TORONTO, Oct. 22.—Official nominations for the Dominion House of Commons will be filed in 75 out of 82 Ontario ridings today. There are nearly 170 candidates in the field for these constituencles. Fifty-nine Ontario members of the last parliament are recontesting their late constituencies—14 Liberals, 38 Conservatives and 12 Progressives.

Five members of the government are offering themselves for re-election in the province of Ontario, including Premier W. L. Mackenzie King in North York, with Lieut. Col. T. ### Middle Temple Moot To Be Revived

THE MODERN UNIVERSITY.

(Brooklyn Eagle.)

"Mooting" may be described as a rehearsal of a trial, in which students and young barristers take part as counsel, and so prepare themselves for the real thing.

Gray's Inn, where, as in the other Inns of Court, the practice of mooting was neglected after the Restoration, revived it in 1875. Today the Gray's Inn Moot Society is a very flourishing member of the corporate inn life. Last year the Moot Book of Gray's Inn, edited by Lord Justice Atkin, master of the moots, was issued.

Most interesting records they are, from which it is possible to gather such items as the moot on November 24, 1879, when Mr. Haldane, barrister of Lincoln's Inn, disputed with Mr. Upjohn, of Gray's Inn, before his honor Judge Russell, Q. 

The Resignation of Rev. W. M. Fraser Accepted-Loan to St. Stephen Approved.

The Saint John Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, at a special meeting yesterday afternoon in Knox Church rooms sustained the call of St. Matthew's congregation to Rev. Dr. J. A. Morison and set October 30 as the date of his induction which will be the first settlement in New Brunswick under the new regime. Rev. W. M. Townsend, moderator, presided.

The meeting accepted regretfully the resignation of Rev. W. M. Fraser from Greenock kirk, St. Andrews, and approved a request for a grant of \$3,000 for the St. Stephen building fund. Rev. C. H. Elliott, who is appointed to the Hammond River congregation for six months was welcomed. Rev. E. J. Kerr was appointed clerk pro tem to replace Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, who will be absent from the Presbytery for a time.

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

DR. MORISON'S CALL.

Expressing his willingness to accept the call.

The date of the induction suggested was October 30. Mr. Hutchison and Mr. Galbraith, representing the congregation, spoke enthusiastically of the heartiness of the call and of the bright hopes for the future.

CALL SUSTAINED.

> HAVE not attempted to answer the question in other than a general way. The answer must be given by the Charlottetown Conference; and it must be as reasonable, and well fortified with facts, as it is definite. It must recognize the diversity of conditions and needs in the four divisions of Canada, while pointedly and fearlessly presenting the case for the Maritimes. I have suggested four ways in which the country at large may assist: First, to make it somewhat easier to do business with the rest of Canada; second, to give greater encouragement in the development of industries based on our natural resources, the products to go to markets overseas; third, to give better transportation, and aid in opening up those markets; fourth, to adopt a real immigration policy for the particular benefit of the Maritimes. Of course, it goes without saying that our national ports should be so equipped as to be somewhat ahead instead of behind the requirements of winter ocean traffic, and that all possible business be routed our way in the winter season. It has been suggested that manufacturers might establish small branches to meet the requirements of the Maritime market, and so build up our urban centres by providing more em-

The Maritime Conference must not fail. Its task is of national as well as vincial significance. The rest of the Dominion waits to learn what the Maritimes want. Its mental attitude is sympathetic. The Fathers of Confederation dealt with the conditions of sixty years ago. Their sons must deal with the conditions of today. Are they less courageous, or less competent? # Dorothy Dix

Why Shouldn't More Middle-aged Couples Marry?-How Can Miss 35 Win Young Mr. 23?—Can a Puritanical Man be Happily Married to Modern Flapper?

DEAR MISS DIX—There are no more pitiful people in the world than the middle-aged widows and widowers whose homes have been broken up by death, whose children are married and gone and who are forced to live about in dreary lodging and boarding houses. Many of these men, probably most of them, would like to marry again, but they feel that they cannot afford to support a wife. All that they have made has gone to rearing their children, and now they feel that they must save up something for their own old age. Doubtless there are thousands of women in the same position, and I often wonder why these lonesome old people can't get together and pool their earnings, and be company for each other.

Is this because women are still bound by the tradition that the wife must not work outside of the home, no matter what the necessity? Are customs stronger than conditions? Are women really standing where they stood thirty years ago?

ANSWER:

I think your suggestion is an admirable one, Mr. Reader, and that thousands of lonely old men and

thousands of lonely old men and omen might act upon it with advantage.

