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The former Committee had forwarded a petition to His Honour the President, requesting information as to how far the Officers of His Majesty's Customs were bound to comply with and enforce the enactments of the Provincial Legislature, regulating the import and export trade, when such enactments had received the Royal sanction; and no answer having been received to their application, your Committee, conceiving the question to be one of infinite importance, were induced to forward another petition on the same subject, the result of which they do not yet know.—The whole Custom-House system having come under the consideration of the House of Assembly last Session, and a liberal enquiry having been instituted into the state and management of the department, the result will undoubtedly be the correction and removal of whatever abuses may be found to exist in this very important Government establishment. The House of Assembly has prepared and forwarded a humble address to His Majesty, on this subject, which will be presented to His Majesty by His Majesty's Secretary, praying that the Merchant of this Province might be allowed to contract with the Commissariat for the supply of the Rum, required for the use of His Majesty's Troops in this Province; an answer was graciously received by your Committee from their Lordships, informing them that no farther supply of that article would be required, as it was in the contemplation of His Majesty's Government, to substitute a money payment to the Troops in lieu of Rum. The benefits which have resulted to the Province of Canada and New-Brunswick, from having their duties levied by the East-India Company with Tea, from China direct, being very apparent, and your Committee being of opinion that the demand for that article in this Province, both for consumption and exportation, is so constantly on the increase, and that the duties thereon are so high, as to render it necessary to require an early amendment, and seeing that the vessels which have been obliged to come to this port for home cargoes, after discharging their Tea—your Committee, from these considerations, were induced to prepare and forward a petition to the Honourable Company, requesting that one ship might be annually sent to the Province, which should be forwarded under cover to His Excellency Sir Howard Douglas, requesting him to use his influence in this behalf, being well convinced, from His Excellency's uniform attention to the interests of this mercantile community, that in forwarding their petition to him, they were adopting the best and most judicious mode of effecting a compliance with their wishes in this respect.

An alarm has lately spread throughout these Provinces which induced the belief that His Majesty's Ministers were about to alter the duty at present existing on Baltic and other Foreign Timber, which measure, had it been carried into effect, would have proved extremely vital to the commercial and indeed to all the vital interests of these Colonies; your Committee, in common with all similar institutions in the sister Provinces, forwarded a petition to the Lords of His Majesty's Privy Council for Baltic and other Timber, praying that no alteration might be made, which petition was forwarded to John Hulsebridge and Henry Bliss, Esquires, London, to be by them laid before His Majesty's Government; and by your Committee has great satisfaction in being now enabled to state, from late intelligence, that the proposed alteration has failed, inasmuch that the Bill was not brought into Parliament, and the measure must now be abandoned. Thus the fears lately entertained, and for which there was but too much reason, have completely subsided, and the ruinous consequences which would have resulted from the alteration might have been averted. Although the numerous and strong remonstrances which were sent from this side of the Atlantic, and the representations of Merchants and others in Great Britain did not prevent His Majesty's Ministers from contemplating the measure, yet it is possible by giving notice, that the Bill was not brought into the House of Commons, was sufficiently alive to the best interests of these Colonies, as well as those of the mother Country, to induce them to crush this dangerous measure in the very outset.—Copies of this petition were also forwarded to the Chamber of Commerce of Quebec and Halifax, for their information, from which bodies similar documents were received.

From the fact that such a jury and distress result to the inhabitants of this Province generally, in consequence of the numerous Law Suits at issue existing in it, but particularly for the circumstance, of the greater part of such suits being carried on in the Superior Court, where the costs are so heavy and oppressive; your Committee were induced to forward a Petition to all the three branches of the Legislature on the subject, setting forth the hardships most commonly and severely felt by the present operation of the Law, suggesting several alterations in the system, and particularly requesting that the Fee Table Ordinance might be regulated and published, in that persons who may at any time have occasion to employ a Lawyer, may be able to ascertain the amount of the Costs he may be called upon to pay, and such as the Law allows, will not be under the necessity of sending the Bill to Parliament to be taxed, and thus increase the expense and delay, which, under the most favourable circumstances, inevitably attend such proceedings. This Petition was very favourably received, and is being signed by the principal members of this community, as well as by the Chamber of Commerce as a whole.—Your Committee are happy to observe, that a Committee consisting of three Members of the House of Assembly, has been appointed to investigate the matter during the recess, and they have full confidence that these Gentlemen will bring that attention upon the subject which its importance demands; and will come forward next Session, prepared to suggest and support a plan of relief in every way adapted to the circumstances of the Colony, and in conformity with the liberal sentiments on the subject of Law, as strongly urged by the present Lord Chancellor of England.

At the instance of the Steam-Bath at Saint John's, several sessions in view to the City of the Atlantic, the Merchants of this place and the United States, were forwarded only one week, the inconvenience of which arrangement was likely to be severely felt, by the Commercial body; your Committee immediately by letter applied to John Howe, Esq., Post-Master-General, Halifax, requesting that he would cause a mail to be forwarded twice a week, and they have much pleasure in acknowledging the polite and prompt attention, which in this as in every other case he bestowed upon their application, by giving the necessary directions to the Post-Master here, which was immediately complied with, and the Mails have since been received and forwarded with more regularity than has formerly been the case at the same season of the year. They consider it a duty to themselves and the Mercantile body generally, to acknowledge with truly complacent feelings, the care and the facility at all times given, by G. D. Wray, Esquire, the Post-Master here, to any subject which your Committee had in view requiring his assistance and co-operation.

Another subject which attracted the attention of your Committee was Revenue Law, many parts of which were found rather oppressive to trade, and in their opinion, different in their effects from the original intention of the Legislature in passing the Bill. Your Committee therefore prepared a Petition to the Legislature, pointing out the alterations which they deemed to be most necessary, and are happy to observe, that the same had met with due attention, and the prayer of the Petition had been complied with. Among the most important and beneficial of these alterations are, the allowing the whole amount of drawback upon the exportation of Articles entitled thereto, in future to be considered as cash payment, and entered on the Treasury Bond as such; Importers of West India Produce, Brandy, Gin, Wine, &c., being allowed to warehouse the same for exportation, in any store approved of by the Treasurer, on the same terms as Flour, &c. is bonded in the King's Warehouse, and
