### **OBITUARIES**

### JAMES TWEEDY.

In the latter part of the first quarter of the present century a few emigrants from the banks of the Shannon made homes for themselves on the Miramachi River, in the vicinity of what is now called Williamstown.

They "had not left their religion behind them," when they came to the new world, and with their concurrence, Robert Tweedy, the faithful leader of the little company, interested himself in their behalf by making application for the ministrations of the Methodist itinerants. "In 1830 a minister was sent to the settlements on the Miramachi River."

Like the house of Mary the mother of John Mark, the house of Robert Tweedy was always open to the servants of the Lord, and out of that home came three sons to preach the Gospel of a free and full salvation.

One of those sons, the Rev. James Tweedy, began his ministerial labors in 1855, and for the long period of forty-three years, a longer period than falls to the lot of most of his brethren in the ministry, continued, without serious interruption through sickness or any other cause, to preach Christ and Him crucified. And, in his case, the prayer of Charles Wesley was fulfilled:

"O that without a lingering groan, I may the welcome word receive, My body with my charge lay down, And cease at once to work and live."

On the evening of Wednesday, the 14th of September last, he conducted the weekly prayer meeting in the church at Louisburg, speaking and praying with his accustomed vigor and earnestness. Returning home he complained of illness, and before the breaking of another day, "he was not for God took him."

The writer of this notice has endeavored, but has failed, to obtain information respecting the time or circumstances of Bro. Tweedy's conversion and call to the ministry. But that is a matter of comparatively little moment.

Those who were most intimate with him, among the ministry and the laity of our church, during the forty-three years of his itinerant labors, will bear witness that he was a faithful pastor, and a laborious and fearless preacher of the Gospel, prayerfully and constantly striving to fulfil the Apostolic ideal, "warning every man and teaching every man, with all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus."

Many in the ranks of our useful laity and several brethren in the ministry have looked upon him as their spiritual father.

After an earthly pilgrimage of about seventy-two years, the mortal part was laid to rest in Highland Cemetery, Amherst, on Saturday, Sept. 17th, awaiting the resurrection of the just.

### JOHN CASSIDY.

John Cassidy was born in Bandon, Ireland, and came to St. John, N. B., in early life, and received his early education in that city. He was led to Christ, and shortly after, began to feel a divine call to preach the He was recommended by the St. John Quarterly Board, and offered himself as a candidate for the ministry, and being received on probation, was appointed to the Woodstock circuit, then a wide field extending along the St. John River, from Northampton to Grand Falls, now divided into five circuits. Here his excellent preaching ability, combined with zeal, fidelity and devotion to his work, won for him many friends, and made him a successful minister. From Woodstock he removed to Bermuda, where also he labored with marked success; and in subsequent years occupied some of the most important charges, serving Christ and Methodism well in every place and holding throughout his ministry a high place in the esteem and confidence of his brethren.

He was a fine expositor of God's word, of which he was evidently a Few men have approached more nearly the Apospainstaking student. tolic injunction to be "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." He was a diligent and conscientious pastor, a kind and sympathetic friend, and a wise administrator, both of circuit and Conference affairs.

He served for many years as Conference letter-writer, in which capacity, his knowledge of Methodist usage, his sympathy with all sorrow, and his aptitude for expressing in refined and delicate language, the sentiments of the Conference, made his letters of condolence models of excellence.

He was many times elected chairman of District, in which position, his thorough knowledge of the discipline of our church, and acquaintance with the general principles of civil law, enabled him, always, to administer the affairs of the District, with advantage to the church.

In 1885, he was elected to the important post of President of the Conference, in which position he displayed both tact and wisdom. elected in 1883 a representative to the General Conference at Belleville, Ont., when the union of the Methodist bodies was consummated, and rendered on that occasion effective service, especially in connection with the Supernumerary Fund, assisting materially to bring about some important changes.

