Another St. John soldier has paid the supreme sacrifice of cruel war and has given up his life on the altar of his country, Gunner William L. Hunter of 16

In a despatch from Ottawa this morning the sad news was conveyed to his sister, Mrs. John Williams of Erin street, that Gunner Hunter was officially reported died of wounds at No. 1 Canadian General Hospital, Etaples, August 1, wounded right thigh. ## LIST OF VICTIMS GROWS STEADILY

Cobalt, Ont., Aug. 2—A conservative estimate now places the number of dead in the fire-swept area of northern Ontario at 400, although unconfirmed reports from various points place it higher. A report from Mteheson received here today stated that 450 bodies had been found and identified.

A recrudescence of the fires and the demolition of other settlements is feared. To the west of Rik Lake, a serious outbreak is feared.