For there is this curious thing about matrimony, that it fits people for the single life. Even those who have been unpolly married and who have longed most for freedom find that ten their bonds are broken that their liberty does not bring om the happiness that they expected. They cannot go back to it unwed days. They have established the habit of domesticity.

THE man who has been used to home cooking finds that restaurant meals have no flavor. To the man who is accustomed to coming home after his day's work to the eager welcome of a wife, it is desolation to come home to a dark and lonely room. He misses even being fussed over, and nagged about putting on dry shoes after he has been out in the wet, and being told not to sit in a draft or eat the things that are bad for his direction.

The woman who has been accustomed to her own home can never be happy in any one else's home or with no home to run. And even when she establishes a home of her own, it lacks all savor to her if there is no man in it. She hasn't interest or ambition to get up a good dinner just for herself.

We always think of romance as belonging to youth, but in reality it is the elderly who need the companionship of husbands

IT IS, of course, a pity that the woman should have to continue to work after marriage. It is unfortunate that every man cannot make enough money to enable his wife to devote her sole attention to her home, but that is one of the conditions of the present economic situation, and many a woman, young and old, has to keep on with her job or else stay single.

And inasmuch as the woman would have to work anyway, it seems to me that she is better off with a husband and a home, and the love and cheer they bring her, than she would be living alone, with no companionship of an evening save her own dreary thoughts.

DEAR MISS DIX—I am a woman of 85, wildly in love for the first time, and with a young man of 23. This young fellow takes me out quite a lot and tells me I remind him of his mother. Do you think he loves me? What should I do?

# Russia To Have Biggest Refracting Telescope

By DAVID DIETZ.

RUSSIA is to have the largest refracting telescope in the world. This news will come as a surprise to many people, especially to members of the scientific world who are familiar with the exodus of scientific workers which took place from Russia to France, England and America shortly after the Bolshevist revolution.

The new Russian telescope is being built in England. The lens is to be 41 inches in diameter. At the present time the largest refracting telescope is at the Yerkes Observatory in this country. Its lens is 40 inches in diameter.

The refracting telescope is the type which most people are familiar with. It has a small eye-piece at the end near the observer and a large lens at the far end.

Larger telescopes of a different sort are already in existence.

\* \* \*

THE largest telescopes in the world are the reflecting type. These do not employ a lens at all, but a large concave mirror instead. The mirror is placed at the lower end of the tube and the observer looks through an eye-piece which is inserted at the side of the tube. An arrangement of small prisms or mirrors enables the observer to see the image on the big mirror.

BIG telescopes are so important to-day because astronomy has reached a point where future discoveries can be made only with the aid of giant telescopes and expensive supplementary apparatus. Astronomers feel that the day is past when the amateur using a little telescope can hope to make a discovery of major importance.

The group of American astronomers in California at the Mount Wilson and Mount Hamilton observatories have come to be almost a supreme court in astronomy. This is because they have the finest apparatus in the world and can therefore subject new theories and discoveries to tests which cannot be duplicated elsewhere in the world.

MONTREM, Oct. 22—Jack Ward, second-rate local colored boxer with brief experience forced Jack Renault, Canadian heavyweight champion to go the limit to win a decision over his challenger in a ten-round bout here last night. Both men were knocked down, Ward twice and Renault once. Roy Mitchell, colored Halifax boxer, will probably meet Renault now.

Ward was handicapped by lack of experience. He has been fighting around Montreal only during the last seevral years, while Renault has had the advantage of clever management and many big fights.

Renault, on his showing against Soldier Jones in his last fight here, was made an odds on choice and few believed Ward would last more than four or five rounds. Indeed when the champion floored him in the first with a hard right, it looked as though his stay in the ring would be even shorter, but the colored boxer scrambled to his fect and displaying unexpected courage remained on them until the gong sounded. From the beginning of the second round to the finish, Ward fought more carefully and at times returned punch for punch with his opponent. He evened things in the second round by knocking the champion down with a blow at his solar plexus. But Renault was up again in an instant and at his opponent with a rush. Ward, however, was not to be caught napping and his clever avoidance of Renault's attack earned him the round.

In the fifth round Renault floored

Ward for the second time, but the colored fighter quickly recovered and was exchanging blows with the chamwas exchanging blows with the champion when the round ended. The sixth round found Ward more than holding his own and he landed several lefts to Renault's face and chin that forced the titleholder to break ground. In the other rounds, however, the champion held the advantage over Ward, displaying the more finished style and landing more frequently. Ward weighed 197½ and Renault 204½.