He was sincere, candid, and upright, ever showing a high regard for whatsoever are true, honest, just, pure, lovely, and of good report, a warm-hearted man, full of brotherly sympathy, quick to hear the cry of distress, ready to serve his brethren in any emergency. for his fellow-soldiers in the service of Christ, was hearty and sincere; and though he sometimes vexed them by the play of his wit, in their absence, he had no harsh or unkind words, no words which would injure their character, or disparage their abilities.

In 1890, his failing health rendered necessary his retirement from the active work of the ministry, and he settled at Bridgetown, where he died March 14th, 1899, in the sixty-seventh year of his age, and the forty-third year of his ministry.

# REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your committee has to report :---

- I. That the difficulties connected with the harmonizing of the numerical returns from the Districts, appear to increase rather than diminish. It is recommended, therefore, that greater care be exercised in the audit and after-clerical work.
- 2. There are twenty-seven fewer members of the church reported this year than last. The schedules will also show decreases in the numbers of infant baptisms and marriages, and an increase of burials. The careful study of these vital statistics is suggested.
- 3. Your committee is again under the painful necessity of reporting a falling off in the general contributions of the church. The following is a comparative statement:

# REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

We bring before you, on this missionary anniversary, a story very similar to that of other years. Not all we hoped to achieve has been accomplished by our wide-spread agencies, and yet substantial progress has been made, for which we may well thank God and take courage.

In Western China, the troubles which gave to our missionaries such anxiety, and deprived us of opportunity, have, as in the case of Paul, "fallen out rather unto the furtherance of the Gospel." With the indemnity paid by the Chinese Government, more commodious buildings have been erected, and greater care is now exercised by the officials in relation to the safety of the missionaries.

We have now two hospitals in successful operation, to care for the bodies of the sick, and to open the way for the preaching of the Gospel.

In Japan, "opposing forces seem to dispute every inch of the ground," a state of things experienced by all the churches, and yet there is some gain in the membership of the church; and the seed of the word is being sown more and more widely in the hearts of old and young.

Among the Indians of the Dominion, the work makes progress, one of its most pleasing features being the increasing and more efficient Industrial Institutions. "Whole tribes have been reclaimed from barbarism and many thousands have been truly converted to God."

The work in our Domestic Missions has been fairly successful, and our missionaries have worked with zeal and devotion, although many have been sorely perplexed by salaries, altogether inadequate to family necessities. In some of these missions there have been very marked displays of God's saving power.

We are very sorry to be obliged to report a serious decrease in the returns from the Districts for the year now closing. The receipts are as follows:—

Your Committee feels the importance of a forward movement in Sunday School work. It has become an important factor in the education of the children and youth of our land. try is looking to the church to train the rising generation in religious things. If we expect our young people to become efficient workers in League, and other departments of Christian work, the children must be educated in the funnamental facts concerning the Book of God. They must be familiar with the principles of religion and the doctrines of the church, as found in the catechism. They must also have stored in their memory the precious truths of God's Word as represented in memory Scripture. accomplish this our officers and teachers must receive such training as is within reach on these subjects, and the principles of teaching.

It is therefore recommended that our preachers and Sunday School superintendents be urged to establish Normal Training Classes for teachers. It is recommended that the text book for this purpose be "Hurlbut's Normal Lessons" (revised).

It is also recommended that the Conference endorse the work and methods of the International Sunday School Convention, as represented in the Nova Scotia Sunday School Association.

We are pleased to find that the Home Department is being formed in connection with many of our schools. This movement for Bible study in the home, has great possibilities for good, and we urge that it be pressed with enthusiasm on all our circuits.

The importance of definite teaching on the subject of temperance, in the light of God's word, cannot be overestimated. It is therefore urged that the Quarterly Temperance Lessons be made more prominent, and that the pupils be given opportunity to take the pledge on the Sabbaths in which it occurs.

# REPORT OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

# CONSTITUTION FOR SUSTENTATION FUND.

T

This fund shall be called "The Sustentation Fund of the Nova Scotia Conference."

П

The General management of this Fund shall be in the hands of a Committee, which shall consist of a minister and layman from each District, who shall be chosen at the Annual Session of the District, together with a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot by the Conference.

