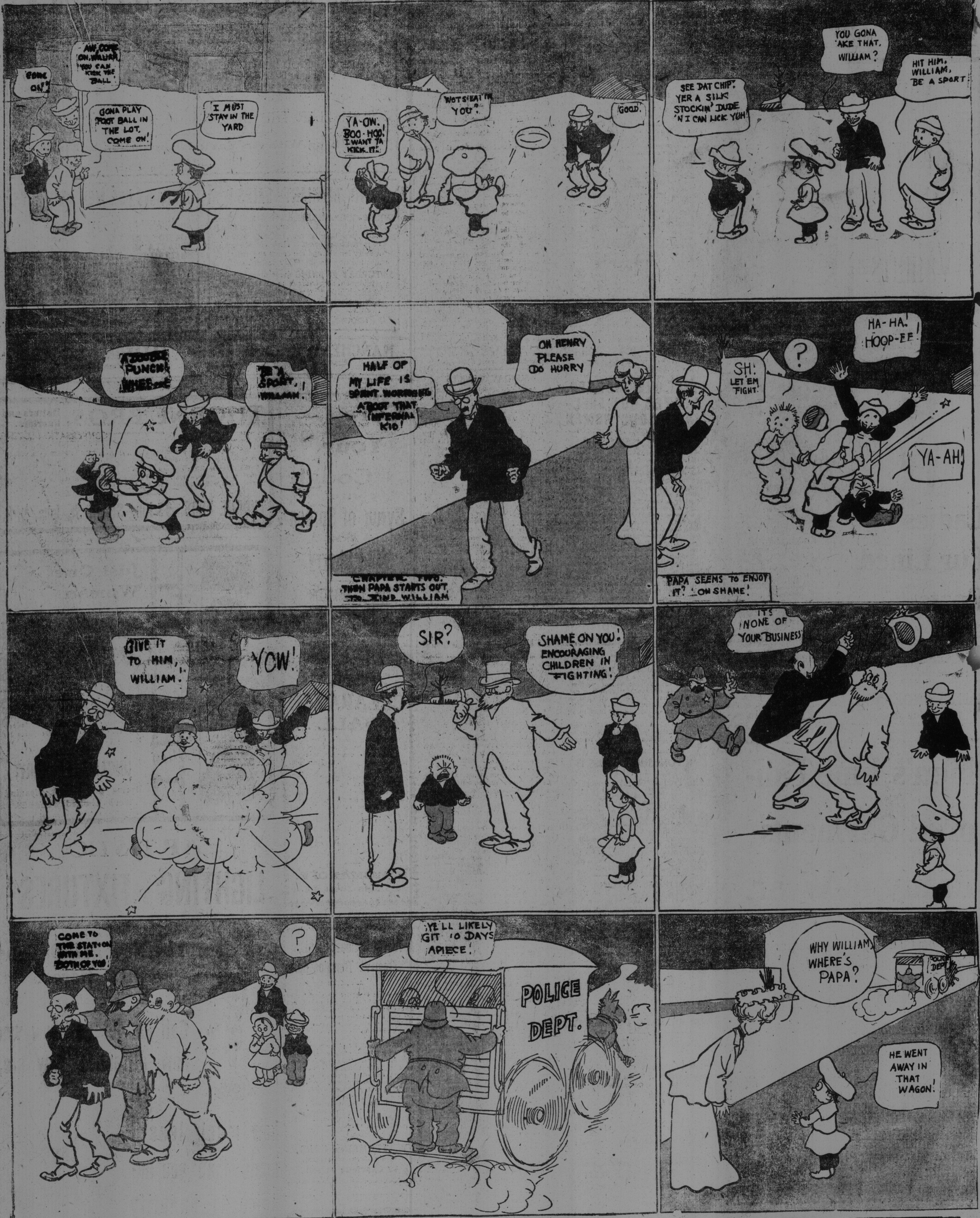

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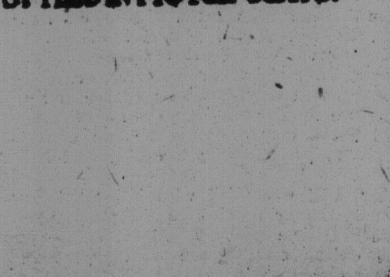

THE MURDER IN ALBANY
Witness Found Who Says Hammond Confessed Murder of His Wife.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 24.—The police believe they have a complete case against John Hammond, the missing 24 year old carpenter, the body of whose 37 year old wife was found yesterday, huddled and decomposed in an old trunk in the prettily furnished parlor of their flat on South Ferry street. James Mangin, of Cohoes, the husband of Hammond's sister, was taken into custody there and brought to Albany and has confessed to the police of both cities that on Tuesday, Nov. 14, two days or more after the murder must have been committed he accompanied Hammond from Cohoes to Rome's Point, and that on the journey Hammond, who he says, was in a condition bordering on nervous collapse, told him that he had killed his wife and hidden her body in a trunk.

STARTLING EVIDENCE
Insurance Investigation Throws More Light on the Dealings of the New-York Life With J. P. Morgan & Co.

New York, Nov. 24.—Startling developments were brought out at today's session of the Armstrong legislative committee on insurance investigation in the course of a minute inquiry by Charles E. Hughes, counsel to the committee into syndicate transactions participated in by the New York Life Insurance Company.

The most important witness was Milton Madison, a bookkeeper of the New York Life during whose examination it was brought out that in the United States Corporation syndicate, the managers of which were J. P. Morgan & Co., there appeared in one instance a profit due to the New York Life of \$88,178 from which was deducted, no reason being given, the sum of \$30,310 paid to Andrew Hamilton, who has been described in the course of the investigation as the "insurance legislative generalissimo."

It appeared from records produced by Mr. Hughes that an account of J. P. Morgan & Co. with Hamilton showed that in December, 1901, that firm had advanced to Hamilton the sum of \$84,720, that on October 1, 1902, this account amounted with interest to \$93,310, and that it was cancelled by the entry of that amount in the account of the New York Life for the former company.

It also developed that participation in the syndicate by the New York Life was affected through the New York Security & Trust Co., which retained one-fourth of the profit of the former company.

The profit, witness said, came in the form of a check on the First National Bank, which he cashed, giving the money to Mr. Perkins. What the latter did with the witness did not know or enter of the transaction was made on the books of the New York Life.

Other witnesses examined during the day were George T. Wilson, fourth vice-president of the Equitable Company; Francis W. Jackson, auditor, and Gerald Brown, in charge of the bond department of the Equitable.

George W. Perkins, of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., tonight gave out the following statement in relation to the testimony brought out in the insurance investigation:

"The transactions disclosed to the insurance committee today were perfectly proper ones. If the natural course of the inquiry does not explain matters, I am sure the committee will give me an opportunity to offer further testimony in the matter."

General R. Brown, of the Equitable Life Association, was the first witness called by the insurance investigation committee today. Mr. Brown produced a list of the tenants of the Equitable building at 120 Broadway.

Mr. Hughes looked the list over and then asked the witness if he thought the rentals were adequate.

Mr. Brown replied that he considered the rental of the Mercantile Safe Deposit Company was inadequate. He also thought that the Equitable Trust Company's rental of \$30,000 was inadequate.

"What would you consider a proper rental for the Equitable Trust Company?" asked Mr. Hughes.

"About \$30,000 a year," answered the witness.

Mr. Brown said the matter of increasing the rent of the Mercantile Safe Deposit Company and of the Equitable Trust Company had been considered by the executive committee and that after the work of this investigation is finished those rentals will be raised.