III

The Fund shall consist of such monies as may be raised in the bounds of the Conference in the manner following, viz.:—

- (a)-By Legacies or Special Donations.
- (b)—By Donations or Annuity.
- (c)—Subscription and Collections on various Circuits.

In making disbursements the Committee shall be governed by the following regulations:—

I.—Probationers shall be estimated to receive a salary of \$300. Ordained unmarried men in full connection \$350. Married men in full work \$650.

2.—Should there be any balance after raising the salaries to the above mentioned figures, such balance to be divided *pro rata* until young men receive \$350. Ordained unmarried men in full connection \$400. Ordained married men \$750. Provided always no claimant receive from all sources beyond disciplinary allowance.

3.—The basis of distribution shall be the amount estimated

by Financial District Meetings.

4.—The Committee shall have power to consider *any special cases* which may arise, and to take such action as may be considered necessary.

The Committee shall, through its Secretary-Treasurer, make an annual report of its work to the Conference. This report shall include that of an audit of accounts.

### VI

That the ministers endeavor to secure subscriptions to this fund on all Circuits, and that a list of subscriptions of one dollar and upwards be published in the minutes of the Conference at the expense of the Fund.

### VII.

That the Financial District meetings be required to make arrangements for at least one public meeting in behalf of the Sustentation Func on each Circuit at which collections will be taken and subcriptions solicited.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The committee on the state of the work feeling the importance of the matter committed to its care, has made as careful a review of the labors of the year as the data before it permitted. From the reports of the Districts, some of which are incomplete, your committee has endeavored to embody facts and recommendations on the spiritual work of the church, than which nothing so important will come before this Conference.

The reports from all the Districts, indicate an average amount of labor by the pastors and members of the churches. But we regret that more marked results have not been achieved during the year. The visible fruits do not correspond with our professed faith in a living Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit, and the greatness of the promise of God.

In some of the reports the hope is expressed that seasons of spiritual refreshing may shortly be realized. It is a question for us to determine, how far we are personally responsible for the fulfilment of that hope. The expression of the hope is one thing, the adequate effort to reach its consumation is another. Either the necessary human power has not been exerted or it has been turned into directions other than the supreme end of a preached gospel—the conviction of sin, and the salvation of the soul. Your committee fears that this suggestion, which is made in one of the reports, touches a solemn truth. Our efforts, which ought at all times to be unceasingly directed toward the conservation and promotion of the spiritual interests of our people, are sometimes dissipated upon less important issues. This ought not to be. From

another district there comes the complaint, which we all know to be too true, "Our church members are, in many cases, sadly lacking in that deep devotion and attachment to God's cause which should mark every professor of religion." Your committee urges that earnest efforts be made to secure the regular attendance of all the members of our church at the Lord's Table, and, as far as possible, at class-meeting and social services, and we also suggest that the new annual membership certificate may be so used as to aid in promoting attachment to our church and its services—the lack deplored. We cannot emphasize too strongly the need of a deeper spiritual life among our people, and, for its attainment, we press the importance of regular and faithful pastoral visitation, and upon all our people, especially parents, the godly practice of daily worship at the family altar; also the necessity of grounding our children in the doctrines of the Word of God, as set forth in the catechism of our church.

Guysboro' and Sydney districts, both returning large increases, and giving reports breathing a refreshing spirit of encouragement and cheer, attribute their success, under God, to evangelistic work, in which pastors and people were blessedly united. We gladly call attention to this fact, believing as we do,—Methodism itself being the product of revival that our church must in the future, as in the past, live and grow by God-owned evangelistic labors.

Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues receive frequent mention as mighty spiritual agencies in promoting the work of God among the young, all of which we heartily endorse. the vital necessity of leading our scholars to Christ, and into Christs' Church, in the days of their youth, we recommend the adoption in every school, occasionally throughout the year, of a decision day,-a day on which the lessons may be shortened, and the scholars lovingly and solemnly invited to give their hearts to God. We are deeply humiliated to be compelled to report, as the result of our labors for the year, a decrease in church membership. This fact may be variously explained, but nevertheless it calls for humiliation and heart searching before God. We are in accord with the weighty words of one of the reports: "Our conviction is that the churches are too self-centered, and are not acting in harmony with the genius of the Gospel, and the aggressive spirit of early Methodism."

Let the coming year be memorable, not only as a year of a great financial effort, but also of a great spiritual effort. Nothing will do more to secure the success of the "Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund," than a revival on every circuit. "Bring ye all the tithes into the store-house, that there may be meat in mine

house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."--Malachi 3:10

## ARMY AND NAVY WORK REPORT.

Reports of our work among the men of the Army and Navy were presented from Halifax and Bermuda. Four of our pastors are appointed by the Government authorities to minister to the spiritual necessities of the men. The Rev. John Craig, of Halifax, reports a smaller number of Wesleyans than usual in that garrison, and says that his chief opportunity of influencing men for good, is in the Institute, which is under the matronage of Miss Cunningham, whose Christian zeal, and wise methods, make that place a constant blessing to the men.

The hospital is also a place for reaching into the experiences of the men, in spiritual things. About fifty have been under his care during the year.

Eighty-eight soldiers, besides some soldiers wives and children, are reported as ministered to by the Rev. David Hickey, of St. Georges', Bermuda. Several of them have united with the church during the year, nine remain on trial, and the converts of last year have grown in grace and knowledge, impressing their pastor with the nobility of their characters.

Three hundred and fifty men (these being from both army and navy,) have been ministered to in holy things, by the Rev. H. Burgess, of Ireland Island, Bermuda, opportunities for gathering the men into the membership of the church, have not been frequent, on account of their moving so often from one station to another. Many of the men have, however, given themselves to the Saviour, and are living in the beauty of a consistent Christian profession.

The Rev. John Prestwood, of Hamilton, Bermuda, reports sixty eight soldiers under his care, with a very few women and children. Four only are members of his church.

The attendance of the men at all the services is very encouraging, and all the children of our soldiers, old enough to attend the Sunday School, do so.

#### DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.

In view (1) of the verdict of science regarding the nature and effects of intoxicating liquors; and (2) of the experience of the world regarding their use for beverage purposes, and of formal declarations of this General Conference; and (3) of the teachings of Holy Scripture we make the following declaration of principles:

- (1). That the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is immoral, and it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit it.
- (2). That total abstinence from all intoxicating beverages is the imperative duty of every individual.
- (3). That the liquor traffic is a business antagonistic to every interest of the Church and the State.
- (4). That we condemn the license feature of all statues by which money is accepted for the legal protection of an immoral traffic.
- (5). That the Government—Dominion, Provincial, or Municipal—that accepts money from liquor licenses becomes a partner in the business justly declared to be an enemy of God and man.
  - (6). That we protest against this unholy alliance.
- (7). That the only proper attitude of the Christian toward the liquor traffic, is that of relentless hostility, and all members of the Methodist Church who possess the elective franchise, are hereby strongly recommended to use their influence to secure the nomination of municipal and parliamentary candidates known to favor and support prohibition, and to use their votes as a solemn trust to elect such candidates, thus promoting the rescue of our country from the guilt and dishonor which have been brought upon it by a criminal complicity with the traffic.
- (8). That civic righteousness demands the extirpation of a traffic so fruitful of corruption in every department of civil government. And the time has come when all good citizens should unite for harmonious and aggressive action at the ballot box to secure this end.
- (9). That we adopt the declaration of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States, "That the pronounced and stupendous need of the hour to meet this enemy of everything American and Christian is an aroused church consecrated to the extermination of the traffic."

# REPORT OF CAMP-MEETING COMMITTEE.

Your Committee learns with satisfaction of the complete arrangements made by the Executive of the Camp-meeting Association for the coming services in August. Miss Emma L. Tucker, one of the most successful evangelists in the Methodist Church in America, has been employed to assist in the services. Miss Tucker's work in soul-winning has been observed by a member of this Conference, and on his recommendation, seconded by many brethren, in whose circuits she has worked, she has been secured for Berwick. We may say that this evangelist has no stated remuneration, but looks for no more than the results of her work may produce. Miss Tucker will be the first woman to succeed the late Phoebe Palmer in our camp-meeting services.

The executive has also made special arrangements for daily meetings for youths and young men, and meetings for children. The former will be under the leadership of Mr. Bell, Secretary of the Y. M. C. A., Halifax, the latter under the direction of Miss Lillie Lathern, of Dartmouth.

In the employment of evangelists in our centres, these helpers make their work dependent on the organization and co-operation of the local ministers and people. Will our ministers and people kindly remember that our success in camp-meeting services is dependent upon the same conditions. We crave, therefore, the attendance and co-operation of our brethren.

Through the efforts of a devoted Christian layman, converted at the meetings three years ago; a building is being erected for the comfortable lodging of ministers who will attend and work in the services.

Your Committee asks that the Rev. A. B. Higgins, B. A., be appointed superintendent of services for this year.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC CORRUPTION.

Your Committee begs leave to present the following recommendations:

- 1. Whereas—The practice of bribery at elections is rapidly increasing in many sections of our country, and the venality of the voters becoming more and more unblushing; and
- 2. Whereas—An elector has as little right to sell the decision he is supposed to record when he casts his vote, as a Judge and Jury have to barter their decisions; and
- 3. Whereas—The practice adds enormously to the temptations of our puplic men, and to the expenses of government, and tends to steadily lower the standard of public morality; and
- 4. Whereas—On account of the importance this practice gives the campaign funds, the Christian sentiment in its struggle for the enactment of prohibitory and other laws, is, and must be, seriously handicapped; and
- 5. Whereas—Many of our church members excuse the practice as a necessary evil, and, in too many cases, in the service of their respective parties, either handle corrupt funds, or consent to their employment, instead of bearing Christian testimony against this crime; and
- 6. Whereas—We cannot expect a holy God to bless us with the revival, which we hope will close the present and usher in the twentieth century, as long as the accursed thing is amongst us, and we stand in any other relation to this public crime than that of brave and consistent protestation against it.
- 7. Therefore be it Resolved—That as a Conference, we set our faces against this evil in every form, and recommend the following practical methods for producing in the country a higher conception of the duties of Christian citizenship:
- Ist.—That we preach sermons dealing specifically with this evil, especially before election campaigns open, and urge our people to free themselves, and to do all in their power to free their respective political parties from complicity in this crime against free citizenship.
- 2nd—That in our Sabbath Schools and Epworth Leagues instruction be given on this subject.
- 3rd—That we petition the Councils of Public Instruction to provide for some instruction on civic duty in our public schools,

# PARLIAMENTARY PETITION.

The following petition received the endorsation of the Conference:—

To the Honorable, the House of Commons of Canada in legislative session convened:—

The memorial of the Nova Scotia Conference of the Methodist Church in Canada humbly sheweth: That

Whereas—The practice of bribery at elections has in many sections become notoriously common, and the venality of the electorate so flagrant that the privilege of the franchise is looked upon merely as a matter of merchandise; and

Whereas—Thus the principle of representative government is in danger of being seriously undermined; and

Whereas—An elector, when he sells the decision he is supposed to record when he casts his vote, commits the same serious crime, as would Judges and Juries, if they bartered for money the decisions they pronounce in our courts of justice.

We therefore humbly petition Parliament to add to the stringency of the act to prevent corrupt practices at elections, and pray our representatives of both parties to patriotically unite to devise means whereby an end may be put to this evil of the body politic, which, if not checked, will become the standing disgrace of our politics, a stain on the honors of Parliament, a menace to the stability of our free institutions and an evil contagion debauching the civic conscience of the electorate.

And your memorialists will ever pray.

The reports from the various circuits show that the special efforts have been helpful to the churches, and in some cases very marked, as in Glen Margaret; and on the New Germany mission the results, we think, fully justified the large expenditure of time and money.
